STORY LINES

- Winners of five consecutive games, Baylor wraps up its regular-season slate by facing off with red-hot Kansas on Saturday at McLane Stadium, with KU coming off three consecutive ranked wins to vault into bowl contention.
- The Bears won their fifth straight by besting Houston on Saturday on the road, using a strong defense to hold the Coogs to just three points offensively.
- The Bears are in the fifth year under Coach Dave Aranda, who in 2021 led the Bears to the best season in school history with a 12-2 record, a Big 12 Championship and the 2022 Sugar Bowl. Aranda directed the Bears to the Armed Force Bowl in 2022 and after a 3-9 season in 2023, has taken over defensive play calling duties.
- Aranda taking over defensive play calling is his first time directing a defense since he established himself as one of the top defensive minds in football as the DC at LSU, Wisconsin and Delta State. He is also directing the inside linebackers.
- Since 2011, combined with football, and men's and women's basketball, Baylor leads the nation in wins, owning 46 more wins than the next closest program (UConn).
- Baylor is bowl eligible for the 12th time in the last 15 years.
- The Bears are looking to extend their Big 12 win streak to six games, the longest streak since 2019.
- Keaton Thomas reached the 100-tackle mark on Saturday at Houston and Matt Jones needs just six stops to reach the mark. It would be the first 100-tackle duo from linebackers in the same season since 2012.
- QB Sawyer Robertson leads the Big 12 Conference in QB rating (83) and ranks sixth in the nation. He has had five of his seven starts in 2024 come with a QBR of at least 80. A native of Lubbock and a product of Coronado High School, Robertson was a former four-star recruit who opened his career playing for Coach Mike Leach at Mississippi State before joining the Bears for the 2023 season.
- WR Josh Cameron has hauled in eight TDs in 2024, leading the team and ranking tied for 12th in single-season BU history. Cameron has 36 catches for 541 yards and ranks second the nation in punt returns, averaging 20.7 yards per return. He has 839 all-purpose yards through nine games in 2024.
- Freshman RB Bryson Washington ranks third in the nation among freshmen in rushing yards and rushing TDs. Washington set the program freshman record with his fifth 100+ yard game of the year at Houston.

SCOUTING THE JAYHAWKS

- Kansas comes into the game with the Bears seeking to earn bowl eligibility while in the midst of one of the best stretches in college football in 2024. The Jayhawks have won three straight to get to 5-6 and 4-4 in Big 12 play, with its wins coming vs. No. 17 Iowa State (45-36), at No. 7 BYU (17-13) and vs. No. 16 Colorado (37-21). This matchup snaps a stretch of four straight KU games against a ranked opponent.
- Kansas averages 30.8 points per game, averaging 413.7, with 211.5 yards rushing and 202.3 yards passing per game. Defensively, KU averages 24.3 points per game allowed, surrendering 373.5 yards per game, allowing 232.6 passing and 140.8 rushing. KU ranks third in the country in third-down conversion percentage (51.5), also ranking 16th in fewest penalties, third in red-zone offense, 14th in rushing offense, and 24th in passes intercepted.
- JB Brown leads the team with 66 tackles, 8.5 for a loss and four sacks. Mello Dotson has five interceptions and Cobee Bryant has four. RB Devin Neal is one of the nation’s best running backs, toting the rock 199 times for 1,133 yards with 15 TDs. QB Jalon Daniels is an elite dual threat, rushing for 402 yards and six TDs, while throwing for 2,174 yards on 156-of-277 passing with 14 TDs and 10 interceptions. Luke Grimm has 48 catches for 617 yards with six TDs. Neal ranks 17th in the nation in rushing yards and 10th in rushing TDs.
- After going 2-10 and 1-8 in 2022 in Coach Lance Leipold’s first season, the Jayhawks have put together three consecutive competitive seasons. KU went 6-7 with a loss in the Liberty Bowl in 2022, 9-4 in 2023 with a win in the Guaranteed Rate Bowl, before going 5-6 in 2024. KU is 22-27 under Leipold, who went 37-33 in six years with Buffalo, following a historic career at his alma matter Wisconsin-Whitewater from 2007-14. Leipold grew as a coach over stints at Wisconsin-Whitewater in 1987, 88 and 90, before a three-year tenure as the GA at Wisconsin (1991-93) and time at Nebraska-Omaha (1994-2000, 2004-06) and Nebraska (2001-03). While at Wisconsin-Whitewater, Leipold was a six-time national coach of the year, leading the team to the 2007, 2013 and 2014 Division III National Championship. His squad went 45-0 over a three-season span.
- OC Jeff Grimes is the assistant head coach and is in his first season after leading Baylor’s offensive attack the last three years. Jim Zebrowski is the co-offensive coordinator and Brian Borland is the defensive coordinator. Taiwo Onatolo is the special teams coordinator and DK McDonald is the co-defensive coordinator. Chris Simpson is the assistant head coach.

GOING BOWLING

- The win at West Virginia marked a bowl eligibility milestone for the Bears, giving Baylor bowl berths in 12 of the last 15 seasons and in three of five seasons under Coach Dave Aranda.
- The 2024 bowl game will be the 27th all-time for the Bears, with its bowl history starting in 1948 at the Dixie Bowl. It will be Baylor’s first bowl since the 2022 Armed Forces Bowl, with Aranda also leading the Bears to the 2021 Sugar Bowl win over Ole Miss.

FIVE-GAME WIN STREAK

- Baylor is riding a five-game winning streak, its most since 2021, entering the Houston matchup, seeking its first six-game streak since 2019. The five-game win streak vs. Big 12 teams is its most since 2019.
- The five-game streak includes a furious offensive attack that ranks among the nation’s leaders.
- Below is a breakdown of the offensive stats in the first six games, a 2-4 start, and the five-game win streak.

LAST MEETING

- Baylor used a powerful running game to post a 2022 homecoming win over upstart Kansas, stretching BU’s win streak to 13 straight against the Jayhawks. The Bears owned a 28-3 lead at halftime behind TDs from Monaray Baldwin, Richard Reese, Kyron Drones and Jordan Nabors.
- Making his first-career start, Reese rolled to career highs in rushes (31) and yards (186), while finding paydirt twice. He capped a seven-play, 69-yard drive with a two-yard tote to push Baylor’s lead to 12 points with 2:37 left in the fourth quarter, solidifying the win after Kansas had scored 20 unanswered to open the second half.
- Shapen threw for 164 yards and a score on a windy day that made passing a challenge. BU also got 71 yards rushing on nine carries from Qualan Jones.

2021 MEETING

- Baylor earned a 45-7 win over Kansas in 2021 in Lawrence, routing the Jayhawks for a 12th-straight win over KU with 31 unanswered second-half points to pull away from a 14-7 halftime margin.
- The Bears rolled to 576 yards of total offense and held KU to just 166 yards, including 57 yards through the air and 109 on the ground. BU surrendered just eight first downs.
- QB Gerry Bohanon threw for 269 yards and two TDs on 19-of-23 passing, while adding a nine-yard TD rush in the fourth quarter and extended the lead to 35-7. Abram Smith and Trestan Ebner combined for 198 yards on 28 carries, with Smith going for 122 yards on 16 carries. RJ Sneed had six catches for 128 yards and a score. Ben Sims added a TD catch, with Taye McWilliams adding a TD rush.

CONNECTING THE TEAMS

- Baylor’s offensive attack was led in 2021-23 by current Kansas offensive coordinator Jeff Grimes, who runs the “RVO” attack, Reliable, Violent, Offense and helped lead the Bears to the 2021 Big 12 Champinoship and Sugar Bowl Title. Grimes will be facing off with his son, Baylor three-year starting long snapper Garrison Grimes, who is regarded as one of the top long snappers in the country. Garrison’s brother and Jeff’s youngest son, Greydon is a freshman offensive lineman for the Jayhawks.

SLAYING BIG 12 DRAGONS

- Only three times in its history in the Big 12 Conference has Baylor had a season with wins over TCU, Texas Tech and Oklahoma State, which the Bears have done in 2024.
- Baylor also did this in 2014 and 2019. Only 17 times since the formation of Baylor football in 1899 have the Bears beaten TCU and Texas Tech in the same season, also doing so in 1942, 1948, 1949, 1950, 1963, 1974, 1979, 1980, 1981, 1985, 1986, 1989, 1990 and 1995.
- The Baylor win at West Virginia also snapped a winless stretch in Morgantown for the Bears, who had lost six straight to open the series with the Mountaineers.
- By virtue of the win at Houston, the Bears swept the Big 12 Texas schools.

A BAYLOR WIN WOULD ...

- Make Baylor 8-4 on the year and 6-3 in conference play.
- Improve Coach Dave Aranda to 31-29 in his fifth year as the head coach of the Bears.
- Make the Bears 638-626-44 all-time.
- Extend Baylor’s win streak to six games, which would be its longest since 2019.
- Make Aranda 4-0 all-time against Kansas.
- Extend Baylor’s win streak over KU to 14 games and make BU 12-0 vs. Kansas at home.
- Give Baylor its best regular-season since winning 10 games in 2021 en route to a pair of titles.

RUSH OFFENSE CORNER TURNED

- Baylor’s rush offense struggled early in the year as the Bears adapted to a new offensive scheme, broke in a youthful group at tailback and offensive line, and faced a stout collection of opposing defenses. Over the last four games, Baylor has broken out, rushing for 1,038 yards in wins at Texas Tech, vs. Oklahoma State, vs. TCU and at West Virginia.
- Baylor rushed for 257 yards vs. TCU, 343 yards in the win over Oklahoma State, 255 yards in the rout at Texas Tech, totaling10 rushing TDs over the three-game stretch and 7.43 yards per carry. The 343 yards rushing vs. OSU marked the most in a game vs. a Big 12 foe since 2016.
- It marked the first time since 2015 that Baylor has had three-straight games with 250 yards rushing against Big 12 opponents.

ROBERTSON CLAIMS QB1

- After Dequan Finn suffered an injury in the loss at No. 11/11 Utah, Baylor has turned to QB Sawyer Robertson in the signal caller role and the junior has starred, securing the job as the BU starting quarterback.
- Robertson, a 6-foot-4 native of Lubbock, Texas, joined the Bears for the spring of 2022 and served as a part-time starter in 2023 in relief of injured QB Blake Shapen, starting games vs. No. 12/12 Utah, Long Island, No. 3 Texas and the season finale vs. West Virginia. After Finn was brought in via the transfer portal, Robertson did not win the job in a battle for the gig in the spring and summer but remained the consummate leader on the team and the moment the redshirt junior’s name was called, stepped up.

SAWDOG ON FIRE

- Baylor junior Sawyer Robertson has been one of the top performing quarterbacks in the nation since taking over the job in week 3.
- He ranks sixth nationally and first in the Big 12 in QB rating.
- A native of Lubbock, Robertson had a thrilling homecoming to his native land in week 8, throwing a career-high five TD passes in a rout of the Red Raiders, 59-32. He was named to the Davey O’Brien Trophy QB of the Year Midseason Watch List, tabbed Big 12 Player of the Week, and Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Player of the Week following the beatdown in Lubbock.
- Over his last 10 starts - dating back to the season finale vs. West Virginia last year - Roberts has charted QBR totals of 80+ in seven games. Healthy for the first time in that WVU game in 2023, Robertson threw for 215 yards and a score on 17-of-19 passing for 215 yards, with 15 carries for 33 yards, with an 80.0 QBR.

FUGAR MOVES TO LEFT TACKLE, O-LINE SOARS

- A key ingredient to Baylor’s five-game win streak and turnaround from a 2-4 start to the season has been the improvement of the youthful offensive line. An element of that improvement has clearly been the move of South Carolina transfer Sidney Fugar from a rotational piece at left guard to the starting left tackle. He moved to left tackle in a loss vs. BYU and earned the starting job at Iowa State, locking down the job since.
- Since Fugar - a 6-foot-5, 341-pound native of Maryland - has started the last five games, the Bears are averaging 40.8 points per game, including 488.4 yards of total offense, 265 passing and 223.4 rushing.
- Baylor has moved to No. 31 in fewest sacks allowed on the season nationally, and No. 7 in fewest tackles for a loss allowed.

