STORY LINES

- Baylor hits the road to face off with No. 16/16 Iowa State in Ames on Saturday.
- The Bears are coming off a home loss vs. No. 22/22 BYU, falling behind 21-0 in the opening minutes of the game as the Cougars moved to 5-0. BU rallied, holding the Cougs to three points in the second half but its game-tying drive fell short as a clinching interception was thrown with just over a minute left.
- The Bears are in the fifth year under Coach Dave Aranda, who in 2021 led the Bears to the best season in school history with a 12-2 record, a Big 12 Championship and the 2022 Sugar Bowl. Aranda directed the Bears to the Armed Force Bowl in 2022 and after a 3-9 season in 2023, has taken over defensive play calling duties.
- Aranda taking over defensive play calling is his first time directing a defense since he established himself as one of the top defensive minds in football as the defensive coordinator at LSU, Wisconsin and Delta State. He is also directing the inside linebackers.
- Baylor's rugged start to the schedule – including Saturday at Iowa State – that has featured three ranked opponents that have combined to go 22-6, including a 6-1 mark in Big 12 play. Including the matchup at Texas Tech next week, BU will face teams that have combined to go 26-7, and 8-1 in Big 12 play in its first seven weeks of the 2024 season.
- Palmer Williams had the best game in program history for a punter, booting it six times at Utah - all over 50 yards - for a 62.7 yard average, including longs of 79 and 76 yards. He leads the nation with a 57.9 yard average.
- The Bears have added several key members to its coaching staff, including new offensive coordinator Jake Spavital, associate head coach/running backs coach Khenon Hall, tight ends coach Jarrett Anderson, defensive line coach Inoke Breckterfield, inside linebackers coach Jamar Chaney and offensive line coach Mason Miller.
- Since 2011, combined with football, and men's and women's basketball, Baylor leads the nation in wins, owning 46 more wins than the next closest program (UConn).
- In the secondary in 2023, Baylor returns Caden Jenkins, who was named a second-team Freshman All-America cornerback in 2023 by The Athletic. Jenkins ranked second in the nation in freshman interceptions a year ago. He and safety Carl Williams IV both finished their 2023 seasons ranked among the nation's top freshman corners by PFF.

SCOUTING THE CYCLONES

- Iowa State rolls into the matchup with the Bears red hot and boasting one of the nation’s best defensive units. ISU ranks No. 2 in passing defense, No. 10 in interceptions, No. 8 in first-down defense, No. 4 in scoring defense, No. 1 in team passing efficiency defense and No. 11 in total defense nationally. Offensively, ISU is allowing the 12th fewest sacks in college football.
- Overall, ISU is scoring 28.3 points and allowing 7.3 points per game, Offensively, ISU is going for 399.3 yards per game, including 236.3 passing and 163 rushing, while allowing only 255.3 yards per game, 102.5 in the air and 152.8 rushing. Rocco Becht has thrown for 896 yards on 66.4 percent completions with just two interceptions and seven TDs. Abu Sama has rushed 40 times for 225 yards and two scores. ISU boasts two of the best receivers in college football, with Jayden Higgins leading the team with 25 catches for 287 yards and four TDs, and Jaylin Noel owning 19 catches for 353 yards and two scores. One of the nation’s best tight ends is sophomore Ben Brahmer, who has five catches for 96 yards.
- The Clones are off to a 4-0 start to the season, with wins over North Dakota, at No. 21 Iowa and vs. Arkansas State, opening league play on Saturday at Houston with a dominating 20-0 defensive performance.
- Iowa State is coached by Matt Campbell, who is in his ninth year in Ames after a strong run at Toledo. Campbell set the all-time ISU wins mark with the win last weekend at Houston. He has led the Clones to winning seasons in six of eight campaigns and is coming off a 7-6 season that saw ISU go 6-3 in the league and advance to the Liberty Bowl. Iowa State went 9-3 in 2020 including an 8-1 mark in league play and won the Fiesta Bowl.
- Campbell’s coordinators include DC Jon Heacock, a former head coach at Youngstown State, who also coached at YSU, Indiana, Kent State and Toledo. Offensive Coordinator Taylor Mouser also coaches TEs and is in his first year in the role. Tyler Roehl is the assistant head coach and coaches RBs.
- Jamie Pollard is the AD and is in his 20th year leading the program, making him the fourth-longest serving power-five AD in the nation. Pollard is in his final year on the NCAA D1 Men’s Basketball Committee in 2023-24 and is a two-time Sports Business Journal AD of the Year finalist. He had a hall of fame athletic career at Wisconsin-Oshkosh as a cross country and track letterwinner, earning XC All-America honors in 1986, winning the D3 Outdoor 5,000 meter title with a school record.

LAST MEETING

- The Bears had a four-game winning streak on Homecoming snapped with a 30-18 win in 2023 vs. Iowa State at McLane.
- Baylor fell behind 27-6 midway through the third quarter but couldn’t complete a comeback bid.
- QB Blake Shapen threw for 239 yards and connected with Monaray Baldwin for 117 yards and a score. Freshman Dawson Pendergrass had 37 yards rushing and two TDs, adding 39 yards receiving on three catches.

FACING CLONES IN 2021, 2022

- In the meeting in 2021 in Waco, the Bears posted a 31-29 win over No. 14 Iowa State.
- The win came despite Iowa State owning a 479-282 edge in total offense, a 216-123 margin in rushing yards and committing 85 fewer yards in penalties.
- It was Baylor’s fourth-consecutive win to open the season and foreshadowed a historic run to the Big 12 Championship and the 2022 Sugar Bowl.
- Baylor took a 21-13 lead at the half after scoring TDs on its first three series of the game. After the Cyclones narrowed the margin to 21-16 with a field goal midway through the third quarter, Trestan Ebner returned the ensuing kickoff 98 yards for a touchdown.
- Gerry Bohanon threw for 159 yards and two TDs and rushed for a score, with Abram Smith owning 47 yards on 10 carries. Tyquan Thornton and Ben Sims each had TD grabs and Dillon Doyle led a defense with nine tackles and two for a loss.
- Iowa State’s Brock Purdy threw for 263 yards and a TD, with Breece Hall going for 190 yards and two TDs on 27 carries.
- Baylor rolled to a 31-24 win over Iowa State in Ames to open league play in 2022, owning a 31-14 lead in the fourth quarter and using an efficient offensive attack to secure the win.
- The Bears got 238 yards and three TDs passing from Blake Shapen, and 78 yards and a rushing TD from freshman Richard Reese to pull away from the Cyclones and earn the first Baylor win in Ames since 2016.
- The Baylor defense forced two interceptions and held ISU to just 66 yards rushing, totaling four sacks, including two from linebacker Bryson Jackson.
- Shapen found Ben Sims, Dillon Doyle and Gavin Holmes for TD strikes, with Holmes going for three catches and 92 yards. His 38-yard scoring grab pushed Baylor’s lead to 31-14 with 9:37 left in the fourth quarter. The Cyclones cut the lead to 10 with a 75-play drive and added a field goal to set up an impactful on-side kick attempt in the closing seconds, which was grabbed by BU linebacker Matt Jones to clinch the win.

SERIES HISTORY

- Baylor leads the all-time series with Iowa State, 12-10, with the Bears owning a 7-4 lead in the series in Waco and ISU owning a 6-5 lead in the series in games played in Ames.
- Iowa State’s win in 2023 in Waco snapped a two-game BU win streak in the series. In the last meeting in Ames, the Bears posted a 31-24 win in 2022. Baylor has won seven of the last 11 meetings in the series.

SLUGGISH START DOOMS BEARS VS. NO. 22/22 BYU

- Baylor suffered a 34-28 loss vs. No. 22/22 BYU at McLane Stadium in a game that saw the Cougs go up 21-0 and 28-7 in the first half, scoring on each of their first four possession. Baylor fought back to cut the lead to 34-28 and had the ball with just under 90 seconds remaining but a game-clinching interception allowed the Cougs to escape with the win.
- The Bears got career-highs from Sawyer Robertson in completions (27), attempts (48), TDs (three) and yards (324), with the QB finding WR Josh Cameron for a career high 125 yards and two TDs on seven catches. Hal Presley chipped in eight catches for 82 yards. The Bears saw Bryson Washington rush 13 times for 31 yards.
- BYU QB Jake Retzlaff threw for 216 yards and two scores and Darius Lassiter had eight catches for 120 yards. Defensively, Keaton Thomas and seven stops and Treven Ma’ae had a career-high six tackles.

