QUALIFICATION PATH

Singles and doubles participants qualified to the Division I singles and doubles championships via competition in approved qualifying pathway events. The qualifying pathway events, including the number of players advancing into the singles and doubles championships for each event are as follows:

- ITA All-American Championships – 10 singles players (eight main draw quarterfinalists and two feed-in consolation finalists) and four doubles teams (four main draw semifinalists).
- ITA Regional Championships – each of the 13 regions will advance two singles players (two finalists) and one doubles team (winner).
- ITA Conference Masters Championships – each Division I conference eligible for team automatic qualification will have the opportunity to have its singles and doubles conference tournament winners, or, if no conference tournament is conducted, nominate one singles player and one doubles team, to participate. The ITA Conference Masters field size will mirror the number of eligible AQ conferences each year. The four singles semifinalists, plus three doubles teams (two finalists plus the third/fourth playoff winner), will qualify for the singles and doubles championships.
- ITA Sectional Championships – each of the four sectionals will advance six singles players (the four singles semifinalists plus the two winners of the quarterfinal playoffs), and three doubles teams (the two doubles finalists plus the plus the third/fourth playoff winner).

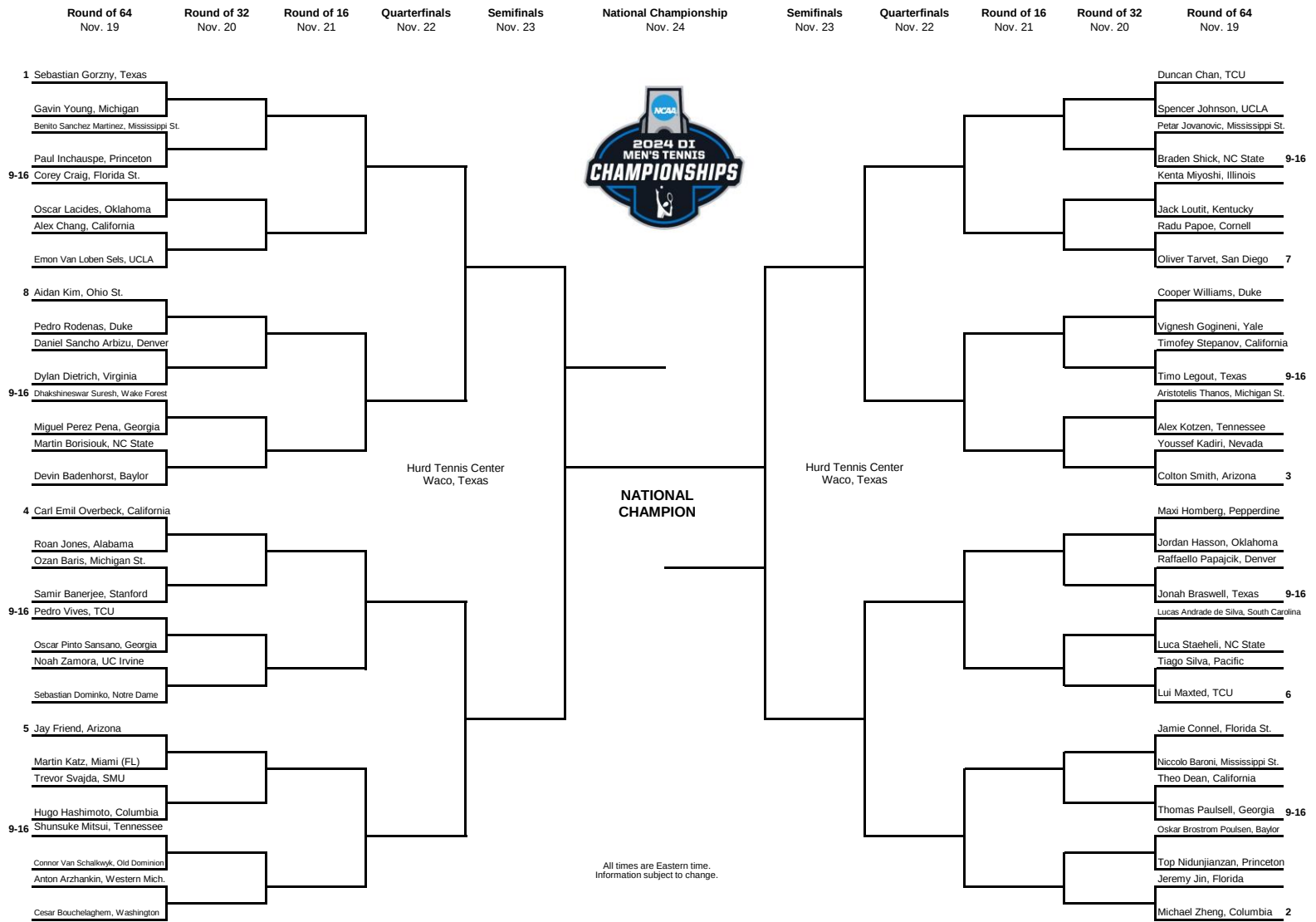

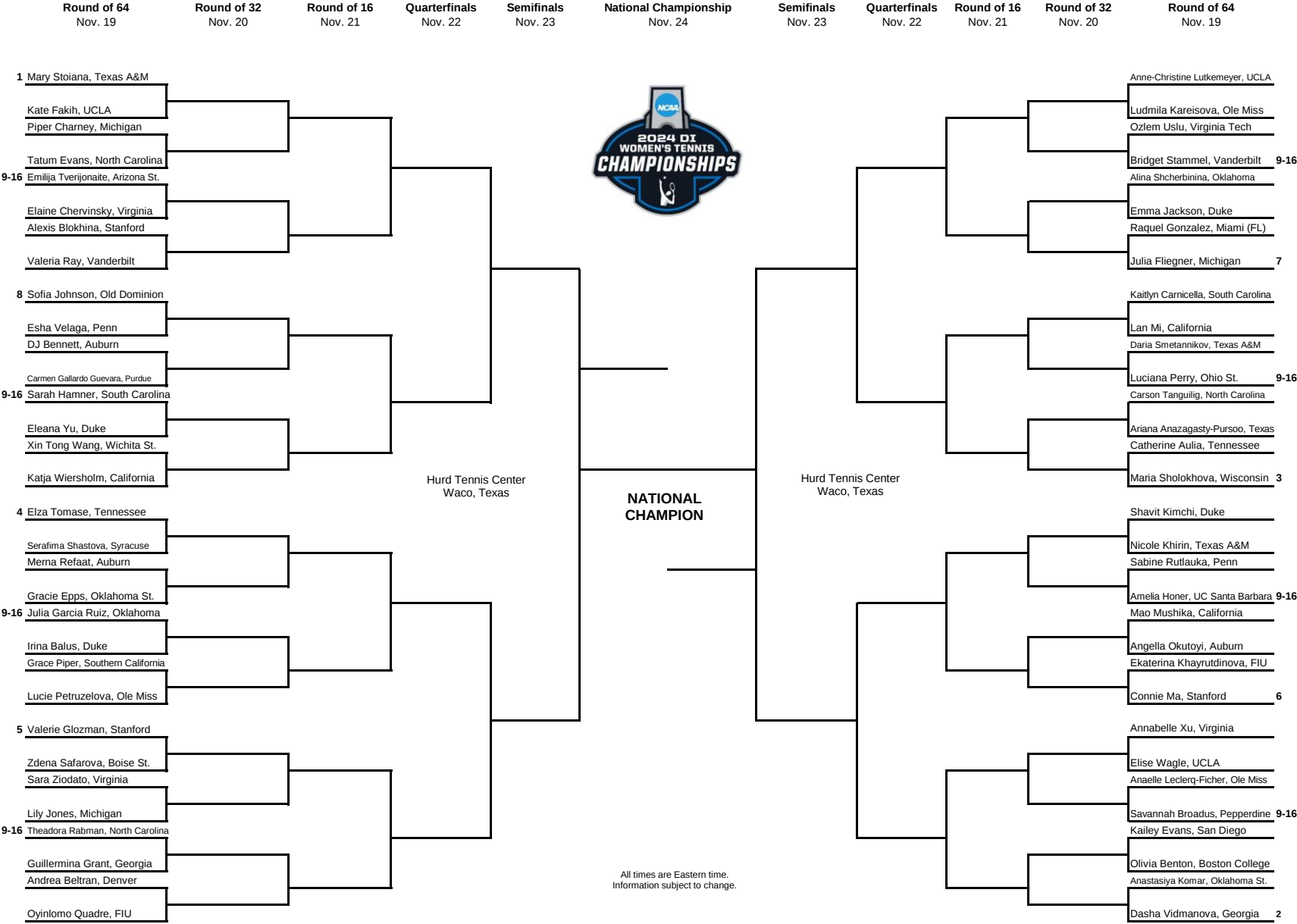

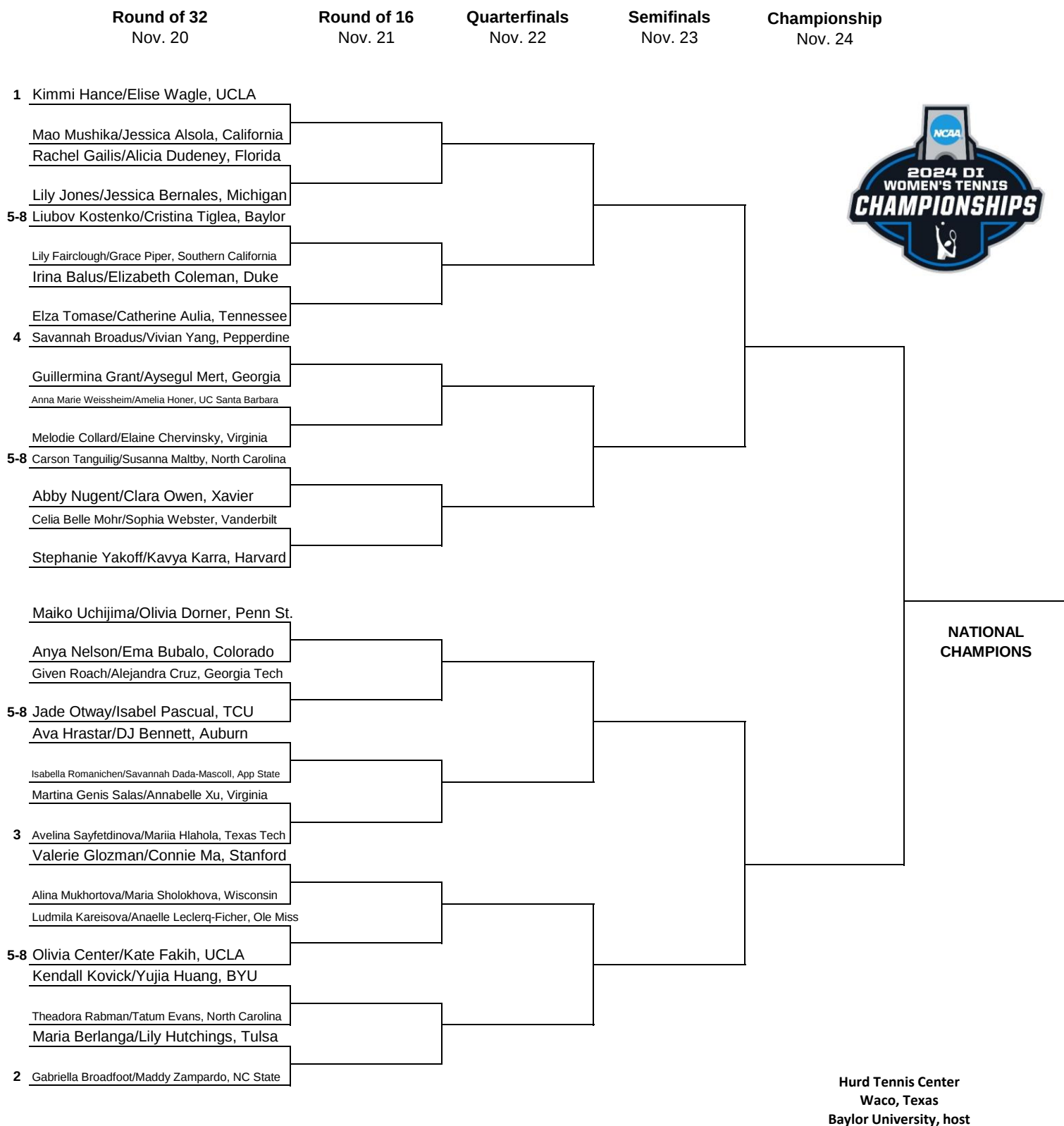

Clarkson Creative is the official photographer for NCAA Championships, providing photography services for all 90 NCAA Championships. Getty Images are the NCAA's exclusive agent to market, promote, license and distribute all analog and digitized photographs of NCAA Championship events. Photos from the NCAA's championships are available to the general public via Getty Images at <http://on.ncaa.com/NCAAonGetty>.