BAYLOR WINS FIFTH STRAIGHT, ROLLS HOUSTON

- Baylor used a stiff defense to post a 20-10 win at Houston to win its fifth straight. The Bears allowed only three points defensively, as UH used a pick-six to score its lone touchdown.
- The Bears totaled 325 yards of total offense, with 204 passing and 121 rushing. UH was held to just 239 yards of offense, with 92 rushing.
- Baylor got two TD passes from Sawyer Robertson, finding Michael Trigg - who had four catches for 96 yards - while also finding Ashtyn Hawkins, who had a team-high six catches.

BEARS REACH BOWL MILESTONE, ROLL OVER WVU IN MORGANTOWN

- Baylor rolled over West Virginia in Morgantown for its first win over WVU on the road in seven tries, 49-35. The Bears used an electric offensive attack that rolled to 512 yards of total offense, including 329 passing and 183 on the ground.
- The game was electric offensively, going into halftime with BU leading 35-28 but the Baylor defense adjusted and held WVU scoreless until a meaningless TD with less than a minute left in the game to cut the lead to 14.
- QB Sawyer Robertson went for 329 yards passing and three TDs, finding Monaray Baldwin, Josh Cameron and Bryson Washington for scores. Washington totaled four TDs - and has eight in his last two games - totaling 182 yards all-purpose, including 123 and three TDs on the ground and a career-high five catches for 59 yards. Ashtyn Hawkins had seven catches for 52 yards, while Cameron went for five catches for 101 yards. Baldwin added 82 yards on three catches.
- Defensively, Keaton Thomas - who began his career at WVU as a walk-on DB - had 12 tackles and a sack.

- Baylor will advance to the postseason, with results from Saturday dictating the Big 12 Championship Game and a bowl berth announced on Dec. 8.

ROAD CONFERENCE WIN RECORD

- Baylor has three wins on the road in conference play in 2024, just its seventh all-time three-road win season in league action.
- Baylor has won three or more road games in league play only seven times (2024, 2022, 2019, 2015, 2014, 2013) in the last 30 years and only six times in its history in the Big 12 Conference, which dates back to 1996.
- The Bears went through a 37-game stretch from 1995-2005 without a road conference win, going 0-4 in every year from 1996-2004. Baylor was 2-50 in road conference games from 1996-2008.

B-WASH EMERGING

- Redshirt freshman tailback Bryson Washington is having a breakout season in 2024. After sitting out the first two games of the year with an injury - and missing most of 2023 with an injury - Washington has emerged as an elite running back threat.
- A native of Franklin, Texas, Washington leads the team with 142 carries and 812 yards, including 10 TDs. He has become a threat in the pass game as well, catching 21 balls for 203 yards. Washington, a 6-foot, 203-pound bruiser had a two-TD game at Texas Tech in a rout, rushing for 116 yards on just 10 carries. He then went for 196 yards on 26 carries in the win over TCU, totaling four TDs and adding two catches for 22 yards. Over his eight games in 2024, Washington is averaging 112.6 all-purpose yards per game. He was named Big 12 Newcomer of the Week - for the second time in 2024 - following the four-TD outing, which marked the most TDs for a Bear since 2011 and his 196 yards on the ground marked the most since 2016. He followed that TCU win with another four-TD outing, including three on the ground and one receiving, going for 123 yards rushing at WVU.
- Washington had a decorated prep career at Franklin High School, where he led his club to 32 straight wins and consecutive 3A State Championships. A four-year starter, he had over 2,000 yards and 30 TDs as a senior.

ARANDA TAKES OVER DEFENSE

- Coach Dave Aranda enters the 2024 season in his fifth season leading the Bears.
- Aranda has taken over defensive play calling duties and serves as the lead position coach for the inside linebackers in 2024. This came after he previously let his defensive coordinators call plays, including Ron Roberts and Matt Powledge. Powledge remains the defensive coordinator and is the safeties coach in 2024.
- Aranda led the LSU defense in 2019 as the Tigers posted a perfect 15-0 record and won the National Title with a 42-25 victory over Clemson in CFP National Championship Game.
- In six seasons as defensive coordinator at Power 5 schools from 2014-19, his defenses were ranked top-12 nationally in total yards five times. The units also ranked top-10 in scoring four times in seven years from 2013-19.

- According to the 2023 FEI Rankings via BCFToys.com, Baylor finished the year with the top-ranked special teams unit in college football and ranks No. 5 entering the UH matchup. A combination of kickers Isaiah Hankins and Connor Hawkins, kickoff specialist Jack Stone, punter Palmer Williams, long snappers Garrison Grimes and Dylan Schaub, and returners Josh Cameron, Jamaal Bell and Richard Reese, helped the Bears lead the FEI special teams rankings.

BEARS WIN THIRD STRAIGHT, EDGE TCU

- Baylor won its third straight, using a thrilling finish to edge TCU 37-34 in front of the first blackout crowd since 2017 at McLane Stadium.
- In a back-and-forth thriller the Bears earned their first win over TCU at home since 2014, using a furious rushing attack that saw RB Bryson Washington rush for 196 yards and four TDs - including 12 carries for 96 yards and two TDs in the fourth quarter. The Bears rolled to 31 first downs and 499 yards of total offense, including 257 on the ground. QB Sawyer Robertson threw for 242 yards and rushed nine times for 28 yards.
- TCU took a 17-13 lead into halftime as QB Josh Hoover rushed and threw for a TD and the Frogs nailed a 46-yard field goal. After a field goal to open the final stanza, the Bears answered with a 75-play drive to even the game on a Dawson Pendergrass TD rush. The teams then traded TDs until Washington’s fourth TD of the game came to cap an 81-play drive with 4:54 left in the fourth quarter. TCU drove 75 yards to even the game at 34 with a Jack Bech TD pass with 2:59 left. Baylor then drove 59 plays - including a key fourth and nine conversion pass to Michael Trigg at midfield and set up for the game-winning 33-yard field goal from Hankins as time expired, setting off a joyous celebration that saw the field rushed in jubilation.

HANKINS GAME WINNER

- Senior kicker Isaiah Hankins is just a couple weeks into fatherhood, as he and his wife welcomed a baby son into the world on Friday, Oct. 25.
- Hankins put his new-found dad strength to use in a historic win over TCU, booting the walk-off field goal to beat the Horned Frogs, 37-34. His kick set off a celebration at McLane Stadium that saw the field stormed in jubilation and Hankins lifted on the shoulders of his teammates and students.
- Hankins was named Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Week, his second career Big 12 weekly honor, on Monday following the win.

WASHINGTON, HANKINS HONORED FOLLOWING TCU

- Baylor football redshirt junior kicker Isaiah Hankins and redshirt freshman Bryson Washington were named Co-Big 12 Players of the Week following the TCU win.
- Hankins split Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Week honors with Houston punter Liam Dougherty, while Washington shared Big 12 Newcomer of the Week praise with Houston quarterback Zeon Chriss.
- It was Hankins’ 33-yard field goal as time expired that lifted the Bears over TCU on Saturday, 37-34. The kick was BU’s first game-winning field goal with no time remaining since 2020, when John Mayers helped Baylor walk-off Kansas State, 32-31. On the night, Hankins accounted for seven points (one FG, four PATs) and rebounded nicely after missing a PAT in the second quarter. The make gave Baylor its first home win over TCU since 2014, and first win over the Frogs since 2019.
- Washington rushed for a career-high 196 yards on 26 carries and scored four touchdowns in the dramatic victory. His four rushing scores were the most by a Bear in a single game since 2011, when Terrance Ganaway scored five times vs. Washington in the Alamo Bowl. Washington’s 196 yards on the ground were also the most by a Bear since Shock Linwood rushed for 237 at Iowa State in 2016.
- A breakout star in the backfield, Washington is the first Big 12 player to score four or more rushing touchdowns in a game this season, and just the 10th FBS player to do so in 2024. His efforts helped BU to 257 rushing yards for the game, marking the third-straight game that the Bears have eclipsed 250 rushing yards, BU’s longest such streak since the first three games of the 2016 season.
- Both Hankins and Washington collect their second-career Big 12 weekly awards, as Hankins previously earned the Special Teams Player of the Week accolade on Oct. 23, 2023, after making four field goals at UCF, while Washington was named the Big 12 Newcomer of the Week just two weeks ago on Oct. 21 after his 116-yard, two-TD performance at Texas Tech. This is the first time since 2019 that Baylor has received a Big 12 Player of the Week award in three-consecutive weeks. The Bears have now collected five weekly Big 12 honors this season, the program’s most since winning 10 times in 2019.

BAYLOR HONORED THE 2013, 2014 BIG 12 CHAMPS

- A pair of 11-2 and Big 12 Conference Championship teams were celebrated during the 2024 Baylor Football season, as the Bears recognized student-athletes from the 2013 and 2014 teams.
- The 2013 team went 11-2, including an 8-1 mark in league play, earning a No. 13 national ranking and a berth in the Fiesta Bowl in Glendale, Ariz. Baylor posted three wins in non-conference play and opened the year with nine straight wins, including a 71-7 win over Iowa State on Homecoming, a 41-12 win over Oklahoma and a 63-34 rout of Texas Tech in Arlington.
- In 2014, the Bears went 11-2 and 8-1 in Big 12 play, earning a berth in the Cotton Bowl and a No. 7 final ranking by the Associated Press. Baylor opened the year with six straight wins, before a lone regular-season blemish at West Virginia, soaring to No. 4 in the national polls. The Bears posted wins at Iowa State and Texas, a 61-58 thriller vs. TCU, and wins over Kansas – on Homecoming – Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas Tech and Kansas State.
- Both teams posted eventual wins over TCU during their seasons, which will add to the celebration opportunity on Nov. 2. Baylor bested TCU in Fort Worth 41-38 in 2013, and posted a thrilling 61-58 win over the Frogs in 2014 in Waco. The teams each sported top-five offensive attacks, with the 2014 squad leading the nation in points per game (52.4) and yards per game (618.8).

BEARS RUN THROUGH COWBOYS IN HOMECOMING WIN

- Baylor kept a furious run attack going in its second consecutive win, running over Oklahoma State in a homecoming win at McLane Stadium.
- The Bears rolled to 565 yards of total offense, including 343 on the ground while averaging nine yards per carry in the win. It marked the second consecutive game with 500+ yards of total offense, a first since 2021, and the most rushing yards vs. a Big 12 foe since 2016.
- The teams traded 17 points in the first half but the Bears came out with a third-quarter TD drive with just over eight minutes left to take a 24-17 lead, later holding an OSU drive to a field goal as the lead was cut to four. The Bears responded with a 41-yard TD scamper from QB Sawyer Robertson for an 11-point lead and after an 11-play, 75-yard drive from the Boys, Baylor answered with a 75-yard scoring drive on just four plays, finished off with a Dawson Pendergrass run to take a 38-28 lead with 3:06 left in the game.
- Pendergrass had six carries for 142 yards and a TD, averaging 23.7 yards per carry. Bryson Washington chipped in 17 carries for 78 yards and Robertson had eight carries for 73 yards. Richard Reese added six carries for 52 yards. Robertson threw for 222 yards and three scores, finding Ashtyn Hawkins, Hal Presley and Matthew Klopfenstein for scores. Hawkins had four catches for 74 yards. Kicker Isaiah Hawkins, who on Friday, alongside his wife, welcomed his first child into the world, nailed one kick from 30 yards out in the first quarter.