BAYLOR FALLS AT COLORADO

- Baylor fell in an overtime thriller at Colorado in its Big 12 opener, 38-31 in a wild game that saw the Buffs tie the game on a hail mary as regulation expired and then win it after a game-tying touchdown attempt saw BU fumble while crossing the goal line out of the endzone.
- Baylor opened up a 24-10 lead and was poised for a 31-10 lead but a dropped potential touchdown kept the Buffs in the game before half and cut the lead to 24-17. The Bears saw Colorado even the game late in the third quarter at 24-24 before responding on a 61-yard drive that finished with a Sawyer Robertson TD pass to Hal Presley with 5:34 left in the fourth quarter, owning a 31-24 lead. The Bears forced a key stop and took over at the Colorado 24-yard line with just over three minutes remaining but couldn’t connect on the game-clinching field goal, with the Buffs then driving as time expired for the hail mary attempt to force overtime. After scoring on their first possession, the Bears fumbled while crossing the endzone, with the ball skidding out of the back of the endzone and the Colorado fans rushing the field.
- Baylor totaled eight sacks, its most since the 2021 Sugar Bowl, and finished with 314 total yards of offense with Colorado throwing for 341 yards and totaling 432 yards of offense. Robertson threw two TDs on 148 yards passing, one to Presley and Monaray Baldwin. Shedeur Sanders threw for 341 yards and two scores and Travis Hunter caught seven balls for 130 yards.

BAYLOR VS. TOP-25 FOES

- Baylor will be facing No. 16/16 Iowa State in its third ranked matchup of the year.
- The Bears are looking for their first road top-25 win since 2015 at No. 4 Oklahoma State.
- BU is 59-199-6 against ranked foes all-time. In 2021, Baylor went 5-1 against ranked teams, including wins in four-straight chances, and three straight against top-eight foes.
- Under Coach Dave Aranda, the Bears are 5-14 vs. AP top-25 ranked foes.
- By comparison, former coach Art Briles lost 14 straight games against ranked foes to open his career, going 11-22 against ranked opponents in his career. Jim Grobe went 0-2 in his season in Waco, and Matt Rhule went 0-11 against ranked opponents at Baylor.

A BAYLOR WIN WOULD ...

- Make Baylor 3-3 on the year and 1-2 in conference play.
- Improve Coach Dave Aranda to 26-28 in his fifth year as the head coach of the Bears.
- Make the Bears 633-625-44 all-time.
- Give Baylor its third win the last four meetings over ISU and improve the BU series lead to 13-11.
- Make Coach Dave Aranda 3-2 vs. Iowa State.
- Give BU a sixth win over a ranked opponent under Aranda.
- Snap a nine-game streak of falling vs. ranked foes.
- Give Baylor its first road top-25 win since a 2015 win at No. 4 Oklahoma State.

BAYLOR SOARS PAST AIR FORCE WITH STRONG SECOND HALF

- Baylor used a strong second half to post a win in the non-conference finale vs. Air Force at McLane Stadium.
- The Bears turned the ball over with three fumbles in the first half and took a 6-3 lead into halftime vs. the Falcons, owning the ball for just five minutes on offense in the first half. BU bounced back to score 17 in the third and eight in the fourth to take a 31-3 win over AF.
- The Bears turned to QB Sawyer Robertson in relief of starter Dequan Finn, with Robertson turning in a career-high 248 yards passing on 18-of-24 passing. Robertson added a rushing TD and spread his 18 completions around to eight different receivers, with Josh Cameron going for five grabs for 63 yards and Ashtyn Hawkins catching four balls for 81 yards. TE Michael Trigg had four catches for 49 yards.
- Freshman RB Bryson Washington made his first career start and toted it 12 times for 106 yards and his first career TD. Dominic Richardson rushed nine times for 48 yards and Richard Reese rushed eight times for 47 yards and a TD.
- Defensively, Matt Jones had his sixth double-digit tackle game of his career with 11 stops, with Devyn Bobby equaling his career high with nine tackles. Jackie Marshall and Brooks Miller each forced fumbles and Corey Gordon Jr. intercepted his first career pass.

BAYLOR DEFENSE SETTING THE TONE

- Baylor has a season-opening shutout and a three-point showing vs. Air Force defensively, while also allowing only nine true points at No. 12 Utah, with the Utes totaling 14 points on a blocked field goal returned for a TD and a TD after recovering a fumble on the three yard line. In the loss vs. No. 22/22 BYU, the Cougars opened up strong with 21 first-quarter points and owned a 31-14 lead at halftime. The Bears stiffened defensively and held BYU to three points in the second half.
- The defense, under the direction of defensive play calling head coach Dave Aranda for the first time in his tenure, has now not allowed a TD in back-to-back home games for the first time since 2014.
- The last time Baylor went two games with three points or less in the same season was in 1989.
- The Bears allowed only 25 yards passing to Air Force, its lowest allowed since 1989.

BAYLOR FALLS AT NO. 11/11 UTAH

- The Bears fell for the first time on the year in a 23-12 loss at No. 11/11 Utah on Sept. 7 in Salt Lake City.
- Baylor got behind 23-0 in the first half as Utah used a blocked field goal returned for a touchdown and a fumble recovery on the three yard line to take an early, nearly untestable lead. The Bears fought back however on the strength of the Dave Aranda defense, outscoring Utah 12-0 over the remainder of the game and holding the Utes offensive attack to little success.
- Baylor couldn't sustain offensive success against the stout Utah defense, but saw Dawson Pendergrass rush nine times for 69 yards and Josh Cameron haul in his first career TD pass with a 47-yard strike in the third quarter.
- Defensively, Baylor's elite inside linebacker group of Keaton Thomas and Matt Jones each had double-digit tackle efforts, with Thomas going for a career-high 12.

BAYLOR HONORED 1974 SWC CHAMPS

- Baylor football honored the 1974 Southwest Conference Championship team during halftime of the Sept. 14 matchup vs. Air Force at McLane Stadium.
- The Bears welcomed members of the 1974 'Miracle on the Brazos' team for the clash with the Falcons at 6:30 p.m., with the game televised live on FS1 and presented by Premier ER + Urgent Care. The game will also serve as the Baylor Family Weekend and Salute to Service contest.
- "Honoring this legendary group will be a wonderful opportunity for the Baylor Family," Baylor Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics Mack Rhoades IV said. "The 50th anniversary of this historic team is a chance for us to celebrate the monumental impact they had on our university and community. I look forward to connecting with these Baylor greats and listening to their many personal stories about a team who left an undeniable mark on the Baylor fan base for generations to come."
- The Bears went 8-4 and 6-1 in league play to win the conference title, later advancing to the Cotton Bowl and finishing the season ranked No. 14 in the Associated Press poll. Led by Coach Grant Teaff in his third season, the Bears rallied from a 24-7 halftime deficit for a thrilling 34-24 comeback victory over Texas.
- In 1974, Baylor earned wins over No. 12 Oklahoma State, Florida State, No. 14 Arkansas, TCU, No. 12 Texas, No. 20 Texas Tech, SMU and Rice. Teaff was named AFCA Coach of the Year for a performance that saw the Bears go from winless in SWC play in 1973 to league champions in 1974. Six players from the team earned All-Southwest Conference honors, including All-Americans Aubrey Schulz (offensive line) and Derrel Luce (linebacker).

10TH ANNIVERSARY OF MCLANE STADIUM OPENING

- The game vs. Tarleton marked the 10th anniversary of the opening of McLane Stadium, a 45,140-seat facility sitting on the banks of the Brazos River. McLane Stadium opened on Aug. 31, 2014 with a 45-0 drubbing of SMU in front of 45,733, the first game after a 2013 Big 12 Conference Championship season and the first game of a 2014 Big 12 Conference Championship season.
- The 45-3 win over Tarleton actually marked the best defensive performance in the program since the 45-0 shutout of the 'Stangs in 2014.

STARTING QB BATTLE

- A story throughout the spring and into fall camp has been the battle for the starting quarterback job. The Bears returned junior QB Sawyer Robertson, who made four starts in his debut season in 2023 after transferring as a former four-star recruit from Mississippi State, and in the spring added former MAC Player of the Year Dequan Finn from Toledo.
- After the second scrimmage of fall camp and on Monday, Aug. 19, the Bears named Finn the starting quarterback. The 6-foot-2, 206-pound fifth-year senior played in 45 games over his career at Toledo, throwing for 7,074 yards with 63 TDs and 539 completions, also rushing for 1,840 yards and 26 TDs in his 32-start career, where he went 23-9 as a starter.
- Finn led Toledo to an 11-2 record in 2023 and an 8-0 mark in conference play, including 11 straight wins to end the regular season. A two-time invitee to the Manning Passing Academy, Finn was named 2023 MAC Championship Game MVP and the Boca Raton Bowl Offensive MVP a year after an all-conference season in a nine-win campaign as a junior.
- After an injury, the Bears turned to Robertson for the start vs. Air Force and Robertson threw for a career-high 248 yards on 18-of-24 passing with a rushing TD.