Photography License Terms and Conditions:

1. A photographer to whom the NCAA has issued a credential will have a limited, non-exclusive, and non-transferable license to take photographs of the Events, and to allow the media outlet or other news entity that engaged the photographer, to use such photographs for news coverage of the Events (including magazine stories) and other editorial purposes; provided, however, that not such use may create the impression, or otherwise suggest, that the photographer is sponsored or endorsed by, or are associated or affiliated with, the NCAA. An authorized photographer may not claim any relationship to, or endorsement by the NCAA, and may not use the NCAA's name, logos and marks, or any other proprietary designations thereof, in any manner and for any purpose, without the prior express written approval of the NCAA.
2. Neither the photographer nor the entity that engaged the photographer may sell photos (including digital copies) taken at the Events, whether for commercial or editorial purposes, without the NCAA's prior express written consent.
3. A credentialed photographer may take any number of photos on-site at the Event competition venue, provided that he/she does not interfere with play or related activities. From time to time, before or during the Event, the NCAA may impose additional restrictions regarding the time, manner, and place in which authorized photographers may take photographs during an Event.
4. An authorized photographer may not use Event photographs to market or advertise the photographer's services.
5. The NCAA may modify these terms and conditions at any time in its sole discretion. The NCAA shall provide notice of any such modifications to authorized photographers, and following notice, such modifications shall be binding upon all authorized photographers.
6. The NCAA may revoke a photographer's right to take photographs at an Event and/or to sell Event photographs at any time and for any reason, including failure to abide by these terms and conditions.

7. Photographers understand the inherent risk of taking photographs and otherwise being in close proximity to athletic contests and irrevocably waive any and all liability stemming from injury and/or property damage in conjunction with his/her attendance at an Event.
8. Photographer agrees to indemnify, defend and hold NCAA and its affiliates, officers, employees, successors and assigns harmless from and against any and all claims, demands, suits, liability, losses or damages, including amounts paid in settlement, judgments, costs and expenses, including reasonable counsel fees and disbursements, which may be made against or suffered or incurred by each such party as a result of any use of any photographs and otherwise with respect to the photographer's activities at an Event and the results and proceeds thereof.
9. Nothing herein is intended to create an agency, employment, partnership, or joint venture relationship between the NCAA and the photographer. Neither party is an affiliate of the other, shall have the authority to act for or bind the other, and shall make any representation that would indicate an apparent agency, employment, partnership or joint venture relationship.

A note to hosts, local organizing committees and NCAA championship staff: These additional stipulation are for your use should you decide to hire a photographer at an NCAA tournament event when NCAA Photos is not present. NCAA Photos (also known as Clarkson Creative Photography) will be on site for the final day of competition, unless otherwise specified and is the official photography partner of the NCAA. An additional photographer may be hired by NCAA staff, hosts and local organizing committees to shoot additional rounds/days and ancillary events, if the staff so chooses. For those instances, it is necessary to have the hired photographer(s) comply with all terms and conditions in this document. Host institutions are not required to have a photographer when NCAA Photos is not on site.

NCAA FOOTAGE USAGE AND LICENSING POLICIES

General Guidelines and NCAA Copyright. The NCAA retains exclusive copyright to all audio (natural sound) and video footage (e.g., television, digital, and photographs) to all 90 NCAA championships. Local venues, local organizing committees and/or host institutions must gain written permission to license NCAA championships footage after the completion of the event. Further, the television or radio entity that originated the game(s) must give permission for use of announcer calls of NCAA championship broadcasts.

NCAA Championship Footage Requests.

The NCAA has partnered with Veritone to represent and manage NCAA championship footage video and audio assets, including fulfillment, licensing, copyright, and archival rights.

FOR GENERAL PUBLIC/FANS. Currently, there is **NOT** an option available for the general public/fans to purchase NCAA championships footage/DVDs (e.g., Amazon). However, [Veritone](mailto:sports@veritone.com) may be able to assist (866-815-6599; sports@veritone.com).