BAYLOR DOMINATES TEXAS TECH IN LUBBOCK

- The Bears put together their most complete performance of the year, thrashing Texas Tech in Lubbock in front of a sold-out homecoming crowd, 59-35, in a game that saw the lead as large as 52-21 in the closing minutes of the fourth quarter.
- It marked the second consecutive rout for Baylor at Texas Tech, as the Bears dominated the Raiders in Lubbock in 2022, 45-17, giving Baylor 104 combined points over the last two games at TTU. The Bears have now won 10 of its last 15 games against Tech, including five of its last seven. Over those 10 wins, Baylor has wins of 24, 29, 28, 11, 28 and 24 points.
- It marked the first game for Baylor to hang 50 points or more on a Big 12 foe since 2019 and its first 50+ point game since UAlbany in 2022. It was the most points scored vs. Tech since 2015, a 63-35 win in Arlington.
- Baylor’s 59 points on Saturday were the most by an FBS program in Week Eight and tied for the most in a conference game in a Power Four league this season.
- The Bears finished with 529 yards of total offense, with 255 rushing and 274 passing, both season highs.
- QB Sawyer Robertson returned to his hometown of Lubbock and tossed five TDs, a career high and the most for Baylor QB since Seth Russell in 2015. He was 21-of-32 for 274 yards. Freshman tailback Bryson Washington rushed for 116 yards and two TDs on just 10 carries. WR Josh Cameron had three receiving TDs with six catches for 75 yards and also returned a punt 74 yards to the one-yard line.

JONES, PENDERGRASS, ROBERTSON HONORED FOR OSU

- Baylor senior inside linebacker Matt Jones was named Big 12 Defensive Player of the Week after his 12-tackle effort in the win. Jones was fantastic in BU’s 38-28 win over Oklahoma State on Saturday, recording 12 total tackles, including a career-high 10 solo stops. He made three tackles for loss, including a sack, and forced a timely fumble that held the Cowboys out of the end zone and was recovered on the 1-yard line. The performance marked Jones’ fifth double-digit tackle effort of the year, the most by a Bear in a single season since Clay Johnston in 2018. A native of Odessa, Texas, Jones also moved into a tie for seventh place on Baylor’s all-time tackles for loss leaderboard with 34.0 career TFLs, matching him with the legendary Mike Singletary.
- Sawyer Robertson and Dawson Pendergrass were named honorable mention for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award following the win.

BEARS FALL AT NO. 16/16 IOWA STATE

- The Bears opened the game at No. 16/16 Iowa State strong, taking a 14-3 lead in the first quarter before ISU rallied to own a halftime margin. Baylor took a 21-19 lead with a TD drive to open the second half but Iowa State finished the game on a 40-7 run to close with a 43-21 win and remain unbeaten.
- Baylor got another heroic performance from QB Sawyer Robertson, who completed 25 of 44 passes for a career-high tying three TDs, while also rushing for 24 yards. He found Ketron Jackson Jr., Michael Trigg and Josh Cameron for TD strikes.
- Iowa State could not be stopped offensively however as the Clons rolled to 542 yards of total offense, including 265 on the ground and 277 passing. QB Rocco Becht had two TDs and Jaylon Jackson rushed for 107 yards and two scores and Carson Hansen added 98 yards. WR Jayden Higgins had eight catches for 116 yards and Jaylin Noel had five grabs for 98 yards.

SLUGGISH START DOOMS BEARS VS. NO. 22/22 BYU

- Baylor suffered a 34-28 loss vs. No. 22/22 BYU at McLane Stadium in a game that saw the Cougs go up 21-0 and 28-7 in the first half, scoring on each of their first four possession. Baylor fought back to cut the lead to 34-28 and had the ball with just under 90 seconds remaining but a game-clinching interception allowed the Cougs to escape with the win.
- The Bears got career-highs from Sawyer Robertson in completions (27), attempts (48), TDs (three) and yards (324), with the QB finding WR Josh Cameron for a career high 125 yards and two TDs on seven catches. Hal Presley chipped in eight catches for 82 yards. The Bears saw Bryson Washington rush 13 times for 31 yards.
- BYU QB Jake Retzlaff threw for 216 yards and two scores and Darius Lassiter had eight catches for 120 yards. Defensively, Keaton Thomas and seven stops and Treven Ma’ae had a career-high six tackles.

BAYLOR SOARS PAST AIR FORCE

- Baylor used a strong second half to win in the non-conference finale vs. Air Force.
- The Bears turned the ball over with three fumbles in the first half and took a 6-3 lead into halftime vs. the Falcons, owning the ball for just five minutes on offense in the first half. BU bounced back to score 17 in the third and eight in the fourth to take a 31-3 win over AF.
- The Bears turned to QB Sawyer Robertson in relief of starter Dequan Finn, with Robertson turning in a career-high 248 yards passing on 18-of-24 passing. Robertson added a rushing TD and spread his 18 completions around to eight different receivers, with Josh Cameron going for five grabs for 63 yards and Ashtyn Hawkins catching four balls for 81 yards. TE Michael Trigg had four catches for 49 yards.
- Freshman RB Bryson Washington made his first career start and toted it 12 times for 106 yards and his first career TD. Dominic Richardson rushed nine times for 48 yards and Richard Reese rushed eight times for 47 yards and a TD.
- Defensively, Matt Jones had his sixth double-digit tackle game of his career with 11 stops, with Devyn Bobby equaling his career high with nine tackles.

BAYLOR FALLS AT NO. 11/11 UTAH

- The Bears fell for the first time on the year in a 23-12 loss at No. 11/11 Utah on Sept. 7 in Salt Lake City.
- Baylor got behind 23-0 in the first half as Utah used a blocked field goal returned for a touchdown and a fumble recovery on the three yard line to take an early, nearly untestable lead. The Bears fought back however on the strength of the Dave Aranda defense, outscoring Utah 12-0 over the remainder of the game and holding the Utes offensive attack to little success.
- Baylor couldn't sustain offensive success against the stout Utah defense, but saw Dawson Pendergrass rush nine times for 69 yards and Josh Cameron haul in his first career TD pass with a 47-yard strike in the third quarter.
- Defensively, Baylor's elite inside linebacker group of Keaton Thomas and Matt Jones each had double-digit tackle efforts, with Thomas going for a career-high 12.

FRESHMEN SNAPS LED BIG 12 IN 2023

- Baylor played a very freshmen heavy roster in 2023 and that total plays out when sorting the number of snaps played by freshman on offense and defense by Big 12 schools in the regular season.
- The Bears played a total of 4,505 snaps on offense and defense from freshmen, which was tops in the Big 12 and ahead of second place Iowa State (3,327) and third-place Oklahoma (2,612). Kansas played only 126 snaps on both sides of the ball by freshmen, tops in the league.
- Conversely, Baylor played the third-fewest snaps by freshmen in the Big 12, with 5,159 snaps by seniors. Iowa State played the fewest senior snaps (3,214), followed by West Virginia (4,038). Oklahoma State played seniors 11,713 snaps, with Texas Tech playing 11,617 snaps by seniors.
- Baylor ranked seventh in the Big 12 in terms of offensive/defensive snaps by juniors (led by WVU) and sixth by sophomores (led by Iowa State).

10TH ANNIVERSARY OF MCLANE STADIUM OPENING

- The game vs. Tarleton marked the 10th anniversary of the opening of McLane Stadium, a 45,140-seat facility sitting on the banks of the Brazos River. McLane Stadium opened on Aug. 31, 2014 with a 45-0 drubbing of SMU in front of 45,733, the first game after a 2013 Big 12 Conference Championship season and the first game of a 2014 Big 12 Conference Championship season.
- The 45-3 win over Tarleton actually marked the best defensive performance in the program since the 45-0 shutout of the 'Stangs in 2014.

PRESEASON HONORS

- The Bears have had several players honored in the preseason during watch list season. Among the most notable include senior WR Monaray Baldwin, who is No. 41 on the Bruce Feldman Freak's List, in addition to a spot on the Reese's Senior Bowl Watch List. WR Josh Cameron is a preseason All-America selection as a punt returner, Ashyryn Hawkins is on the Biletnikoff Award Preseason Watch List, given to the nation's best WR, and CB Caden Jenkins is a preseason all-conference pick.
- QB Dequan Finn is on the Maxwell, Davey O'Brien, Johnny Unitas Golden Arm and Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Preseason Watch List. Hall Presley sits on the College Sports Communicators Comeback Player of the Year Award Watch List and OLB Kyler Jordan is on the Wuerffel Trophy Watch List.
- RB Richard Reese sits on the Hornung Award and Jet Award preseason watch lists.

BAYLOR HONORED 1974 SWC CHAMPS

- Baylor football honored the 1974 Southwest Conference Championship team during halftime of the Sept. 14 matchup vs. Air Force at McLane Stadium.
- The Bears welcomed members of the 1974 'Miracle on the Brazos' team for the clash with the Falcons at 6:30 p.m., with the game televised live on FS1 and presented by Premier ER + Urgent Care. The game will also serve as the Baylor Family Weekend and Salute to Service contest.
- The Bears went 8-4 and 6-1 in league play to win the conference title, later advancing to the Cotton Bowl and finishing the season ranked No. 14 in the Associated Press poll. Led by Coach Grant Teaff in his third season, the Bears rallied from a 24-7 halftime deficit for a thrilling 34-24 comeback victory over Texas.
- In 1974, Baylor earned wins over No. 12 Oklahoma State, Florida State, No. 14 Arkansas, TCU, No. 12 Texas, No. 20 Texas Tech, SMU and Rice. Teaff was named AFCA Coach of the Year for a performance that saw the Bears go from winless in SWC play in 1973 to league champions in 1974. Six players from the team earned All-Southwest Conference honors, including All-Americans Aubrey Schulz (offensive line) and Derrel Luce (linebacker).

FOURTH-MOST WINS IN TEXAS IN LAST 10+ YEARS

- Through week 13 of the 2024 season, Baylor has won 105 games since 2011, fourth-most among the state of Texas' 12 FBS teams during that time.
- BU's 105 wins in the last 10+ years are shy of Texas A&M (111), TCU (106), Houston (105), and ahead of Texas (103), SMU (89), UTSA (83), Texas Tech (82), North Texas (74), Rice (63), Texas State (53) and UTEP (46).

- Baylor boasts 13 players who have already earned their undergraduate degrees, including Isaiah Davis (Abilene Christian), Ja'Quae Evans (Western Kentucky), DeQuan Finn (Toledo), Caleb James (Rice), Matt Jones, Devin Lemear, Steve Linton (Texas Tech), Treven Ma'ae, Brooks Miller, Garmon Randolph, Chateau Reed, Colin Truett (UT Chattanooga) and Josh White.

BEST PUNTING GAME IN SCHOOL HISTORY

- In the loss at No. 11/11 Utah on Sept. 7, Baylor sophomore Palmer Williams charted the best game in program history for a punter.
- A native of Advance, N.C., Williams punted six times, with each going over 50 yards, including two downed inside the 20-yard line and one bouncing off the goalline pylon. He reset his career high four times, including punts of 57, 60, 76 and 79 yards. His average of 62.7 yards per punt marked a new single-game best in Baylor history.
- Williams became the first Bear with a 70+ yard punt since Drew Galitz did so on Sept. 16, 2017, and Williams now leads the nation with a 57.9-yard punt average for the season, more than seven yards better than the next ranked punter.

BEARS ROLL IN SEASON LID-LIFTER

- The Bears posted a 45-3 win over Tarleton in the season opener, which marked the 10th anniversary of the opening of McLane Stadium, which debuted on Aug. 31, 2014 with a 45-0 shutout of SMU. The defensive performance vs. Tarleton was Baylor’s best since the 45-0 win over SMU in 2014 in the lid-lifter for McLane Stadium.
- Baylor saw its defense hold Tarleton to nine first downs, 181 yards of total offense and just 80 yards passing. Offensively, QB Dequan Finn had a pair of TD passes and added a 39-yard rush in his debut, throwing for 192 yards. Ketron Jackson Jr., Michael Trigg and Ashtyn Hawkins each hauled in TD grabs, with sophomore RB Dawson Pendergrass adding his sixth career rushing TD. The Bears rolled to 442 yards of total offense, including 164 on the ground and 278 passing. Defensively, LB Matt Jones and DL Jackie Marshall each had seven tackles to lead the team and LB Keaton Thomas returned an interception for a TD, adding four stops.