FRESHMEN SNAPS LED BIG 12 IN 2023

- Baylor played a very freshmen heavy roster in 2023 and that total plays out when sorting the number of snaps played by freshman on offense and defense by Big 12 schools in the regular season.
- The Bears played a total of 4,505 snaps on offense and defense from freshmen, which was tops in the Big 12 and ahead of second place Iowa State (3,327) and third-place Oklahoma (2,612). Kansas played only 126 snaps on both sides of the ball by freshmen, tops in the league.
- Conversely, Baylor played the third-fewest snaps by freshmen in the Big 12, with 5,159 snaps by seniors. Iowa State played the fewest senior snaps (3,214), followed by West Virginia (4,038). Oklahoma State played seniors 11,713 snaps, with Texas Tech playing 11,617 snaps by seniors.
- Baylor ranked seventh in the Big 12 in terms of offensive/defensive snaps by juniors (led by WVU) and sixth by sophomores (led by Iowa State).

- RB Richard Reese sits on the Hornung Award and Jet Award preseason watch lists.

FOURTH-MOST WINS IN TEXAS IN LAST 10+ YEARS

- Through week 5 of the 2024 season, Baylor has won 101 games since 2011, fourth-most among the state of Texas’ 12 FBS teams during that time.
- BU’s 101 wins in the last 10+ years are shy of Texas A&M (107), TCU (104), Houston (102), and ahead of Texas (100), SMU (84), UTSA (80), Texas Tech (80), North Texas (73), Rice (61), Texas State (50) and UTEP (46).

ROSTER FULL OF GRADUATES

- Baylor boasts 13 players who have already earned their undergraduate degrees, including Isaiah Davis (Abilene Christian), JaQues Evans (Western Kentucky), DeQuan Finn (Toledo), Caleb James (Rice), Matt Jones, Devin Lemear, Steve Linton (Texas Tech), Treven Ma’ae, Brooks Miller, Garmon Randolph, Chateau Reed, Colin Truett (UT Chattanooga) and Josh White.

BEST PUNTING GAME IN SCHOOL HISTORY

- In the loss at No. 11/11 Utah on Sept. 7, Baylor sophomore Palmer Williams charted the best game in program history for a punter.
- A native of Advance, N.C., Williams punted six times, with each going over 50 yards, including two downed inside the 20-yard line and one bouncing off the goalline pylon. He reset his career high four times, including punts of 57, 60, 76 and 79 yards. His average of 62.7 yards per punt marked a new single-game best in Baylor history.
- Williams became the first Bear with a 70+ yard punt since Drew Galitz did so on Sept. 16, 2017, and Williams now leads the nation with a 57.9-yard punt average for the season, more than seven yards better than the next ranked punter.

ARANDA TAKES OVER DEFENSE

- Coach Dave Aranda enters the 2024 season in his fifth season leading the Bears.
- Aranda has taken over defensive play calling duties and serves as the lead position coach for the inside linebackers in 2024. This came after he previously let his defensive coordinators call plays, including Ron Roberts and Matt Powledge. Powledge remains the defensive coordinator and is the safeties coach in 2024.
- Aranda led the LSU defense in 2019 as the Tigers posted a perfect 15-0 record and won the National Title with a 42-25 victory over Clemson in CFP National Championship Game.
- In six seasons as defensive coordinator at Power 5 schools from 2014-19, his defenses were ranked top-12 nationally in total yards five times. The units also ranked top-10 in scoring four times in seven years from 2013-19.

DISCIPLINE SHOWS IN PENALTY AVOIDANCE

- Under Coach Dave Aranda, the Bears have consistently been one of the best teams in the nation in avoiding penalties. In 2023, the Bears led the Big 12 in fewest penalty yards per game and rank sixth nationally.
- Baylor ranks fourth in the Big 12 in terms of fewest penalty yards per game from 2020-23 and third among teams that have been in the Big 12 all of those seasons.
- Baylor has ranked first or second in penalty yards per game over the last two seasons.

BEARS ROLL IN SEASON LID-LIFTER

- The Bears posted a 45-3 win over Tarleton in the season opener, which marked the 10th anniversary of the opening of McLane Stadium, which debuted on Aug. 31, 2014 with a 45-0 shutout of SMU. The defensive performance vs. Tarleton was Baylor’s best since the 45-0 win over SMU in 2014 in the lid-lifter for McLane Stadium.
- Baylor saw its defense hold Tarleton to nine first downs, 181 yards of total offense and just 80 yards passing. Offensively, QB Dequan Finn had a pair of TD passes and added a 39-yard rush in his debut, throwing for 192 yards. Ketron Jackson Jr., Michael Trigg and Ashtyn Hawkins each hauled in TD grabs, with sophomore RB Dawson Pendergrass adding his sixth career rushing TD. The Bears rolled to 442 yards of total offense, including 164 on the ground and 278 passing. Defensively, LB Matt Jones and DL Jackie Marshall each had seven tackles to lead the team and LB Keaton Thomas returned an interception for a TD, adding four stops.

BAYLOR LEADS NCAA IN FOOTBALL, BASKETBALL WINS

- Baylor athletics is in the midst of a historic run of success, including recent national titles in men’s and women’s basketball, and football coming off a Big 12 Conference Championship in 2021 and the 2022 Sugar Bowl.
- Since 2011, and as of the end of the 2023-24 athletics season, no other school can compete with Baylor’s run, as the Bears lead the nation in wins combined among football, and men’s and women’s basketball. Baylor has 46 more wins than the next closest school, UConn.

ADDING VIA THE PORTAL

- Coach Dave Aranda has added 22 players via the transfer portal for the 2024 season. It marked the second largest portal addition for the Bears under Aranda, as BU added 13 players via the portal for the 2023 season, which came a year after adding a limited number for the 2022 season.
- Baylor has a total of 39 new players in 2024, with 56.4 percent of that group coming in the from of transfers, including walk-ons.
- Portal additions include Michael Trigg (Ole Miss), Ashtyn Hawkins (Texas State), Dequan Finn (Toledo), Steve Linton (Texas Tech), Keaton Thomas (NE Miss. CC), Kendrick Simpkins (WKU), Lorando Johnson (Arkansas), Jamaal Bell (Nevada), Isaiah Davis (Morehead State), Cameren Jenkins (UNLV), Rara Dillworth (East Carolina), JaQuis Evans (WKU), Ronnie Mageo (Miss. Gulf Coast CC), Ka’Marii Landers (Copiah-Lincoln [Miss.] CC), Omar Aigbedion (Montana State), Sidney Fugar (South Carolina), Colin Truett (UT Chattanooga), Colton Thomasson (Texas A&M), Seth Weller (Redlands CC), Tonga Lolohea (Tyler JC), Elinus Noell III (Texas Southern) and Caleb James (Rice).

FOURTH OLDEST NON-KICKER IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL

- Baylor junior defensive lineman David Marshall is the fourth-oldest non-kicker in college football. Marshall joined the roster prior to the 2023 season after a junior college season at Navarro College. He previously served in the military.
- Only New Mexico’s Colby Brewer (age 29), Arkansas WR Monte Harrison (27) and Kansas LB Alex Raich (27) are older than Marshall in college football.

WELCOME TO THE FUDGE CENTER

- On Monday, Aug. 19, after a weekend move, the Baylor football program officially opened the Fudge Family Development Center, a sparkling new \$89.6 million dollar facility that houses all things Baylor football.
- On the strength of a \$15 million dollar gift from the Fudge Family, Baylor has built one of the best football development centers in the nation, housing state-of-the-art locker rooms, team meeting spaces, walk-thru rooms, coaching offices, athletic medicine and strength & conditioning spaces. In addition, the facility added 20 yards and revamped the Allison Indoor Facility.

PERSON > PLAYER

- A hallmark of Coach Dave Aranda’s philosophy in building a program is placing an importance on understanding that the person is more important than the player. This mantra is executed in everything the program touches on a daily basis. Throughout the football building, signage adorns the walls that emphasize, “better people make better players” and that Baylor will “win with character”.
- Aranda preaches that players focus on today and be authentically themselves in an effort to be comfortable and confident in their roles.

FEMALE LEADERSHIP IN PROGRAM

- Baylor is one of just three power-4 conference schools in the country with a lead female sport program administrator and a female director of operations, with Deputy AD Jovan Overshown leading the program and Landrie Walsh serving as Director of Football Operations.
- Only Kansas State, Maryland and Baylor qualify in this category, with Kacey Harper serving as the DFO for the Wildcats and Jill Shields as the SPA, and Colleen Sorem (SPA) and Annie Peppard (DFO) in those roles in Maryland.
- There are 11 female DFOs in college football and just six in power-4 conferences, including four in the Big 12.