Footage and Audio Usage Policies.

A. NCAA Championships Video and Audio Highlights Use Guidelines.

[NOTE: FOR CLARITY, THE FOLLOWING GUIDELINES DO NOT APPLY TO THE [NCAA DIVISION I MEN'S BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS](#), EXCEPT IF NOTED.]

Videotaped, filmed or audio excerpts of an NCAA championship ("Highlights") may be used only by news organizations, solely for news purposes in their regularly scheduled television or radio news programs of which actual news elements constitute the main feature in the United States and Canada.

1. Broadcast networks / television stations may use up to **three minutes** (per newscast) of video footage for up to **72 hours** following the game/broadcast. **No media entity (commercial or noncommercial) is allowed to display any game video on its website.**



NCAA Championships (Other than Division I Men's and Women's Basketball)

Digital Highlight and Footage Use Policy for Participating Member Institutions and Conferences

As the NCAA's digital rights holder, Turner Sports owns the right to license digital highlights from NCAA Championships. Turner has partnered with Veritone (formerly known as Wazee Digital) to manage these rights. This policy applies to NCAA member college and university institutions and conferences ("Member Institutions") in connection with the use of footage from all NCAA Championships other than Division I Men's and Women's Basketball.

For purposes of this policy, "Digital Highlights" are defined as NCAA Championship game or event footage distributed through any digital, mobile or social application, platform or device.

Policy for NCAA Championships excluding Div. I Men's and Women's Basketball

For all NCAA Championships (Divisions I, II, and III) and all games/events in all rounds, excluding all Div. I Men's and Women's Basketball Championship games, the following policy applies:

- Digital Highlights may be posted to:
 - Member Institution's official website, mobile and connected device apps.
 - Member Institution's official social media accounts (including official team and athletic department accounts) on Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, YouTube, TikTok, and Snapchat.
- Digital Highlights may only be posted from games or events in which that Member Institution participates.
- Digital Highlights may be posted during a game or event when telecast or streamed on ABC, ESPN platforms or NCAA.com. All in-progress highlights must abide by the following additional requirements:
 - In-progress highlights can only be posted to Member Institutions' official social media accounts. Permitted platforms are Twitter, Instagram, Facebook, TikTok, and Snapchat.
 - Max four (4) clips per game or event – max 30 seconds per clip.
 - Playback functionality in embedded Tweets must be disabled when sharing video.
 - Limited to republished, in-progress video and GIF only – no live streams of any kind permitted.
 - All video must be network footage, inclusive of the visible network ID bug and all graphics.
 - Every post must include a direct tune-in call to action (CTA) utilizing one of the following methods:
 - Textual tune-in for the game including originating Platform (e.g., Linear Network – ABC, ESPN, ESPN2, etc. or Digital – ESPN3, NCAA.com, etc.)
 - A direct deep-link to the game's live stream.
 - For ABC/ESPN content, attachment of a promotional post-wipe – accessible via Dropbox link: [HERE](#)
- Member Institutions may not sell sponsorships or other advertising on their official websites or social media accounts specifically targeted against the Digital Highlights.
- For Digital Highlights posted to social platforms (including but not limited to Facebook, YouTube, and Instagram), Turner reserves the right to claim and monetize the video posted by Member Institutions.
- For clarity, any videos posted to YouTube should be posted without a monetization or usage policy – no pre-roll or companion ads are permitted.
- Digital Highlights posted after the live window shall be limited to an aggregate of two (2) minutes of footage per game or event. For clarity, two identical 30-second clips posted to two different platforms count as only 30 seconds, not 60 seconds total, and two different 30-second clips posted to two different platforms count as 60 seconds total.
- Digital Highlights may only be used as set forth in this policy and may not be used commercially, sold, sublicensed, transferred or re-purposed for any other use.
- Member Institutions are responsible for sourcing and editing all Digital Highlights.
- Upon Turner's request, Member Institutions shall transmit to Turner (via FTP or other means as requested) Digital Highlights (including raw footage and/or a produced segment) for use on NCAA Digital platforms.

- **Licensed from Veritone** – Except as set forth in this document, all uses of Digital Highlights must be licensed through Veritone regardless of how such footage is acquired (e.g. team videographer, television broadcast, etc.).