CADEN JENKINS READY FOR ENCORE

- As a freshman Caden Jenkins was a big-play machine and earned freshman All-America honors as a second teamer from The Athletic. He had three interceptions to lead the Baylor defense, which ranked tied for second in the nation among freshmen.

FOURTH OLDEST NON-KICKER IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL

- Baylor junior defensive lineman David Marshall is the fourth-oldest non-kicker in college football. Marshall joined the roster prior to the 2023 season after a junior college season at Navarro College. He previously served in the military.
- Only New Mexico’s Colby Brewer (age 29), Arkansas WR Monte Harrison (27) and Kansas LB Alex Raich (27) are older than Marshall in college football.

FEMALE LEADERSHIP IN PROGRAM

- Baylor is one of just three power-4 conference schools in the country with a lead female sport program administrator and a female director of operations, with Deputy AD Jovan Overshown leading the program and Landrie Walsh serving as Director of Football Operations.
- Only Kansas State, Maryland and Baylor qualify in this category, with Kacey Harper serving as the DFO for the Wildcats and Jill Shields as the SPA, and Colleen Sorem (SPA) and Annie Peppard (DFO) in those roles in Maryland.
- There are 11 female DFOs in college football and just six in power-4 conferences, including four in the Big 12.

REESE’S PIECES

- Baylor junior running back Richard Reese enters his third year in the backfield for the Bears and is quickly carving out a spot in Baylor history with his production.
- The Bellville, Texas, native sits No. 27 all-time in Baylor rushing history. He is coming off a season that saw him rush for two TDs and 306 yards, a year after he ranked fifth among college football freshman in rushing with 982 yards and 14 TDs. His 16 career rushing TDs ranks shy of the top-10, which starts with Bryce Petty and Devin Chafin with 21 TDs.
- Reese was selected to attend the 2024 Big 12 Media Days in Las Vegas in the preseason and is a key member of a running back room that also includes Baylor’s top two rushers from 2023, Dominic Richardson and Dawson Pendergrass, and dynamic redshirt freshman Bryson Washington.
- Reese shined in 2023 as a kick returner, taking a pair of kickoff to the house for TDs in the season finale vs. West Virginia.

ADDING VIA THE PORTAL

- Coach Dave Aranda has added 22 players via the transfer portal for the 2024 season. It marked the second largest portal addition for the Bears under Aranda, as BU added 13 players via the portal for the 2023 season, which came a year after adding a limited number for the 2022 season.
- Baylor has a total of 39 new players in 2024, with 56.4 percent of that group coming in the from of transfers, including walk-ons.
- Portal additions include Michael Trigg (Ole Miss), Ashtyn Hawkins (Texas State), Dequan Finn (Toledo), Steve Linton (Texas Tech), Keaton Thomas (NE Miss. CC), Kendrick Simpkins (WKU), Lorando Johnson (Arkansas), Jamaal Bell (Nevada), Isaiah Davis (Morehead State), Cameren Jenkins (UNLV), Rara Dillworth (East Carolina), JaQues Evans (WKU), Ronnie Mageo (Miss. Gulf Coast CC), Ka’Marii Landers (Copiah-Lincoln [Miss.] CC), Omar Aigbedion (Montana State), Sidney Fugar (South Carolina), Colin Truett (UT Chattanooga), Colton Thomasson (Texas A&M), Seth Weller (Redlands CC), Tonga Lolohea (Tyler JC), Elinus Noell III (Texas Southern) and Caleb James (Rice).

WELCOME TO THE FUDGE CENTER

- On Monday, Aug. 19, after a weekend move, the Baylor football program officially opened the Fudge Family Development Center, a sparkling new \$89.6 million dollar facility that houses all things Baylor football.
- On the strength of a \$15 million dollar gift from the Fudge Family, Baylor has built one of the best football development centers in the nation, housing state-of-the-art locker rooms, team meeting spaces, walk-thru rooms, coaching offices, athletic medicine and strength & conditioning spaces. In addition, the facility added 20 yards and revamped the Allison Indoor Facility.

PERSON > PLAYER

- A hallmark of Coach Dave Aranda’s philosophy in building a program is placing an importance on understanding that the person is more important than the player. This mantra is executed in everything the program touches on a daily basis. Throughout the football building, signage adorns the walls that emphasize, “better people make better players” and that Baylor will “win with character”.
- Aranda preaches that players focus on today and be authentically themselves in an effort to be comfortable and confident in their roles.

HANKINS TAKING AIM AT RECORD BOOKS

- Baylor returns a three-year starter in the field-goal role, redshirt junior Isaiah Hankins. Hankins has been the starting kicker for the majority of the 2021 and 2023 seasons. He opened the year in the role in 2022 before veteran John Mayers - who finished his career ranked third all-time in points scored - regained the job that he had previously lost to Hankins in 2021.
- Hankins, a native of Little Rock, Ark., is a lefty kicker who enters his fourth year on campus ranked among the program leaders in a bevy of kicking categories. In BU career history, he checks in in the top 10 in points, field goals made, attempts, field-goal percentage, PAT kicks made, PAT attempts and PAT kick percentage. In Baylor single-season history, his 2021 season ranked him eighth in points scored, sixth in PATs made and PAT attempts, third in field-goals made and fourth in attempts in 2023.

D-PENDY EMERGES

- In 2023, the Bears used true freshman running back Dawson Pendergrass extensively as his brusing nature of running and ability in the pass game proved to be productive. A 6-foot-2, 218-pound product of Alba, Texas, Pendergrass totaled 79 carries for 338 yards and a team-leading five TDs. He also caught 26 balls - fourth on the team - for 199 yards and two TDs.
- Among freshmen with 75 or more carries in 2023, Pendergrass ranked sixth in terms of total offensive grades.

LONG SNAPPER OF EXCELLENCE

- Baylor returns a three-year starter at long snapper in redshirt junior Garrison Grimes. After suffering a season-ending injury in week six at UCF, Grimes turned the job over to true freshman Dylan Schaub, a former high school linebacker who excelled in the role in place of Grimes, including a spot coming off the bench to snap the game-winning field goal of the UCF comeback win.
- Grimes is a clear leader of the team, is a 6-foot-4, 225-pound physical presence who has returned fully from injury to solidify the role again in 2024. Grimes boasts a tremendous ability as a punt coverage specialist and had a pair of fumble recoveries in a matchup with No. 4 Texas in 2023.
- Grimes, a native of American Fork, Utah, is the son of former Baylor offensive coordinator/tight ends coach Jeff Grimes. Jeff took over as the offensive coordinator at Kansas in the offseason and Garrison’s younger brother joined his father at Kansas as a walk-on defensive end.

DISCIPLINE SHOWS IN PENALTY AVOIDANCE

- Under Coach Dave Aranda, the Bears have consistently been one of the best teams in the nation in avoiding penalties. In 2023, the Bears led the Big 12 in fewest penalty yards per game and rank sixth nationally.
- Baylor ranked fourth in the Big 12 in terms of fewest penalty yards per game from 2020-23 and third among teams that have been in the Big 12 all of those seasons.

WALK-ON TO WEAPON - THE JOSH CAMERON STORY

- Baylor junior wide receiver Josh Cameron is a veteran presence and leader for the BU wide outs. He came to the Bears as a walk-on receiver from powerhouse Cedar Park High School and quickly earned a role after his redshirt season.
- Cameron, a 6-foot-1, 218-pounder, is a noted tough-catch maker, with a real ability to make crucial, clutch catches while going across the middle. He has routinely been singled out as one of the best run blockers among the receiving corps while also showcasing an ability to be a surehanded option in punt returns.
- Largely limited to fair catches in his punt return role in 2023, when Cameron was unleashed in that role he excelled, including a 15.5 yard average in 2023 that saw him return a punt 70 yards.
- In 2024, Cameron has continued to breakout, leading the team with seven TD catches, including a three-TD game in a rout of Texas Tech in Lubbock. Cameron also leads the nation in punt returns, averaging 22.5 yards per return.

GRAB YOUR SNAXX

- A welcome addition to the Baylor secondary in the offseason was the re-addition of redshirt senior cornerback Lorando Johnson.
- Johnson played his first three years at Baylor and was a key member of the cornerback rotation, before transferring to Arkansas for the 2023 season. Johnson, nicknamed “Snaxx” for his love of snacks, started all 12 games at Arkansas between corner and nickel, with career highs in tackles (29), TFLs (4), and PBUs (5).
- Johnson, a 6-foot, 192-pounder started the Sugar Bowl in 2021 for the Bears, during his redshirt freshman season, then started 12 games in 2022. He has the ability to play both cornerback and STAR and brings an experience, competitive energy and juice to the secondary that benefits the back-end of the defense.

BROTHER BEAR

- Baylor has a pair of brothers on its 2024 roster, including defensive backs Caden and Cameren Jenkins, and offensive lineman Kaden and Koltin Sieracki.
- The Jenkins are reunited after Cameren started his career in the safety rotation at UNLV last year and joins his 2023 Freshman All-America brother, Caden, who starred at cornerback in 2023.
- The Sierackis are reunited after Kaden played his last two years for the Bears, redshirting in 2022 and earning a starting job in 2023. Koltin was a highly recruited prospect out of The Woodlands and is currently a true freshman who is fighting for time at center.

REVAMPING TIGHT ENDS

- From 2021-23 Baylor’s tight ends were coached by its offensive coordinator, Jeff Grimes, making him one of a handful of OCs nationally to also coach tight ends. This has led to a large amount of talent in the tight end room at the fingertips of new OC Jake Spavital.
- The Bears return several key players in the rotation at TE in 2024, including sophomore Matthew Klopfenstein and junior Kelsey Johnson. In addition, the Bears have welcomed dynamic talent Michael Trigg to the roster. A 6-foot-4, 246 pound fourth-year junior, Trigg transferred in the spring from Ole Miss and Southern Cal, as a former four-star, top-100 recruit. Trigg is a former Mackey Tight End of the Year Award Watch List member.
- In addition to Trigg, Klopfenstein and Johnson, the Bears have redshirt freshman Hawkins Polley as a key option, with Polley playing in two games that included a touchdown grab in an overtime clash with Houston. Veteran Gavin Yates has taken to the new Spavital system and gives the Bears great options at the up-back role, in addition to tight end sets and as a special teams force.

DEEP RB ROOM

- Baylor’s running back room is loaded with talent, including 2022’s leading rusher, Richard Reese, who had 14 TDs as a freshman, and a pair of backs who ranked first and second on the team in rushing yards and sophomore Dawson Pendergrass.
- Redshirt freshman Bryson Washington has also emerged as a key member of the room, after playing in three games in 2023 to maintain a redshirt and following an injury in fall camp that limited his ability to make a splash, despite being a story of spring practice.
- The tailbacks are set to shine in an new offense that shifts from the grind-it-out style of 2021-23, opening up the offensive attack under new offensive coordinator Jake Spavital, who while at his last stop in 2023 at Cal, helped Jayden Ott to a prolific season.