HANKINS TAKING AIM AT RECORD BOOKS

- Baylor returns a three-year starter in the field-goal role, redshirt junior Isaiah Hankins. Hankins has been the starting kicker for the majority of the 2021 and 2023 seasons. He opened the year in the role in 2022 before veteran John Mayers - who finished his career ranked third all-time in points scored - regained the job that he had previously lost to Hankins in 2021.
- Hankins, a native of Little Rock, Ark., is a lefty kicker who enters his fourth year on campus ranked among the program leaders in a bevy of kicking categories. In BU career history, he checks in in the top 10 in points, field goals made, attempts, field-goal percentage, PAT kicks made, PAT attempts and PAT kick percentage. In Baylor single-season history, his 2021 season ranked him eighth in points scored, sixth in PATs made and PAT attempts, third in field-goals made and fourth in attempts in 2023.

NATION'S TOP-RANKED SPECIAL TEAMS IN 2023-24

- According to the 2023 and 2024 FEI Rankings via BCFToys.com, Baylor finished the year with the top-ranked special teams unit in college football. A combination of kickers Isaiah Hankins, kickoff specialist Jack Stone, punter Palmer Williams, long snappers Garrison Grimes and Dylan Schaub, and returners Josh Cameron, Jamaal Bell and Richard Reese, helped the Bears lead the FEI special teams rankings.
- FEI Special Teams Ratings (SFEI) are opponent-adjusted possession efficiency data representing the scoring advantage per non-garbage possession a team's non-offensive and non-defensive units would expect to have on a neutral field against an average opponent.

D-PENDY EMERGES

- In 2023, the Bears used true freshman running back Dawson Pendergrass extensively as his bruising nature of running and ability in the pass game proved to be productive. A 6-foot-2, 218-pound product of Alba, Texas, Pendergrass totaled 79 carries for 338 yards and a team-leading five TDs. He also caught 26 balls - fourth on the team - for 199 yards and two TDs.
- Among freshmen with 75 or more carries in 2023, Pendergrass ranked sixth in terms of total offensive grades.

REESE’S PIECES

- Baylor junior running back Richard Reese enters his third year in the backfield for the Bears and is quickly carving out a spot in Baylor history with his production.
- The Bellville, Texas, native sits No. 32 all-time in Baylor rushing history. He is coming off a season that saw him rush for two TDs and 306 yards, a year after he ranked fifth among college football freshman in rushing with 982 yards and 14 TDs. His 16 career rushing TDs ranks shy of the top-10, which starts with Bryce Petty and Devin Chafin with 21 TDs.
- Reese was selected to attend the 2024 Big 12 Media Days in Las Vegas in the preseason and is a key member of a running back room that also includes Baylor’s top two rushers from 2023, Dominic Richardson and Dawson Pendergrass, and dynamic redshirt freshman Bryson Washington.
- Reese shined in 2023 as a kick returner, taking a pair of kickoff to the house for TDs in the season finale vs. West Virginia.

LONG SNAPPER OF EXCELLENCE

- Baylor returns a three-year starter at long snapper in redshirt junior Garrison Grimes. After suffering a season-ending injury in week six at UCF, Grimes turned the job over to true freshman Dylan Schaub, a former high school linebacker who excelled in the role in place of Grimes, including a spot coming off the bench to snap the game-winning field goal of the UCF comeback win.
- Grimes is a clear leader of the team, is a 6-foot-4, 225-pound physical presence who has returned fully from injury to solidify the role again in 2024. Grimes boasts a tremendous ability as a punt coverage specialist and had a pair of fumble recoveries in a matchup with No. 4 Texas in 2023.
- Grimes, a native of American Fork, Utah, is the son of former Baylor offensive coordinator/tight ends coach Jeff Grimes. Jeff took over as the offensive coordinator at Kansas in the offseason and Garrison’s younger brother joined his father at Kansas as a walk-on defensive end.

WALK-ON TO WEAPON - THE JOSH CAMERON STORY

- Baylor junior wide receiver Josh Cameron is a veteran presence and leader for the BU wide outs. He came to the Bears as a walk-on receiver from powerhouse Cedar Park High School and quickly earned a role after his redshirt season.
- Cameron, a 6-foot-1, 218-pounder, is a noted tough-catch maker, with a real ability to make crucial, clutch catches while going across the middle. He has routinely been singled out as one of the best run blockers among the receiving corps while also showcasing an ability to be a surehanded option in punt returns.
- Largely limited to fair catches in his punt return role, when Cameron was unleashed in that role he excelled, including a 15.5 yard average in 2023 that saw him return a punt 70 yards. He enters the 2024 season in a position battle for the punt return job with speedy slot receivers like Jamaal Bell, Monaray Baldwin and Ashtyn Hawkins, but is also a preseason All-America selection by Phil Steele in the role.

GRAB YOUR SNAXX

- A welcome addition to the Baylor secondary in the offseason was the re-addition of redshirt senior cornerback Lorando Johnson.
- Johnson played his first three years at Baylor and was a key member of the cornerback rotation, before transferring to Arkansas for the 2023 season. Johnson, nicknamed “Snaxx” for his love of snacks, started all 12 games at Arkansas between corner and nickel, with career highs in tackles (29), TFLs (4), and PBUs (5).
- Johnson, a 6-foot, 192-pounder started the Sugar Bowl in 2021 for the Bears, during his redshirt freshman season, then started 12 games in 2022. He has the ability to play both cornerback and STAR and brings an experience, competitive energy and juice to the secondary that benefits the back-end of the defense.

BROTHER BEAR

- Baylor has a pair of brothers on its 2024 roster, including defensive backs Caden and Cameren Jenkins, and offensive lineman Kaden and Koltin Sieracki.
- The Jenkins are reunited after Cameren started his career in the safety rotation at UNLV last year and joins his 2023 Freshman All-America brother, Caden, who starred at cornerback in 2023.
- The Sierackis are reunited after Kaden played his last two years for the Bears, redshirting in 2022 and earning a starting job in 2023. Koltin was a highly recruited prospect out of The Woodlands and is currently a true freshman who is fighting for time at center.

JONES, THOMAS LEAD INSIDE LINEBACKERS

- A story of spring and fall camp has been the play of Baylor’s inside linebackers. Led by sixth-year senior Matt Jones, and future standout JUCO transfer Keaton Thomas, the Bears are positioned to have that group be a unit of strength in 2024.
- Jones, a 6-foot-4, 245-pounder, has been a three-year starter for the Bears, including last two years at inside linebacker and one year at outside linebacker during the 2021 Big 12 Championship season. In 2023, Jones started all 12 games at inside linebacker and led the team with 82 tackles and 11.5 tackles for a loss. He added three sacks, five pass break-ups and one QB hurry with two 10+ tackle games.
- Since 2013, Jones 11.5 TFL were the fifth-most by a Baylor ILB, behind only Taylor Young’s 13.5 TFL in 2015, Eddie Lackey’s 13.0 in 2013, Terrel Bernard’s 12.5 TFL in 2021 and Bryce Hager’s 12.0 in 2014.
- It took Baylor very little time to recognize that Thomas had star potential opposite Jones at the linebacker level. Thomas was a choice to attend Big 12 Media Days, along with Jones, due to his clear vocal and physical leadership, in addition to this ability to change the game with a quick-twitch nature and athleticism. A former walk-on safety at West Virginia who transitioned to Northeast Mississippi Community College, Thomas, a 6-2, 224 pound native of Jacksonville, Fla., had 107 tackles - second most in junior college football - in 2023 as a redshirt freshman.
- This position group, coached by Dave Aranda and Jamar Chaney, also boasts several additional talented options, including redshirt sophomore Jeremy Evans, redshirt sophomore Carmello Jones, senior transfer Rara Dillworth, redshirt senior Josh White, and a freshman options in Kyland Reed.

REVAMPING TIGHT ENDS

- From 2021-23 Baylor’s tight ends were coached by its offensive coordinator, Jeff Grimes, making him one of a handful of OCs nationally to also coach tight ends. This has led to a large amount of talent in the tight end room at the fingertips of new OC Jake Spavital.
- The Bears return several key players in the rotation at TE in 2024, including sophomore Matthew Klopfenstein and junior Kelsey Johnson. In addition, the Bears have welcomed dynamic talent Michael Trigg to the roster. A 6-foot-4, 246 pound fourth-year junior, Trigg transferred in the spring from Ole Miss and Southern Cal, as a former four-star, top-100 recruit. Trigg is a former Mackey Tight End of the Year Award Watch List member.
- In addition to Trigg, Klopfenstein and Johnson, the Bears have redshirt freshman Hawkins Polley as a key option, with Polley playing in two games that included a touchdown grab in an overtime clash with Houston. Veteran Gavin Yates has taken to the new Spavital system and gives the Bears great options at the up-back role, in addition to tight end sets and as a special teams force.

YOUNG DB TALENT

- Baylor had a smorgasbord of freshman talent on the field in 2023 and none shined more than a pair of freshmen corner backs, including Caden Jenkins and Carl Williams IV.
- Jenkins earned All-America honors while making seven starts. The 6-foot-1, 177-pounder had 37 tackles, three interceptions, three PBUs and two fumble recoveries.
- Williams emerged quickly as a leader for the defense, playing in all 12 games with five starts at STAR. He ranked No. 38 in the nation among all qualified cornerbacks in pass coverage. He came in as a cornerback and shifted full time to the STAR role midway through the year.
- Beyond Jenkins and Williams the Bears are boosted by Levar Thornton Jr., a redshirt freshman who stands 6-foot-3, Reggie Bush II, Tevin Williams III, and the return of senior Lorando Johnson, who started 12 games at CB for the Bears in 2022 before starting 12 games for Arkansas in 2023. Miami (Fla.) transfer Isaiah Dunson is working his way back from injury, and started the season opener in 2023.
- At safety, juniors Devin Lemear and Devyn Bobby have been key starters on the back end of the defense, and Chateau Reed had a breakout season where he started all 12 games at cornerback in 2023.

MCLANE STADIUM ENHANCEMENTS

- Baylor has enhanced the nation’s best game stadium, McLane Stadium, in the offseason, completing an eight-figure project, including installation of upgraded and additional videoboards, the construction of new production control rooms, and the addition of a premium hospitality structure.
- The LED ribbon board displays and the main videoboard display, which were original to McLane Stadium since its construction in 2014, have been upgraded to enhance both functionality and the visual elements of the fan experience. A high-quality video display is being added to the back of the main videoboard structure to add revenue opportunities and enhance the South Plaza experience on game days.
- The south end zone of McLane will become even more of a focal point during games, as a premium hospitality clubhouse will be added beneath the video board, providing a one-of-a-kind experience along with a Berm-view of the action.
- The construction of new production control rooms on the east side of the stadium will allow Baylor to produce multiple broadcasts at one time and fully centralize operations.

DEEP RB ROOM

- Baylor's running back room is loaded with talent, including 2022's leading rusher, Richard Reese, who had 14 TDs as a freshman, and a pair of backs who ranked first and second on the team in rushing yards, senior Dominic Richardson and sophomore Dawson Pendergrass.
- Redshirt freshman Bryson Washington has also emerged as a key member of the room, after playing in three games in 2023 to maintain a redshirt and following an injury in fall camp that limited his ability to make a splash, despite being a story of spring practice.
- The tailbacks are set to shine in an new offense that shifts from the grind-it-out style of 2021-23, opening up the offensive attack under new offensive coordinator Jake Spavital, who while at his last stop in 2023 at Cal, helped Jayden Ott to a prolific season.

JACKIE MARSHALL BACK TO FULL HEALTH

- One of the most impactful injuries for the Bears in 2023 came in the form of defensive lineman Jackie Marshall, who went down during the spring and missed the 2023 season.
- Marshall, who played linebacker as a redshirt freshman in 2022 and earned praise as a future standout, was shifting full time to the defensive line to rave reviews in the spring before the 2023 season.
- Since returning from injury in the spring of 2024, Marshall has been a key member of the defensive line. An athletic 6-foot-3, 290-pounds, Marshall has worked hard to add strength to his frame and is positioned to have a big season as a redshirt junior, with the possibility of him getting a medical redshirt for his missed 2023 season.
- As a redshirt freshman in 2022, Marshall had 22 tackles, two for a loss and one fumble recovery, owning two QB hurries and three PBUs in 12 of 13 games.

SLEW OF ELITE WR OPTIONS

- The Bears are boosted by a group of standout wide receiver options in 2024, including key returners in Monaray Baldwin, Ketron Jackson Jr., Hal Presley and Josh Cameron. That group of four have played significant football and been key targets throughout their careers, with Baldwin, Jackson and Presley working through injuries over the 2022-23 seasons and Cameron establishing himself as a weapon after coming to the Bears as a walk-on from powerhouse Cedar Park High School.
- In addition to the veteran returnees, the Bears have added weapons in Ashtyn Hawkins, a transfer from Texas State, where he set the program standard in receiving, Nevada's all-time leading kickoff returner Jamaal Bell, and freshman standout Jadon Porter.
- Additional options at WR include Cameron Bonner, Jonah Burton - who was a story of 2023 fall camp and earned starting roles in 2023. True freshman Jadon Porter has also made a splash early in his career and has earned significant praise from WR coach Dallas Baker.

OFFENSIVE LINE SEASONING

- The Baylor offensive line is looking to regain a pride point in the program after a season that saw the Bears play a bevy of youthful talent in 2023. BU returns four offensive line starters, welcomes some key transfers, and has created some talented depth in the offseason.
- From 2023, Baylor returns starting sophomore center Coleton Price, starting tackles in senior Campbell Barrington and sophomore Alvin Ebosole, and has competition at guard including junior Ryan Lengyel and transfers in junior Omar Aigbedion and junior Sidney Fugar. Freshman Koltin Price is in the mix at center and his brother, sophomore Kaden, was a key starter in 2023, seeing time at tackle and guard.
- The Bears have also added a transfer option at tackle in Colton Thomasson and center Colin Truett, with freshmen who redshirted in 2023, including Sean Thompkins and Isaiah Robinson, providing the line some depth.
- Baylor had one of the nation's best offensive lines in 2021 when it won the Big 12 Championship and a productive group in 2022. With four freshman starting throughout the season in 2023, the Bears have gained valuable experience and have added strength to the group in terms of size.

YOUTHFUL CORE RETURNS

- The Bears returned a bevy of youthful talent from a roster that got significant experience in 2023.
- Among the players who played as true freshman and enter 2024 as sophomores, including CB Caden Jenkins, S Carl Williams IV, S DJ Coleman, RB Dawson Pendergrass, TE Matthew Klopfenstein, WR Micah Gifford, DL Brendan Bett, DL Trey Wilson, LS Dylan Schaub, CB LeVar Thornton Jr., RB Bryson Washington, CB Tay'Shawn Wilson, S Jacob Redding, TE Hawkins Polley, and P Palmer Williams.
- The Bears also return three-year sophomores that saw significant action in 2023, including CB Reggie Bush II, S Corey Gordon Jr., LB Carmello Jones, LB Jeremy Evans, OLB Kyler Jordan, DL Devonte Tezino, C Coleton Price, OL Kaden Sieracki and OL Alvin Ebosole.

HALL MAKES 40 UNDER 40 LIST

- Baylor first-year associate head coach / running backs coach Khenon Hall was honored as a member of the Dave Campbell's Texas Football 40 Under 40 List, honoring the top up-and-coming football coaches in the state.
- Hall is a recruiting dynamo who joined the Bears after two seasons on the staff at SMU, where he was the running backs coach.
- Hall is a product of Dallas South Oak Cliff High School and boasts previous coaching stops at Texas Southern, Illinois State and New Mexico.

WINNING THE TURNOVER BATTLE

- Baylor has forced more turnovers than it has allowed in 53 games under head coach Dave Aranda.
- BU has 85 takeaways (55 INTs, 29 FR) and 65 giveaways (38 INTs, 28 FL) in 52 games under Aranda.
- Baylor has scored 16 non-offensive touchdowns in 53 games under Aranda – six kickoff returns (Bell, Reese x 2, Ebner x 3), six interception returns (Pitre x 2, Thomas, McCarty, Walcott, Woods), one punt return (Holmes) and four fumble returns (Vaughns, Jenkins, Hall, Woods).

RANKED IN 10 OF LAST 14 SEASONS

- Baylor has been ranked in the AP Top 25 in 10 of 14 seasons since 2010, after going 17 years between national rankings (1993-2010). BU has been ranked in 23 of 25 spots since 2013 (exceptions No. 1 and No. 23).
- Baylor was ranked or receiving votes in 10 of 16 polls in 2022 and was receiving votes in the 2023 preseason poll.

PALMER WILLIAMS FOR AN ENCORE

- A strength of the nation's top-ranked special teams unit in 2023 was the emergence of freshman punter Palmer Williams. A 6-foot-2, 201-pound native of Advance, N.C., joined the program as the No. 3 punter recruit in the nation out of high school. He punted 37 times for 43.08 yards per punt with a long 53 and six punts of 50 or more yards.
- In 2023, he downed eight punts inside the 20-yard line and allowed just one touchback, with 13 forced fair catches. A total of 20 of his 35 punts were either fair caught or downed inside the 20-yard line.