JONES, THOMAS LEAD INSIDE LINEBACKERS

- A story of spring and fall camp has been the play of Baylor’s inside linebackers. Led by sixth-year senior Matt Jones, and future standout JUCO transfer Keaton Thomas, the Bears are positioned to have that group be a unit of strength in 2024.
- Jones, a 6-foot-4, 245-pounder, has been a three-year starter for the Bears, including last two years at inside linebacker and one year at outside linebacker during the 2021 Big 12 Championship season. In 2023, Jones started all 12 games at inside linebacker and led the team with 82 tackles and 11.5 tackles for a loss. He added three sacks, five pass break-ups and one QB hurry with two 10+ tackle games.
- Since 2013, Jones 11.5 TFL were the fifth-most by a Baylor ILB, behind only Taylor Young’s 13.5 TFL in 2015, Eddie Lackey’s 13.0 in 2013, Terrel Bernard’s 12.5 TFL in 2021 and Bryce Hager’s 12.0 in 2014.
- It took Baylor very little time to recognize that Thomas had star potential opposite Jones at the linebacker level. Thomas was a choice to attend Big 12 Media Days, along with Jones, due to his clear vocal and physical leadership, in addition to this ability to change the game with a quick-twitch nature and athleticism. A former walk-on safety at West Virginia who transitioned to Northeast Mississippi Community College, Thomas, a 6-2, 224 pound native of Jacksonville, Fla., had 107 tackles - second most in junior college football - in 2023 as a redshirt freshman.
- This position group, coached by Dave Aranda and Jamar Chaney, also boasts several additional talented options, including redshirt sophomore Jeremy Evans, redshirt sophomore Carmello Jones, senior transfer Rara Dillworth, redshirt senior Josh White, and a freshman options in Kyland Reed.

RANKED IN 10 OF LAST 14 SEASONS

- Baylor has been ranked in the AP Top 25 in 10 of 14 seasons since 2010, after going 17 years between national rankings (1993-2010). BU has been ranked in 23 of 25 spots since 2013 (exceptions No. 1 and No. 23).
- Baylor was ranked or receiving votes in 10 of 16 polls in 2022, was receiving votes in the 2023 preseason poll and earned a vote in the Nov. 24, 2024 poll.

JACKIE MARSHALL BACK TO FULL HEALTH

- One of the most impactful injuries for the Bears in 2023 came in the form of defensive lineman Jackie Marshall, who went down during the spring and missed the 2023 season.
- Marshall, who played linebacker as a redshirt freshman in 2022 and earned praise as a future standout, was shifting full time to the defensive line to rave reviews in the spring before the 2023 season.
- Since returning from injury in the spring of 2024, Marshall has been a key member of the defensive line. An athletic 6-foot-3, 290-pounds, Marshall has worked hard to add strength to his frame and is positioned to have a big season as a redshirt junior, with the possibility of him getting a medical redshirt for his missed 2023 season.
- As a redshirt freshman in 2022, Marshall had 22 tackles, two for a loss and one fumble recovery, owning two QB hurries and three PBUs in 12 of 13 games.

YOUNG DB TALENT

- Baylor had a smorgasbord of freshman talent on the field in 2023 and none shined more than a pair of freshmen corner backs, including Caden Jenkins and Carl Williams IV.
- Jenkins earned All-America honors while making seven starts. The 6-foot-1, 177-pounder had 37 tackles, three interceptions, three PBUs and two fumble recoveries.
- Williams emerged quickly as a leader for the defense, playing in all 12 games with five starts at STAR. He ranked No. 38 in the nation among all qualified cornerbacks in pass coverage. He came in as a cornerback and shifted full time to the STAR role midway through the year.
- Beyond Jenkins and Williams the Bears are boosted by Levar Thornton Jr., a redshirt freshman who stands 6-foot-3, Reggie Bush II, Tevin Williams III, and the return of senior Lorando Johnson, who started 12 games at CB for the Bears in 2022 before starting 12 games for Arkansas in 2023. Miami (Fla.) transfer Isaiah Dunson is working his way back from injury, and started the season opener in 2023.
- At safety, juniors Devin Lemear and Devyn Bobby have been key starters on the back end of the defense, and Chateau Reed had a breakout season where he started all 12 games at cornerback in 2023.

MCLANE STADIUM ENHANCEMENTS

- Baylor has enhanced the nation's best game stadium, McLane Stadium, in the offseason, completing an eight-figure project, including installation of upgraded and additional videoboards, the construction of new production control rooms, and the addition of a premium hospitality structure.
- The LED ribbon board displays and the main videoboard display, which were original to McLane Stadium since its construction in 2014, have been upgraded to enhance both functionality and the visual elements of the fan experience. A high-quality video display is being added to the back of the main videoboard structure to add revenue opportunities and enhance the South Plaza experience on game days.
- The south end zone of McLane will become even more of a focal point during games, as a premium hospitality clubhouse will be added beneath the video board, providing a one-of-a-kind experience along with a Berm-view of the action.
- The construction of new production control rooms on the east side of the stadium will allow Baylor to produce multiple broadcasts at one time and fully centralize operations.

SLEW OF ELITE WR OPTIONS

- The Bears are boosted by a group of standout wide receiver options in 2024, including key returners in Monaray Baldwin, Ketron Jackson Jr., Hal Presley and Josh Cameron. That group of four have played significant football and been key targets throughout their careers, with Baldwin, Jackson and Presley working through injuries over the 2022-23 seasons and Cameron establishing himself as a weapon after coming to the Bears as a walk-on from powerhouse Cedar Park High School.
- In addition to the veteran returnees, the Bears have added weapons in Ashtyn Hawkins, a transfer from Texas State, where he set the program standard in receiving, Nevada's all-time leading kickoff returner Jamaal Bell, and freshman standout Jadon Porter.
- Additional options at WR include Cameron Bonner, Jonah Burton - who was a story of 2023 fall camp and earned starting roles in 2023. True freshman Jadon Porter has also made a splash early in his career and has earned significant praise from WR coach Dallas Baker.

OFFENSIVE LINE SEASONING

- The Baylor offensive line is looking to regain a pride point in the program after a season that saw the Bears play a bevy of youthful talent in 2023. BU returns four offensive line starters, welcomes some key transfers, and has created some talented depth in the offseason.
- From 2023, Baylor returns starting sophomore center Coleton Price, starting tackles in senior Campbell Barrington and sophomore Alvin Ebosole, and has competition at guard including junior Ryan Lengyel and transfers in junior Omar Aigbedion and junior Sidney Fugar. Freshman Koltin Price is in the mix at center and his brother, sophomore Kaden, was a key starter in 2023, seeing time at tackle and guard.
- The Bears have also added a transfer option at tackle in Colton Thomasson and center Colin Truett, with freshmen who redshirted in 2023, including Sean Thompkins and Isaiah Robinson, providing the line some depth.
- Baylor had one of the nation's best offensive lines in 2021 when it won the Big 12 Championship and a productive group in 2022. With four freshman starting throughout the season in 2023, the Bears have gained valuable experience and have added strength to the group in terms of size.

YOUTHFUL CORE RETURNS

- The Bears returned a bevy of youthful talent from a roster that got significant experience in 2023.
- Among the players who played as true freshman and enter 2024 as sophomores, including CB Caden Jenkins, S Carl Williams IV, S DJ Coleman, RB Dawson Pendergrass, TE Matthew Klopfenstein, WR Micah Gifford, DL Brendan Bett, DL Trey Wilson, LS Dylan Schaub, CB LeVar Thornton Jr., RB Bryson Washington, CB Tay'Shawn Wilson, S Jacob Redding, TE Hawkins Polley, and P Palmer Williams.
- The Bears also return three-year sophomores that saw significant action in 2023, including CB Reggie Bush II, S Corey Gordon Jr., LB Carmello Jones, LB Jeremy Evans, OLB Kyler Jordan, DL Devonte Tezino, C Coleton Price, OL Kaden Sieracki and OL Alvin Ebohole.

HALL MAKES 40 UNDER 40 LIST

- Baylor first-year associate head coach / running backs coach Khenon Hall was honored as a member of the Dave Campbell's Texas Football 40 Under 40 List, honoring the top up-and-coming football coaches in the state.
- Hall is a recruiting dynamo who joined the Bears after two seasons on the staff at SMU, where he was the running backs coach.
- Hall is a product of Dallas South Oak Cliff High School and boasts previous coaching stops at Texas Southern, Illinois State and New Mexico.

WINNING THE TURNOVER BATTLE

- Baylor has forced more turnovers than it has allowed in 59 games under head coach Dave Aranda.
- BU has 95 takeaways (62 INTs, 32 FR) and 70 giveaways (43 INTs, 28 FL) in 59 games under Aranda.
- Baylor has scored 16 non-offensive touchdowns in 57 games under Aranda – six kickoff returns (Bell, Reese x 2, Ebner x 3), six interception returns (Pitre x 2, Thomas, McCarty, Walcott, Woods), one punt return (Holmes) and four fumble returns (Vaughns, Jenkins, Hall, Woods).

PALMER WILLIAMS FOR AN ENCORE

- A strength of the nation's top-ranked special teams unit in 2023 was the emergence of freshman punter Palmer Williams. A 6-foot-2, 201-pound native of Advance, N.C., joined the program as the No. 3 punter recruit in the nation out of high school. He punted 37 times for 43.08 yards per punt with a long 53 and six punts of 50 or more yards.
- In 2023, he downed eight punts inside the 20-yard line and allowed just one touchback, with 13 forced fair catches. A total of 20 of his 35 punts were either fair caught or downed inside the 20-yard line.

SPRING ENROLLEES

- A total of 19 of Baylor's newcomers arrived on campus to participate in spring practice.
- Among the spring enrollees included transfers Michael Trigg (Ole Miss), Ashtyn Hawkins (Texas State), Dequan Finn (Toledo), Steve Linton (Texas Tech), Keaton Thomas (NE Miss. CC), Kendrick Simpkins (Western Kentucky), Lorando Johnson (Arkansas), Jamaal Bell (Nevada), Cameren Jenkins (UNLV), JaQues Evans (Western Kentucky) and Omar Aigbedion (Montana State).
- Freshman early enrollees included Kyler Beaty, Nate Bennett, Kris Wokomah, Kyland Reed, Brock Jackson, Koltin Sieracki and Jadon Porter.
- Several transfers have enrolled during the summer, including Rara Dillworth (East Carolina), Ronnie Mageo (Miss. Gulf Coast CC), Sidney Fugar (South Carolina), Colin Truett (UT Chattanooga), Colton Thomasson (Texas A&M), Tonga Lolohea (Tyler JC) and Elinus Noell III (Texas Southern).

STAFF ADDITIONS

- Baylor had a productive offseason in terms of adding to its coaching staff. The Bears have a new offensive coordinator in Jake Spavital, the former Texas State head coach and most recently the OC at Cal, with previous stops at Texas A&M and West Virginia.
- Baylor added a recruiting dynamo in Khenon Hall, the associate head coach and recruiting coordinator, after he previously led SMU's recruiting efforts. New offensive line coach Mason Miller comes to the Bears from Tarleton, where he was the offensive coordinator and was a former head coach at McMurray. Miller is from the Air Raid tree, having served as the offensive line coach under Coach Mike Leach at Mississippi State and Washington State.
- The Bears have also added a new tight ends coach in longtime state of Texas assistant Jarrett Anderson, who served as the OC and longtime assistant at TCU, and one of the nation's best defensive line coaches in Inoke Breckterfield, who helped Washington to a 14-1 season in 2023 while leading that defensive front, and reunites Breckterfield with Coach Dave Aranda, who had him on his staff as the DC at Wisconsin.
- Baylor also welcomed Jamar Chaney as the inside linebackers coach after he coached linebackers at Western Kentucky. It is a key role as Aranda is the defensive play caller and leading the inside linebackers room.
- Beyond the on-field staff, the Bears have added coaching veterans to the quality control and graduate assistant staff, including former on-field coaches in Joe D'Orazio - from Maine - Weston Glaser - from Sam Houston - Mark Scott - who will lead special teams after serving in assistant role at Houston - and Kyle Segler - from ULM. GAs include former NFL wide out and Georgia staffer C.J. Germany, Elijah McQueen and former NFL offensive lineman Craig Watts. In addition, former college basketball player Duke DaRe is on the QC staff, along with returning QCs in Rhett Holcomb, Ryan Pollard and Joe Ludwig.
- Off the field, veteran administrator Jeff Grigus was elevated to Chief of Staff, Landrie Walsh directs all operations and the Bears added Callie Cameron as Director of Player Personnel, Earl Chevalier as Director of Player Development and Operations and former LSU safety Ed Paris as Assistant Director of Player Personnel.
- The Bears revamped their approach to NIL in the offseason, starting with a strong approach to retaining its youthful talent in November. Behind the addition of NIL General Manager David Kaye - a longtime administrator at Baylor - and Keava Soil-Cormier moving into the Associate AD for NIL Administration & Pro Relations role, the Bears have quickly emerged as an industry leader in the NIL space, working alongside the Baylor collective, GXG.