SPRING ENROLLEES

- A total of 19 of Baylor's newcomers arrived on campus to participate in spring practice.
- Among the spring enrollees included transfers Michael Trigg (Ole Miss), Ashtyn Hawkins (Texas State), Dequan Finn (Toledo), Steve Linton (Texas Tech), Keaton Thomas (NE Miss. CC), Kendrick Simpkins (Western Kentucky), Lorando Johnson (Arkansas), Jamaal Bell (Nevada), Cameren Jenkins (UNLV), JaQues Evans (Western Kentucky) and Omar Aigbedion (Montana State).
- Freshman early enrollees included Kyler Beaty, Nate Bennett, Kris Wokomah, Kyland Reed, Brock Jackson, Koltin Sieracki and Jadon Porter.
- Several transfers have enrolled during the summer, including Rara Dillworth (East Carolina), Ronnie Mageo (Miss. Gulf Coast CC), Sidney Fugar (South Carolina), Colin Truett (UT Chattanooga), Colton Thomasson (Texas A&M), Tonga Lolohea (Tyler JC) and Elinus Noell III (Texas Southern).

STAFF ADDITIONS

- Baylor had a productive offseason in terms of adding to its coaching staff. The Bears have a new offensive coordinator in Jake Spavital, the former Texas State head coach and most recently the OC at Cal, with previous stops at Texas A&M and West Virginia.
- Baylor added a recruiting dynamo in Khenon Hall, the associate head coach and recruiting coordinator, after he previously led SMU's recruiting efforts. New offensive line coach Mason Miller comes to the Bears from Tarleton, where he was the offensive coordinator and was a former head coach at McMurray. Miller is from the Air Raid tree, having served as the offensive line coach under Coach Mike Leach at Mississippi State and Washington State.
- The Bears have also added a new tight ends coach in longtime state of Texas assistant Jarrett Anderson, who served as the OC and longtime assistant at TCU, and one of the nation's best defensive line coaches in Inoke Breckterfield, who helped Washington to a 14-1 season in 2023 while leading that defensive front, and reunites Breckterfield with Coach Dave Aranda, who had him on his staff as the DC at Wisconsin.
- Baylor also welcomed Jamar Chaney as the inside linebackers coach after he coached linebackers at Western Kentucky. It is a key role as Aranda is the defensive play caller and leading the inside linebackers room.
- Beyond the on-field staff, the Bears have added coaching veterans to the quality control and graduate assistant staff, including former on-field coaches in Joe D'Orazio - from Maine - Weston Glaser - from Sam Houston - Mark Scott - who will lead special teams after serving in assistant role at Houston - and Kyle Segler - from ULM. GAs include former NFL wide out and Georgia staffer C.J. Germany, Elijah McQueen and former NFL offensive lineman Craig Watts. In addition, former college basketball player Duke DaRe is on the QC staff, along with returning QCs in Rhett Holcomb, Ryan Pollard and Joe Ludwig.
- Off the field, veteran administrator Jeff Grigus was elevated to Chief of Staff, Landrie Walsh directs all operations and the Bears added Callie Cameron as Director of Player Personnel, Earl Chevalier as Director of Player Development and Operations and former LSU safety Ed Paris as Assistant Director of Player Personnel.
- The Bears revamped their approach to NIL in the offseason, starting with a strong approach to retaining its youthful talent in November. Behind the addition of NIL General Manager David Kaye - a longtime administrator at Baylor - and Keava Soil-Cormier moving into the Associate AD for NIL Administration & Pro Relations role, the Bears have quickly emerged as an industry leader in the NIL space, working alongside the Baylor collective, GXG.

BEARS LAUNCH BAYLOR+

- Baylor Athletics has launched Baylor+, the official content platform for the Bears. It will offer fans an insider's look into the experiences of student-athletes and coaches as well as the compelling stories that shape Baylor Athletics. Baylor+ will feature exciting coverage of the current teams in Waco, while celebrating beloved Bears' Legends and pivotal moments from the past.
- Through an exciting new partnership with Sport & Story, the leading provider of creative storytelling content in college athletics, Baylor+ is unlike anything Baylor fans have experienced before. The platform will be the home for an extensive range of original content covering all of Baylor's sports programs, with behind-the-scenes access, captivating interviews, never-before-seen archival material and historical documentary films, as well as news and information.

FOOTBALL HISTORY

- The Bears are entering their 123rd season of football in 2024. The Bears have fielded a varsity team every year since 1899, save the 1906, 1943 and 1944 seasons.
- BU has won nine conference titles, including in 2021, with three Big 12 Championships and six Southwest Conference Championships.
- Baylor's first season came in 1899-1900, a 5-1 record under Coach R.H. Hamilton that included two wins over Toby's Business.

ONE STANDARD. ONE ACCORD.

- Baylor unveiled a mission statement under Vice President and Director of Intercollegiate Athletics Mack Rhoades in the fall of 2018, "One Standard. One Accord", which is centered on the distinct purpose of *Preparing Champions for Life* through academic achievement, athletic success, spiritual growth and character formation.

ABOUT BAYLOR

- Baylor is situated on a 1,000-acre campus located on the Brazos River in Waco, Texas, and was chartered in 1845 by the Republic of Texas through the efforts of Baptist pioneers. It is the oldest continually operating university in Texas. Baylor is a R1 Institution according to the Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Education

Dawson Pendergrass had a pair of touchdown rushes and Monaray Baldwin had 117 yards receiving but Baylor football could not complete a second-half comeback, falling to Iowa State Cyclones, 30-18 on Saturday, before a Homecoming crowd of 43,528.

Pendergrass, the Baylor standout freshman running back, was stopped on fourth down with just over four minutes left, thwarting the potential comeback bid and allowing Iowa State to close out the game with its first win over the Bears in the last three meetings.

Pendergrass's second TD of the day pulled the Bears within nine, 27-18, but the two-point conversion failed and then Iowa State capped a time-consuming drive with a 30-yard field goal by Chase Contreraz that gave the Cyclones a 12-point lead.

Baylor made things interesting, driving inside ISU's 25-yard line, but Pendergrass was stopped short of the first-down marker on a fourth-and-three from the 23.

Iowa State cruised in the first half, going up 17-0 on a Rocco Becht 18-yard TD pass to Jayden Higgins, a one-yard run by Cartevious Norton and the first of three field goals by Contreraz, this one from 42 yards.

After Devyn Bobby picked off a Becht pass, the Bears got on the Board just before the half on an eight-yard run by Pendergrass, who finished with 76 yards combined rushing and receiving on 11 touches. Isaiah Hankins' extra point was blocked, leaving the score at 17-6 going into intermission.

The Cyclones took their biggest lead of the game, 27-6, on a 49-yard TD run by Norton and a Contreraz field goal from 45 yards.

But Baylor answered with a pair of second-half touchdowns on a 69-yard pass from Blake Shapen to Baldwin and a five-yard run by Pendergrass. The Bears' comeback fell short with two failed two-point conversions and the late stop by the Cyclones.

Shapen completed 24-of-41 passes for 239 yards and one touchdown with his first interception of the season. Baldwin had another big game with six catches for 117 yards.

Becht threw for 238 yards for the Cyclones, while Eli Sanders was the game's leading rusher with 90 yards on 14 totes.

POSTGAME NOTES

- **Dawson Pendergrass** rushed for two TDs, leading the team with four in 2023.
- **Devyn Bobby** had a career-high 11 tackles, the most for a Bear in 2023, and an interception.
- **Brooks Miller** charted a career-high seven tackles and his first fumble recovery.
- **Cooper Lantz** forced his first career fumble.
- **Blake Shapen** threw for 239 yards and a TD on 24-of-41 passing.
- Baylor moves at 50-43-4 all-time on homecoming.

Blake Shapen completed 19-of-26 passes for 238 yards and three touchdowns to lead 17th-ranked Baylor to a 31-24 win over Iowa State in its Big 12 opener at a packed Jack Trice Stadium in Ames, Iowa.

Already up by double digits, the Bears (3-1, 1-0) threw what looked to be the knockout punch with 9:37 left in the fourth quarter when Shapen connected with a wide-open Gavin Holmes for a 38-yard touchdown pass on a flea flicker. But, the Cyclones (3-1, 0-1) made things interesting after scoring 10 unanswered points on two late scoring drives before Baylor's Matt Jones recovered an onside kick with 55 seconds left to snuff out the comeback bid.

Converting twice on fourth down, the Bears marched 77 yards on 12 plays in their opening drive and scored on Shapen's 12-yard TD pass to Ben Sims to take an early 7-0 lead. ISU answered with a 12-play drive of its own to knot the tally at 7-7, but Baylor showed no signs of slowing down as Shapen connected with Hal Presley on a 40-yard strike to set up an eventual 24-yard FG from John Mayers to go ahead, 10-7.