BEARS LAUNCH BAYLOR+

- Baylor Athletics has launched Baylor+, the official content platform for the Bears. It will offer fans an insider’s look into the experiences of student-athletes and coaches as well as the compelling stories that shape Baylor Athletics. Baylor+ will feature exciting coverage of the current teams in Waco, while celebrating beloved Bears’ Legends and pivotal moments from the past.
- Through an exciting new partnership with Sport & Story, the leading provider of creative storytelling content in college athletics, Baylor+ is unlike anything Baylor fans have experienced before. The platform will be the home for an extensive range of original content covering all of Baylor’s sports programs, with behind-the-scenes access, captivating interviews, never-before-seen archival material and historical documentary films, as well as news and information.

FOOTBALL HISTORY

- The Bears are entering their 123rd season of football in 2024. The Bears have fielded a varsity team every year since 1899, save the 1906, 1943 and 1944 seasons.
- BU has won nine conference titles, including in 2021, with three Big 12 Championships and six Southwest Conference Championships.
- Baylor’s first season came in 1899-1900, a 5-1 record under Coach R.H. Hamilton that included two wins over Toby’s Business.

ONE STANDARD. ONE ACCORD.

- Baylor unveiled a mission statement under Vice President and Director of Intercollegiate Athletics Mack Rhoades in the fall of 2018, “One Standard. One Accord”, which is centered on the distinct purpose of *Preparing Champions for Life* through academic achievement, athletic success, spiritual growth and character formation.
- Baylor is situated on a 1,000-acre campus located on the Brazos River in Waco, Texas, and was chartered in 1845 by the Republic of Texas through the efforts of Baptist pioneers. It is the oldest continually operating university in Texas. Baylor is a R1 Institution according to the Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Education
- BU sponsors 19 varsity sports as members of the Big 12 Conference and boasts the 2021 Men’s Basketball National Champions, the 2005, 2012 and 2019 Women’s Basketball National Champions and the 2004 Men’s Tennis National Champions, in addition to 88 Big 12 Conference Championships in the league’s 25-year history.

Freshman running back **Richard Reese** ran for a career-high 186 yards and two touchdowns on 31 carries to help Baylor defeat Kansas, 35-23, on a Homecoming Saturday afternoon at McLane Stadium.

After KU (5-3, 2-3) scored 20 unanswered points in the second half, Reese gained all but one yard on a seven-play, 69-yard scoring drive and punched one in from two yards out to stem the tide and help Baylor (4-3, 2-2) win its 13th-straight against the Jayhawks.

In a dominant first half that saw the Bears outgain the Jayhawks, 250-85, BU took a 28-3 lead into the locker room. **Blake Shapen** connected with **Monaray Baldwin** for a 17-yard TD pass to open the scoring. Reese scored his first touchdown of the day on a 14-yard scamper before the Jayhawks got on the board with a 30-yard field goal. Then, **Kyron Drones** came in for two plays in a specialty goalline package to cap a 16-play, 73-yard drive with a four-yard keeper that stretched the lead to 21-3.

Pinned back to their one-yard line on a punt, Baylor responded with a 15-play, 99-yard drive and made it 28-3 following a 10-yard end-around TD by freshman **Jordan Nabors**. The Bears almost cashed in for more after they got the ball back on a forced fumble by **Devin Neal** and return by **Devin Lemear**, but **Ben Sims** dropped a would-be touchdown in the end zone and Shapen was picked off on the very next play.

A strip-sack snuffed out Baylor’s impressive start to the second half, as KU returned a Shapen fumble to the 9 which led to a two-yard touchdown run. Kansas continued to make things interesting in the fourth quarter as Jason Bean connected with Quentin Skinner on a 24-yard TD pass and finished off a 93-yard drive with a four-yard run after the Jayhawks’ defense stopped Baylor on a fourth-and-one play.

With the lead cut to five, Baylor answered with Reese’s ground attack and iced the game on the freshman’s ninth rushing TD of the season with 2:37 left to play.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Baylor leads the all-time series with Kansas, 18-4, including an 11-0 mark in games played in Waco.
- BU set a program record for time of possession at 40:10.
- Freshman **Richard Reese** set career highs in carries (31) and rushing yards (186).
- Reese’s 31 carries are the most by a Bear since Terrance Ganaway ran it 42 times vs. Texas Tech in 2011.
- Freshman **Jordan Nabors** found the end zone for the first time in his career on a 10-yard run.
- **Al Walcott** recorded his first sack of the season and third of his career.
- **Chidi Ogbonnaya** played in his 53rd career game, tying Raleigh Texada for fourth in program history.

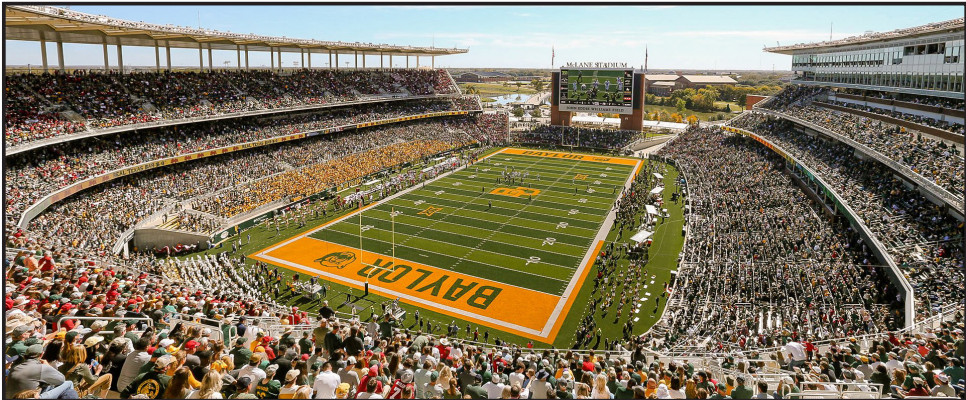

McLANE STADIUM



- McLane Stadium has served as the home of Baylor football since the 2014 season, when the Bears moved over from historic Floyd Casey Stadium, their home for the previous 64 seasons.
- The Bears own a 41-26 record at McLane Stadium and a 384-248-27 record overall at home over a span of 118 seasons.
- The season attendance record was set in 2014, the debut of McLane Stadium, when an average of 46,710 attended each game, with a total of 280,257. A total of 318,621 attended seven games during the 2019 season.
- The single-game record for attendance came in 2015, a matchup with Oklahoma that saw 49,875 attend at McLane Stadium.
- Under Coach Dave Aranda, the Bears own a 13-10 record at McLane Stadium.
- The stadium was built on a 93-acre site that includes 2,150 on-site parking spaces, 334 tailgating spots with 256 set for power and cable, 18 boat slips for Sailgating on the Brazos River and the Umphrey Pedestrian Bridge, connecting the stadium to Baylor’s picturesque campus.

- The stadium seats 45,140 and includes six founder’s suites, 36 suites, 79 loge boxes, club seating for 1,200, 200 concession points of sale and five retail stores.
- The Baylor locker room is 50 yards long and 17 yards wide.

STADIUM HISTORIES

- The 2013 season was Baylor’s 64th and final year of football at the 50,000-seat Floyd Casey Stadium. BU closed its run at the facility by winning its first Big 12 championship with a 30-10 victory over No. 23 Texas in the final game of the regular season.
- Originally named Baylor Stadium, the structure was built in 1950 after a bond sales program raised \$1.5 million for construction costs. The first game played in the new stadium was Sept. 30, 1950, a 34-7 Baylor victory over Houston.
- In 1989, the stadium was renamed Floyd Casey Stadium after longtime University supporter and trustee Carl B. Casey and his wife Thelma contributed \$5 million of an \$8 million renovation project in honor of his father, Floyd (the name change was officially announced at halftime of the 1988 Homecoming game).

- Prior to the building of Baylor Stadium in 1950, several playing sites were used by the Bears. Baylor’s first football squad took the field in 1899, but no records are available to prove where it played. Old newspaper clippings and yearbook articles only indicate the first three seasons were played on an extremely rough field close to the school.
- From 1902 to 1925, with the exception of 1906 when football was banned on campus because it was deemed too violent, the Bears played most of their games at Carroll Field, an on-campus facility (an unknown number of games were also played at the old Cotton Palace during this period).
- The Bears played at the Cotton Palace from 1926-29 before returning to Carroll Field from 1930-35. The team moved off the main campus for good in 1936 when it began calling the newly built Waco Stadium home.
- Waco Stadium was renamed Municipal Stadium in 1942, and it was where Baylor played through 1949 except for a break from 1943-44 because of the war effort.

Making his Baylor debut, **Dequan Finn** threw two touchdowns and ran for another to lead the Bears to a season-opening 45-3 win over the Tarleton Texans Saturday night on the 10th anniversary of the first game played at McLane Stadium.

Baylor exploded for 21 first-quarter points, opening the scoring on a 39-yard option run by Finn. He went to the air for the second TD of the night, hooking up with **Ashtyn Hawkins** for a 32-yard strike. Another newcomer, linebacker **Keaton Thomas**, picked off a pass over the middle and returned it 35 yards for a touchdown, the first INT return for a TD by the Baylor defense in two years.

Sophomore running back **Dawson Pendergrass** was a workhorse on the night with 62 yards on 17 carries and a touchdown that capped off a nine-play, 66-yard drive to make it 28-0. The Bears had a chance to put it away late in the first half, but Finn was intercepted in the end zone. Tarleton missed a scoring opportunity in the final minute of the half after a shanked 24-yard field goal attempt left the score at 28-0 going into intermission.

The Texans got on the board with a FG on their first drive of the second half, but Baylor answered mid-way through the period with a 17-yard pass from Finn to **Michael Trigg**, the fourth newcomer to find pay dirt on the evening.

Three points from lefty kicker Isaiah Hankins and a late **Ketron Jackson Jr.** touchdown from **Sawyer Robertson** capped off the lid-lifting victory for BU.

POSTGAME NOTES

- BU is now 82-37-4 all-time in season openers, including 4-1 under fifth-year head coach Dave Aranda, and 92-27-4 in home openers.
- On the 10th Anniversary of McLane Stadium, Baylor held Tarleton to just three points, the fewest allowed since Aug. 31, 2014 vs. SMU -- the first game played at McLane Stadium.
- Four of BU's six touchdowns were scored by newcomers -- **Dequan Finn**, **Ashtyn Hawkins**, **Keaton Thomas** and **Michael Trigg**.
- This was the first time that Baylor had held a team scoreless in the first half since the 2022 Sugar Bowl vs. Ole Miss.
- 11 different receivers caught a pass on the night.
- Junior RB **Richard Reese** moved into 35th on the Baylor all-time rushing list with 1,356 career rushing yards.
- Junior DL **Jackie Marshall** posted a career-high seven tackles, including four solo, in his first action since suffering a season-ending injury in 2023.
- Redshirt sophomore LB **Keaton Thomas** recorded seven total tackles and returned an interception for a touchdown, BU's first pick-six since Oct. 29, 2022.

Falling behind 23-0 in the first 25 minutes of the game, Baylor rallied to make it a two-score game in the third quarter before falling to the 11th-ranked Utah Utes, 23-12, Saturday afternoon at Rice-Eccles Stadium in Salt Lake City.