Shapen found Holmes over the middle for a 36-yard gain on the first of a nine-play, 70-yard scoring drive. On third-and-goal from the 1, Shapen lofted a pass to linebacker Dillon Doyle for the Iowa City native's third-career offensive touchdown and first of the 2022 season, making it 17-7.

After exchanging three-and-outs, Iowa State responded with an eight-play, 63-yard drive to close within three, 17-14, in the final minutes of the first half. But, on the second play of the third quarter, Devin Neal snagged a tip-drill interception, Baylor's first of the year, to set the tone for the second half. It was Baylor's first of two second-half interceptions, in addition to a forced fumble at the goal line that was eventually overturned as ISU recovered in the end zone for a TD.

Richard Reese sprinted for a 19-yard touchdown to push BU's lead back to double digits at 24-14 with 6:05 left in the third, then the apparent knockout blow came as Holmes hauled in the flea flicker with no defenders within 20 yards of him in the end zone.

Iowa State's scoring drives of 75 and 71 yards pulled the Cyclones within a touchdown, but the clock ran out on the Cyclones as Baylor grabbed its first conference victory of the year. Reese led the Bears with 78 yards on 21 carries, while BU shut down the Iowa State run game with just 66 yards.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Baylor collected its first win at Iowa State since the 2016 season.
- Baylor is now 8-0 under head coach Dave Aranda when scoring a touchdown on its first possession.
- The Bears are now 12-3 when scoring first under Aranda.
- BU tallied a season-high four sacks and collected its first two interceptions of the season.
- **Blake Shapen** tied his career-high with three TD passes, also done in the 2021 Big 12 Championship Game.
- **Richard Reese** rushed a career-high 21 times for 78 yards and a touchdown.
- **Ben Sims** caught his 11th career TD, a program record for tight ends.

McLANE STADIUM



- McLane Stadium has served as the home of Baylor football since the 2014 season, when the Bears moved over from historic Floyd Casey Stadium, their home for the previous 64 seasons.
- The Bears own a 39-25 record at McLane Stadium and a 382-246-27 record overall at home over a span of 118 seasons.
- The season attendance record was set in 2014, the debut of McLane Stadium, when an average of 46,710 attended each game, with a total of 280,257. A total of 318,621 attended seven games during the 2019 season.
- The single-game record for attendance came in 2015, a matchup with Oklahoma that saw 49,875 attend at McLane Stadium.
- Under Coach Dave Aranda, the Bears own a 13-10 record at McLane Stadium.
- The stadium was built on a 93-acre site that includes 2,150 on-site parking spaces, 334 tailgating spots with 256 set for power and cable, 18 boat slips for Sailgating on the Brazos River and the Umphrey Pedestrian Bridge, connecting the stadium to Baylor’s picturesque campus.

- The stadium seats 45,140 and includes six founder’s suites, 36 suites, 79 loge boxes, club seating for 1,200, 200 concession points of sale and five retail stores.
- The Baylor locker room is 50 yards long and 17 yards wide.

STADIUM HISTORIES

- The 2013 season was Baylor’s 64th and final year of football at the 50,000-seat Floyd Casey Stadium. BU closed its run at the facility by winning its first Big 12 championship with a 30-10 victory over No. 23 Texas in the final game of the regular season.
- Originally named Baylor Stadium, the structure was built in 1950 after a bond sales program raised \$1.5 million for construction costs. The first game played in the new stadium was Sept. 30, 1950, a 34-7 Baylor victory over Houston.
- In 1989, the stadium was renamed Floyd Casey Stadium after longtime University supporter and trustee Carl B. Casey and his wife Thelma contributed \$5 million of an \$8 million renovation project in honor of his father, Floyd (the name change was officially announced at halftime of the 1988 Homecoming game).

- Prior to the building of Baylor Stadium in 1950, several playing sites were used by the Bears. Baylor’s first football squad took the field in 1899, but no records are available to prove where it played. Old newspaper clippings and yearbook articles only indicate the first three seasons were played on an extremely rough field close to the school.
- From 1902 to 1925, with the exception of 1906 when football was banned on campus because it was deemed too violent, the Bears played most of their games at Carroll Field, an on-campus facility (an unknown number of games were also played at the old Cotton Palace during this period).
- The Bears played at the Cotton Palace from 1926-29 before returning to Carroll Field from 1930-35. The team moved off the main campus for good in 1936 when it began calling the newly built Waco Stadium home.
- Waco Stadium was renamed Municipal Stadium in 1942, and it was where Baylor played through 1949 except for a break from 1943-44 because of the war effort.

Making his Baylor debut, **Dequan Finn** threw two touchdowns and ran for another to lead the Bears to a season-opening 45-3 win over the Tarleton Texans Saturday night on the 10th anniversary of the first game played at McLane Stadium.

Baylor exploded for 21 first-quarter points, opening the scoring on a 39-yard option run by Finn. He went to the air for the second TD of the night, hooking up with **Ashtyn Hawkins** for a 32-yard strike. Another newcomer, linebacker **Keaton Thomas**, picked off a pass over the middle and returned it 35 yards for a touchdown, the first INT return for a TD by the Baylor defense in two years.

Sophomore running back **Dawson Pendergrass** was a workhorse on the night with 62 yards on 17 carries and a touchdown that capped off a nine-play, 66-yard drive to make it 28-0. The Bears had a chance to put it away late in the first half, but Finn was intercepted in the end zone. Tarleton missed a scoring opportunity in the final minute of the half after a shanked 24-yard field goal attempt left the score at 28-0 going into intermission.

The Texans got on the board with a FG on their first drive of the second half, but Baylor answered mid-way through the period with a 17-yard pass from Finn to **Michael Trigg**, the fourth newcomer to find pay dirt on the evening.

Three points from lefty kicker Isaiah Hankins and a late **Ketron Jackson Jr.** touchdown from **Sawyer Robertson** capped off the lid-lifting victory for BU.

POSTGAME NOTES

- BU is now 82-37-4 all-time in season openers, including 4-1 under fifth-year head coach Dave Aranda, and 92-27-4 in home openers.
- On the 10th Anniversary of McLane Stadium, Baylor held Tarleton to just three points, the fewest allowed since Aug. 31, 2014 vs. SMU -- the first game played at McLane Stadium.
- Four of BU's six touchdowns were scored by newcomers -- **Dequan Finn**, **Ashtyn Hawkins**, **Keaton Thomas** and **Michael Trigg**.
- This was the first time that Baylor had held a team scoreless in the first half since the 2022 Sugar Bowl vs. Ole Miss.
- 11 different receivers caught a pass on the night.
- Junior RB **Richard Reese** moved into 35th on the Baylor all-time rushing list with 1,356 career rushing yards.
- Junior DL **Jackie Marshall** posted a career-high seven tackles, including four solo, in his first action since suffering a season-ending injury in 2023.
- Redshirt sophomore LB **Keaton Thomas** recorded seven total tackles and returned an interception for a touchdown, BU's first pick-six since Oct. 29, 2022.

Falling behind 23-0 in the first 25 minutes of the game, Baylor rallied to make it a two-score game in the third quarter before falling to the 11th-ranked Utah Utes, 23-12, Saturday afternoon at Rice-Eccles Stadium in Salt Lake City.

The preseason Big 12 favorite, Utah jumped out to an early 14-0 lead on a pair of first-quarter touchdown passes by Cameron Rising, the second of which followed a strip-sack by the Utes' defense that was recovered at the Bears' 3-yard line.

Utah tacked on a 30-yard field goal by Cole Becker late in the first and then went up 23-0 when Spencer Fano blocked a field goal attempt by Baylor's **Isaiah Hankins** that was returned 77 yards for a touchdown by Tao Johnson.

With a chance to seemingly put it away after BU failed on a fourth-down play near midfield, Utah picked up a couple first downs before Becker missed wide right on an attempt from 45 yards. The Utes lost Rising with 1:47 left in the first half after an apparent hand injury.

Getting the ball back with only 29 seconds left in the half, the Bears used a 15-yard personal foul penalty to get in range for Hankins' 44-yarder as time expired, cutting the deficit to 23-3 at the half.

With Utah struggling on offense after freshman Isaac Wilson subbed in for Rising, Baylor put together an 11-play, 70-yard third-quarter drive, kickstarted by a 46-yard run by sophomore running back **Dawson Pendergrass**. Hankins' second field goal, this time from 40 yards out, made it a 23-6 game with 6:23 left in the third quarter.