The preseason Big 12 favorite, Utah jumped out to an early 14-0 lead on a pair of first-quarter touchdown passes by Cameron Rising, the second of which followed a strip-sack by the Utes' defense that was recovered at the Bears' 3-yard line.

Utah tacked on a 30-yard field goal by Cole Becker late in the first and then went up 23-0 when Spencer Fano blocked a field goal attempt by Baylor's **Isaiah Hankins** that was returned 77 yards for a touchdown by Tao Johnson.

With a chance to seemingly put it away after BU failed on a fourth-down play near midfield, Utah picked up a couple first downs before Becker missed wide right on an attempt from 45 yards. The Utes lost Rising with 1:47 left in the first half after an apparent hand injury.

Getting the ball back with only 29 seconds left in the half, the Bears used a 15-yard personal foul penalty to get in range for Hankins' 44-yarder as time expired, cutting the deficit to 23-3 at the half.

With Utah struggling on offense after freshman Isaac Wilson subbed in for Rising, Baylor put together an 11-play, 70-yard third-quarter drive, kickstarted by a 46-yard run by sophomore running back **Dawson Pendergrass**. Hankins' second field goal, this time from 40 yards out, made it a 23-6 game with 6:23 left in the third quarter.

After a three-and-out by the Utes, things got interesting with another 70-yard drive by the Bears that ended with **Dequan Finn**'s 47-yard TD pass to **Josh Cameron**, the first touchdown of the junior receiver's career. Trailing by 11 with just over a quarter to go, Baylor went for two but couldn't convert as Finn threw behind **Ketron Jackson Jr.**

In a critical fourth-quarter drive, Utah chewed more than seven minutes off the clock but Becker missed another field goal with 3:40 to go. Needing to score twice, BU picked up a couple first downs and got into opposing territory, but a 4th-and-14 play came up short.

Held to negative yards in the first quarter and just 48 total yards of offense in the first half, Baylor finished with 223 yards for the game and only lost the first down battle 15-12. The Utes had less than 100 yards in the second half, with most of it coming on their final time-consuming drive in the fourth quarter.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Baylor held Utah to just 95 total yards of offense in the second half, including just four yards in the third quarter and zero first downs.
- Redshirt sophomore LB **Keaton Thomas** led the Bears with a career-high 12 tackles.
- Senior LB **Matt Jones** also reached double digits with 10 stops, the fifth double-digit output of his career.
- Junior DL **Jackie Marshall** recorded his first-career sack.
- Junior WR **Josh Cameron** scored his first-career touchdown on a career-long 47-yard reception.
- Sophomore P **Palmer Williams** punted six times for 376 total yards, an average of 62.7 yards, a school record.
- Williams booted three punts over 60 yards, including a 76-yarder and a 79-yarder, and tied a single-game school record with six punts of longer than 50 yards.

Bouncing back from a turnover-plagued first half, the Baylor Bears scored twice in the first seven minutes of the third quarter and blew out the Air Force Academy Falcons, 31-3, Saturday night before a crowd of 46,212 at McLane Stadium.

Sawyer Robertson, subbing for an injured **Dequan Finn**, threw for a career-high 248 yards and added a six-yard TD run as the Bears (2-1) picked up a win in their final tune-up before Big 12 play. Redshirt freshman running back **Bryson Washington** made his first-career start and rushed for 106 yards and a touchdown on 12 carries, adding another 23 yards on one reception. Scoring on a 28-yard TD run, **Richard Reese** had 47 yards on eight totes, while **Ashtyn Hawkins** tallied 81 yards on four catches.

With Air Force (1-2) using its patient triple-option attack to keep the ball for 24 minutes in the first half, Baylor ran just 23 offensive plays and was clinging to a 6-3 lead on a pair of **Isaiah Hankins** field goals despite three fumbles.

BU had an early chance when **Caleb Parker** blocked a punt that **Josh White** recovered at the Falcons' 28-yard line. But, Robertson was dropped for a four-yard loss on third down, settling for a Hankins 46-yarder that opened the scoring.

Air Force got a game-tying field goal that capped a 16-play, 65-yard drive late in the second quarter. The two sides exchanged turnovers in the last couple of minutes of the half, with **Devyn Bobby** recovering a fumble that was forced by **Jackie Marshall**.

After a 22-yard pickup on a pass from Robertson to **Josh Cameron**, Hankins booted one just inside the left upright to give the Bears a 6-3 halftime lead.

In a dominant third quarter, Baylor took command with TD runs of 19 and six yards by Washington and Robertson, and added another Hankins field goal for a 23-3 lead. The Falcons turned it over on downs late in the third quarter before the Bears scored their final points of the night on Reese's 28-yard scamper and a two-point conversion run by Robertson.

POSTGAME NOTES

- The Baylor defense held Air Force to just a field goal, marking the first time that BU has not allowed a touchdown in back-to-back home games since 2014 (SMU & Northwestern State).
- The effort marked the first time since the 1989 season when Baylor has had two games with three points allowed or fewer in the same season.
- BU limited AF to just 25 yards passing, the fewest allowed by a BU defense since Sept. 23, 1989 vs. Kansas (seven).
- Junior QB **Sawyer Robertson** made his first start of the year and threw for a career-high 248 yards, while adding a six-yard rushing touchdown.
- Redshirt freshman RB **Bryson Washington** made the first start of his career and finished with 106 rushing yards on 12 carries and one touchdown.
- Senior LB **Matt Jones** racked up 11 tackles for his sixth-career double-digit tackle performance.
- Junior S **Devyn Bobby** recorded nine tackles to match his career best and recovered a fumble for the first time in his career.
- BU's blocked punt in the first quarter was its first since 2018 vs. Oklahoma State.
- This was the first time since 2021 vs. Texas Southern that the Bears did not punt in a game.
- Redshirt junior K **Isaiah Hankins** moved into a tie for third place on Baylor's all-time field goals made leaderboard with 38.

It took a miracle, but the Colorado Buffaloes pulled out a 38-31 overtime victory over the Baylor Bears Saturday night before a homecoming crowd of 52,794 at Folsom Field in the Big 12 opener for both teams.

Heisman candidate Shedeur Sanders completed a 43-yard Hail Mary touchdown to LaJohntay Wester on the last play of regulation and then Micah Welch scored from a yard out in the first overtime period as the Buffaloes (3-1, 1-0) won its first Big 12 game in returning to the league for the first time after 14 years in the Pac-12.

Baylor (2-2, 0-1) was poised to answer, camped on the 2-yard line after a 13-yard pickup by quarterback **Sawyer Robertson**, but **Dominic Richardson** fumbled the ball out of the back of the end zone after a hit by CU's Travis Hunter.

It was a heartbreaking loss for the Bears, who seemed to have the game in their grasps with Colorado out of timeouts and downed to the final two seconds in regulation. Hounded all night by a relentless Baylor pressure, Sanders was sacked eight times -- the Bears' most since 10 in the Sugar Bowl win over Ole Miss three years ago. But, he threw for 341 yards and two touchdowns and also scored the Buffs' first TD on a two-yard run.

Making his second-consecutive start of the season and sixth overall, Robertson completed 11 of 21 passes for 148 yards and two touchdowns and also scored on a 45-yard run on a fourth-and-one play in the second quarter that gave BU a 24-10 lead.

After going 0-for-6 in the third quarter, Robertson was 3-for-3 for 45 yards on an eight-play, 61-yard drive, capping it with a perfect 24-yard touchdown strike to **Hal Presley** to give the Bears the lead with 5:43 left in the game.

When the defense added back-to-back sacks that pushed CU back to its own 4-yard line, Baylor had a chance to throw the knockout punch when **Josh Cameron** returned a punt 20 yards to the CU 26. But, **Isaiah Hankins** missed a 45-yard field goal wide right with 2:16 to go that would have pushed the Bears' lead to double digits.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Baylor's 24 points in the first half were its most in a first half in a conference game since at Oklahoma (11/5/22).
- BU tallied eight sacks, its first in a game since racking up 10 in the 2021 Sugar Bowl, and 12 tackles for loss.
- Junior QB **Sawyer Robertson** recorded a 45-yard rushing TD, the longest rush of his career.
- Senior LB **Matt Jones** logged 10 total tackles, including a career-high nine solo, for his third-consecutive double-digit tackle output.
- Senior CB **Lorando Johnson** broke up three passes, a personal best, and extended his streak to five games with a PBU, dating back to 2023.
- Senior WR **Jamaal Bell** returned a kick for a 100-yard touchdown, the first KR TD of his career. He is the fourth Bear all time to record a kick return touchdown greater than 100 yards.

Digging an early hole, Baylor football couldn't overcome a 21-point first-quarter deficit and fell to 22nd-ranked BYU, 34-28, Saturday afternoon at McLane Stadium.

The Bears twice had chances to take the lead, but they turned it over on downs at the Cougars' 25 after a first-career interception by defensive lineman **Elinus Noel III** and then BYU safety Crew Wakley picked off a **Sawyer Robertson** pass intended for **Ashtyn Hawkins**.

In a career performance, Robertson completed 27-of-48 passes for 324 yards and three touchdowns and also scored on a 20-yard TD run. But, he was also picked off twice and sacked three times for 30 yards in losses.

BYU (5-0, 2-0) quarterback Jake Retzlaff threw for 216 yards and three touchdowns and added 53 yards and another score out he ground to account for the bulk of the Cougars' 367 yards of total offense. Wideout Darius Lassiter caught eight passes for 120 yards, including a 44-yard TD grab.

For the Bears (2-3, 0-2), redshirt junior wide receiver **Josh Cameron** also had a breakout game with seven catches for a career-high 125 yards and two touchdowns.

Facing a 31-14 deficit at the half, Baylor came back with a 15-yard TD pass from Robertson to Hawkins in the third quarter, and then pulled within a single score when Cameron hauled in a 23-yarder with 10:07 left in the game.

Scoring on each of its first four possessions, BYU jumped out to a 28-7 lead in the first 21 minutes of an opening half that saw the Cougars outgain the Bears, 286-216, and dominate time of possession, 17:59 to 12:01.

POSTGAME NOTES

- The Baylor defense held BYU to just 81 yards of total offense in the second half.
- Junior QB Sawyer Robertson had a career day, going 27-for-48 with 324 yards and three touchdowns.
- He became BU's first 300-yard passer since Blake Shapen threw for 316 at Cincinnati on Oct. 21, 2023.
- Robertson also added a 20-yard rushing TD, his third rushing touchdown of the season.
- Redshirt junior WR Josh Cameron put up career numbers with seven receptions for 125 yards and two touchdowns.

Baylor quarterback **Sawyer Robertson** threw for 258 yards and matched his career high with three touchdowns, but 16th-ranked Iowa State overcame an early double-digit deficit to hand the Bears their third-straight loss, 43-21, Saturday night at Jack Trice Stadium.

Against a Cyclones (5-0, 2-0) defense that had allowed 29 points all year, Robertson threw for 149 yards and two scores in the first half to give the Bears (2-4, 0-3) an early 14-3 lead. But, after Robertson found **Ketron Jackson Jr.** for a 25-yard TD pass and a 21-19 lead early in the third quarter, ISU scored 24 unanswered points to pull away late for the win.

Scoring touchdowns on each of their first two possessions, the Bears took a quick 14-3 lead on the Cyclones early in the second quarter. Iowa State capitalized on an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty and a kick out of bounds to march 30 yards in eight plays and tack on another Konrady field goal, this time from 38 yards out, trimming the lead to 14-6.

After the Cyclones' first defensive stop of the day, Iowa State struck quickly with a five-play, 84-yard drive and converted on third-and-goal with a 10-yard pass from Rocco Becht to tight end Benjamin Brahmer, cutting the deficit to 14-12.

Turning in the biggest play of the game, Iowa State's Myles Mendezsoon blocked a **Palmer Williams** punt and Caden Matson scooped it up and scored from 25 yards out to give Iowa State the 19-14 lead.