After a three-and-out by the Utes, things got interesting with another 70-yard drive by the Bears that ended with **Dequan Finn's** 47-yard TD pass to **Josh Cameron**, the first touchdown of the junior receiver's career. Trailing by 11 with just over a quarter to go, Baylor went for two but couldn't convert as Finn threw behind **Ketron Jackson Jr.**

In a critical fourth-quarter drive, Utah chewed more than seven minutes off the clock but Becker missed another field goal with 3:40 to go. Needing to score twice, BU picked up a couple first downs and got into opposing territory, but a 4th-and-14 play came up short.

Held to negative yards in the first quarter and just 48 total yards of offense in the first half, Baylor finished with 223 yards for the game and only lost the first down battle 15-12. The Utes had less than 100 yards in the second half, with most of it coming on their final time-consuming drive in the fourth quarter.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Baylor held Utah to just 95 total yards of offense in the second half, including just four yards in the third quarter and zero first downs.
- Redshirt sophomore LB **Keaton Thomas** led the Bears with a career-high 12 tackles.
- Senior LB **Matt Jones** also reached double digits with 10 stops, the fifth double-digit output of his career.
- Junior DL **Jackie Marshall** recorded his first-career sack.
- Junior WR **Josh Cameron** scored his first-career touchdown on a career-long 47-yard reception.
- Sophomore P **Palmer Williams** punted six times for 376 total yards, an average of 62.7 yards, a school record.
- Williams booted three punts over 60 yards, including a 76-yarder and a 79-yarder, and tied a single-game school record with six punts of longer than 50 yards.

Bouncing back from a turnover-plagued first half, the Baylor Bears scored twice in the first seven minutes of the third quarter and blew out the Air Force Academy Falcons, 31-3, Saturday night before a crowd of 46,212 at McLane Stadium.

Sawyer Robertson, subbing for an injured **Dequan Finn**, threw for a career-high 248 yards and added a six-yard TD run as the Bears (2-1) picked up a win in their final tune-up before Big 12 play. Redshirt freshman running back **Bryson Washington** made his first-career start and rushed for 106 yards and a touchdown on 12 carries, adding another 23 yards on one reception. Scoring on a 28-yard TD run, **Richard Reese** had 47 yards on eight totes, while **Ashtyn Hawkins** tallied 81 yards on four catches.

With Air Force (1-2) using its patient triple-option attack to keep the ball for 24 minutes in the first half, Baylor ran just 23 offensive plays and was clinging to a 6-3 lead on a pair of **Isaiah Hankins** field goals despite three fumbles.

BU had an early chance when **Caleb Parker** blocked a punt that **Josh White** recovered at the Falcons' 28-yard line. But, Robertson was dropped for a four-yard loss on third down, settling for a Hankins 46-yarder that opened the scoring.

Air Force got a game-tying field goal that capped a 16-play, 65-yard drive late in the second quarter. The two sides exchanged turnovers in the last couple of minutes of the half, with **Devyn Bobby** recovering a fumble that was forced by **Jackie Marshall**.

After a 22-yard pickup on a pass from Robertson to **Josh Cameron**, Hankins booted one just inside the left upright to give the Bears a 6-3 halftime lead.

In a dominant third quarter, Baylor took command with TD runs of 19 and six yards by Washington and Robertson, and added another Hankins field goal for a 23-3 lead. The Falcons turned it over on downs late in the third quarter before the Bears scored their final points of the night on Reese's 28-yard scamper and a two-point conversion run by Robertson.

POSTGAME NOTES

- The Baylor defense held Air Force to just a field goal, marking the first time that BU has not allowed a touchdown in back-to-back home games since 2014 (SMU & Northwestern State).
- The effort marked the first time since the 1989 season when Baylor has had two games with three points allowed or fewer in the same season.
- BU limited AF to just 25 yards passing, the fewest allowed by a BU defense since Sept. 23, 1989 vs. Kansas (seven).
- Junior QB **Sawyer Robertson** made his first start of the year and threw for a career-high 248 yards, while adding a six-yard rushing touchdown.
- Redshirt freshman RB **Bryson Washington** made the first start of his career and finished with 106 rushing yards on 12 carries and one touchdown.
- Senior LB **Matt Jones** racked up 11 tackles for his sixth-career double-digit tackle performance.
- Junior S **Devyn Bobby** recorded nine tackles to match his career best and recovered a fumble for the first time in his career.
- BU's blocked punt in the first quarter was its first since 2018 vs. Oklahoma State.
- This was the first time since 2021 vs. Texas Southern that the Bears did not punt in a game.
- Redshirt junior K **Isaiah Hankins** moved into a tie for third place on Baylor's all-time field goals made leaderboard with 38.

It took a miracle, but the Colorado Buffaloes pulled out a 38-31 overtime victory over the Baylor Bears Saturday night before a homecoming crowd of 52,794 at Folsom Field in the Big 12 opener for both teams.

Heisman candidate Shedeur Sanders completed a 43-yard Hail Mary touchdown to LaJohntay Wester on the last play of regulation and then Micah Welch scored from a yard out in the first overtime period as the Buffaloes (3-1, 1-0) won its first Big 12 game in returning to the league for the first time after 14 years in the Pac-12.

Baylor (2-2, 0-1) was poised to answer, camped on the 2-yard line after a 13-yard pickup by quarterback Sawyer Robertson, but Dominic Richardson fumbled the ball out of the back of the end zone after a hit by CU's Travis Hunter.

It was a heartbreaking loss for the Bears, who seemed to have the game in their grasps with Colorado out of timeouts and downed to the final two seconds in regulation. Hounded all night by a relentless Baylor pressure, Sanders was sacked eight times -- the Bears' most since 10 in the Sugar Bowl win over Ole Miss three years ago. But, he threw for 341 yards and two touchdowns and also scored the Buffs' first TD on a two-yard run.

Making his second-consecutive start of the season and sixth overall, Robertson completed 11 of 21 passes for 148 yards and two touchdowns and also scored on a 45-yard run on a fourth-and-one play in the second quarter that gave BU a 24-10 lead.

After going 0-for-6 in the third quarter, Robertson was 3-for-3 for 45 yards on an eight-play, 61-yard drive, capping it with a perfect 24-yard touchdown strike to Hal Presley to give the Bears the lead with 5:43 left in the game.

When the defense added back-to-back sacks that pushed CU back to its own 4-yard line, Baylor had a chance to throw the knockout punch when Josh Cameron returned a punt 20 yards to the CU 26. But, Isaiah Hankins missed a 45-yard field goal wide right with 2:16 to go that would have pushed the Bears' lead to double digits.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Baylor's 24 points in the first half were its most in a first half in a conference game since at Oklahoma (11/5/22).
- BU tallied eight sacks, its first in a game since racking up 10 in the 2021 Sugar Bowl, and 12 tackles for loss.
- Junior QB Sawyer Robertson recorded a 45-yard rushing TD, the longest rush of his career.
- Senior LB Matt Jones logged 10 total tackles, including a career-high nine solo, for his third-consecutive double-digit tackle output.
- Senior CB Lorando Johnson broke up three passes, a personal best, and extended his streak to five games with a PBU, dating back to 2023.
- Senior WR Jamaal Bell returned a kick for a 100-yard touchdown, the first KR TD of his career. He is the fourth Bear all time to record a kick return touchdown greater than 100 yards.

Digging an early hole, Baylor football couldn't overcome a 21-point first-quarter deficit and fell to 22nd-ranked BYU, 34-28, Saturday afternoon at McLane Stadium.

The Bears twice had chances to take the lead, but they turned it over on downs at the Cougars' 25 after a first-career interception by defensive lineman Elinus Noel III and then BYU safety Crew Wakley picked off a Sawyer Robertson pass intended for Ashtyn Hawkins.

In a career performance, Robertson completed 27-of-48 passes for 324 yards and three touchdowns and also scored on a 20-yard TD run. But, he was also picked off twice and sacked three times for 30 yards in losses.

BYU (5-0, 2-0) quarterback Jake Retzlaff threw for 216 yards and two touchdowns and added 53 yards and another score ont he ground to account for the bulk of the Cougars' 367 yards of total offense. Wideout Darius Lassiter caught eight passes for 120 yards, including a 44-yard TD grab.

For the Bears (2-3, 0-2), redshirt junior wide receiver Josh Cameron also had a breakout game with seven catches for a career-high 125 yards and two touchdowns.

Facing a 31-14 deficit at the half, Baylor came back with a 15-yard TD pass from Robertson to Hawkins in the third quarter, and then pulled within a single score when Cameron hauled in a 23-yarder with 10:07 left in the game.

Scoring on each of its first four possessions, BYU jumped out to a 28-7 lead in the first 21 minutes of an opening half that saw the Cougars outgain the Bears, 286-216, and dominate time of possession, 17:59 to 12:01.

- The Baylor defense held BYU to just 81 yards of total offense in the second half.
- Junior QB Sawyer Robertson had a career day, going 27-for-48 with 324 yards and three touchdowns.