The Cyclones threatened late in the first half, but edge rusher **Garmon Randolph** dropped in coverage and picked off a Becht pass at the goal line.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Of Baylor's 258 passing yards, 198 came in the first half. Prior to facing BU, Iowa State had not allowed more than 125 passing yards in a game this season.
- Baylor's 21 points were the most scored against ISU so far in 2024.
- Junior QB Sawyer Robertson went 25-44-1 with 258 yards and three touchdowns, matching his career high.
- Redshirt sophomore LB Keaton Thomas led the team for the second-consecutive game with eight tackles.
- Senior OLB Garmon Randolph nabbed his second-career interception and first since 2021, also against ISU.

It was quite the homecoming for Baylor redshirt junior quarterback **Sawyer Robertson**, a Lubbock native who threw for 274 yards and a career-high five touchdowns to lead the Bears to a resounding 59-35 victory Saturday at Jones AT&T Stadium, knocking the hometown Texas Tech Red Raiders out of first place in the Big 12 standings.

Though Robertson had a relatively quiet first half, BU (3-4, 1-3) took a double-digit lead into the locker room, 24-14, after Robertson connected with **Josh Cameron** for the first of the junior receiver's three touchdowns on the day.

Tech (5-2, 3-1) scored on its opening drive of the third quarter, but Baylor reeled off 28 unanswered points and scored touchdowns on six of its last seven series of the game to pull away. Robertson helped created some of that cushion with third-quarter TD tosses of 11 yards to Cameron and 35 to **Hal Presley**. Continuing the second-half outburst, **Monaray Baldwin** caught a 24-yard touchdown pass and a 12-yarder to Cameron made it 52-21 with 9:41 left in the game.

Sandwiched between a pair of late Red Raiders scores, Toledo transfer **Dequan Finn** saw his first game action since Week 2 and scored on a 31-yard TD run.

Special teams played a huge role in a first half that saw the Bears lead by 10, as Cameron had a 73-yard punt return to inside the 1-yard line in addition to his six catches for 75 yards and three touchdowns. Redshirt freshman running back **Bryson Washington** had his second 100-yard day, rushing for a career-high 116 yards and two scores. After his second rushing TD, East Carolina transfer **Rara Dillworth** recovered a muffed kickoff at the TTU 19-yard line, but the Bears settled for a 31-yard field goal by **Isaiah Hankins**, the lefty's only non-PAT action of the day.

Baylor's 59 points were the most scored by an FBS program in Week Eight and tied for the most in a conference game in a Power Four league so far this season.

POSTGAME NOTES

- 59 points marked the most in a Big 12 game in the Dave Aranda era; the last time BU scored 50 or more against a conference opponent was Nov. 30, 2019, at Kansas.
- The Bears finished with a season-high 529 total yards of offense.
- Redshirt junior QB Sawyer Robertson threw for five touchdowns, the most by a Bear since Seth Russell vs. WVU (10/17/15).
- Redshirt freshman RB Bryson Washington logged a career-high 116 rushing yards and two touchdowns.
- Redshirt junior WR Josh Cameron hauled in three receiving touchdowns, the most by a Bear since Denzel Mims vs. UTSA (9/7/19).
- Senior LB Matt Jones recorded his 10th-career sack, leading the defense with nine total tackles and two pass breakups.
- Sophomore CB Caden Jenkins nabbed his first interception of the season.
- Sophomore DB Carl Williams IV posted a career-best seven tackles.
- Senior OLB Steve Linton made five solo stops, including three TFLs and a sack.

Sawyer Robertson threw for 222 yards and three touchdowns and added a 41-yard TD run in the fourth quarter to help the Baylor Bears down the Oklahoma State Cowboys, 38-28, Saturday before a Homecoming crowd of 44,987 at McLane Stadium in Waco.

Tied 17-17 at the half, Baylor (4-4, 2-3) took the lead for good when Robertson found **Ashtyn Hawkins** for a 33-yard touchdown pass over cornerback Korie Black and then put together an eight-play, 95-yard scoring drive in the fourth quarter that included two passes to Hawkins a the 41-yard scamper.

Including a career-high 142 yards by sophomore running back **Dawson Pendergrass**, the Bears rushed for 343 yards -- their first 300-yard game on the ground since 307 vs. Kansas in 2021. Pendergrass capped the scoring with a 55-yard TD run when he was pushed forward by left tackle **Sidney Fugar**. That four-play scoring drive came after OSU (3-5, 0-5) got within three points on a three-yard touchdown run by Ollie Gordon and a two-point conversion pass from him to Brennan Presley, who had a monster game with 15 catches for 183 yards.

The defense came up with the final nail in the Cowboys' coffin with **LeVar Thornton's** first-career interception with 1:22 left in the game. BU also came up with another timely turnover early in the second quarter when **Matt Jones** forced a Gordon fumble that **Steve Linton** recovered at the 1-yard line.

Baylor had drives of 99 and 95 yards, piling up 565 yards of total offense and marking the first time the Bears have eclipsed the 500-yard mark in back-to-back games since West Virginia and BYU in 2021.

In a back-and-forth first half where neither team led by more than seven, the Cowboys got on the board first with a 45-yard field goal by Logan Ward five minutes into the game. Baylor answered right back, as Hal Presley hauled in a career-long 53-yard pass to set up a 30-yard field goal by **Isaiah Hankins**.

The Bears wasted a golden scoring opportunity, getting the ball at the OSU 23-yard line after a **Josh Cameron** punt return and a 15-yard unsportsmanlike conduct penalty, but Robertson was picked off near the end zone. The BU QB came right back to throw TD passes of 12 yards to Presley and a one-yarder to tight end **Matthew Klopfenstein**, the first of his career.

OSU tied it up at 17-17 late in the half on a two-yard TD run by Gordon, who was held to 77 yards on 18 carries.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Baylor improved to 51-44-4 all-time on Homecoming and has won five of its last six, and 12 of last 14 Homecoming games.
- Baylor is 5-1 all-time when wearing Sailor Bear helmets on Homecoming.
- This is the first time since 2021 that the Bears have eclipsed 500 yards of total offense in back to back games.
- BU's 343 rushing yards is its most since 419 vs. Texas Southern (9/11/21) and first time over 300 since at Kansas (9/18/21).
- Sawyer Robertson became the first Baylor QB with three passing TDs and a 40+ yard rushing score since Robert Griffin III.
- Sophomore RB Dawson Pendergrass rushed for a career-high 142 yards, averaging 23.7 yards per carry on six totes.
- Senior LB Matt Jones led the squad with 12 tackles, including a career-high 10 solo stops, three TFL's, a sack and a forced fumble.
- Jones moved into a tie for seventh place on BU's all-time TFL leaderboard, with 34.0 in his career to tie the legendary Mike Singletary.
- This was Jones' fifth double-digit tackle performance of the season, the most by a Bear since 2018.

Bryson Washington rushed for a career-high 196 yards and four touchdowns and got Baylor in position for Isaiah Hankins' game-winning 33-yard field goal on the last play of the game as the Bears defeated TCU, 37-34, Saturday night at McLane Stadium.

Sawyer Robertson, who threw for 242 yards, converted a fourth-down play with a 15-yard pass to tight end Michael Trigg before Washington had a 13-yard burst up the middle down to the Frogs' 16.

Hankins, who missed an extra point earlier in the game, got the ultimate redemption with his game-winner splitting the uprights as the final seconds ticked off the clock.

In a back-and-forth second half, Baylor tied it up twice on touchdown runs of 1 by Dawson Pendergrass and 35 yards by Washington, his third score of the game. That deadlocked the game at 27-27 early in the fourth quarter.

After the Bears went up 34-27 on Washington's fourth TD run of the night, the Frogs answered quickly and tied it on a 24-yard touchdown pass.

With 1:55 and all three timeouts left, Baylor picked up one first down on three-straight Washington runs and another on Robertson's 14-yard throw to Josh Cameron. Going for it on 4th-and-9 from TCU's 44 with 16 seconds left, Robertson connected with Trigg over the middle, then Washington did the rest with his bull-like run up the middle to set up Hankins' game-winner.

The Bears trailed 17-13 at the half, giving up 10 unanswered points on a 46-yard field goal and one-yard QB sneak in the final minute of the second quarter. TCU had struck first on an eight-yard TD pass that capped a seven-play, 95-yard drive. But Baylor answered right back with a 10-play, 65-yard scoring drive finished by Washington with the first of his career-high four touchdown runs, this one from eight yards out to tie it up at 7-7.

Baylor finished with 499 yards of total offense, including its third-straight game with more than 250 yards rushing -- 257 yards on 44 attempts.

POSTGAME NOTES

- The win marked Baylor's first over TCU since 2019 and first at home since 2014.
- BU logged over 250 rushing yards for the third-straight game, its longest streak since the start of the 2016 season.
- Isaiah Hankins' game-winning field goal as time expired was the first walk-off kick for the Bears since John Mayers lifted BU over K-State in 2020.
- Redshirt freshman RB Bryson Washington rushed for a career-high 196 yards and four TDs.
- His four TDs were the most by a Bear since Terrance Ganaway's five vs. Washington in the 2011 Alamogordo Bowl.
- Washington's 196 yards rushing were the most by a Bear since Shock Linwood's 237 at Iowa State in 2016.

Bryson Washington totaled four touchdowns for the second-consecutive game and led the Bears to their first-ever win at Milan Puskar Stadium, beating West Virginia, 49-35, Saturday to become bowl eligible for the 12th time in the last 15 years.

Baylor put up 35 first-half points and then put the game away with a fourth-quarter TD runs of nine yards by Washington and 15 by Dawson Pendergrass, the secon one coming after Corey Gordon's third interception of the year.

Quarterback Sawyer Robertson threw for a career-high 329 yards, completing 26-of-36 passes and tossing TDs of 22 yards to Washington, 43 to Josh Cameron and a beautiful 40-yarder to Monaray Baldwin.

Coming off a career-high 196 yards and four touchdowns rushing in a win over TCU, Washington recorded his fourth 100-yard day of the season and third in his last four games, finishing with 123 yards and three touchdowns on 18 carries. He also had five catches for a career-high 59 yards.

In a wild ending to the first half, the two teams combined for five touchdowns in the last four and a half minutes as Baylor led 35-28 going into intermission.

With the two teams locked in a 14-14 tie through the first 25 minutes, the Bears regained the lead on Robertson's 40-yard strike to Baldwin, then went up two scores when Washington sprinted 51 yards up the gut.

When BU failed to recover an ensuing inside kick attempt with 2:13 left in the half, it took WVU just three plays and 26 seconds to score on a 23-yard TD run. Far from done, Robertson went 4-for-5 for 44 yards on a drive capped by another Washington TD from eight yards out with just 47 seconds left on the clock.

Using all three timeouts and every bit of those 47 seconds, the Mountaineers closed the half with an eight-play, 75-yard drive that included a 44-yard pass and a one-yard QB sneak that was reviewed and upheld for a score.

POSTGAME NOTES

- The win marked Baylor's first win in Morgantown over the Mountaineers.
- Baylor head coach Dave Aranda improved to 29-29 in his fifth year with the Bears.
- Baylor's win clinched bowl eligibility for the 27th time in program history, and 12th time in the last 15 years.
- BU has had at least 499 yards of total offense in each of its last four games, including 512 at WVU.
- 49 points were the most the Bears have scored against WVU since 2015 (BU, 62-38).
- Sawyer Robertson threw for a career-high 329 yards with three TDs. He opened the game completing 12 consecutive passes.
- Bryson Washington rushed for 123 yards, his fourth 100-yard day of the year, and totaled four touchdowns for the second time this season.
- Keaton Thomas led the Bears with 12 tackles, including eight solo, and logged one of BU's four sacks on the night.

Getting three fourth-quarter turnovers, the Baylor Bears overcame a shaky offensive second half to come away with a hard-fought 20-10 victory over the Houston Cougars Saturday night at TDECU Stadium for their fifth-consecutive win.

Sawyer Robertson threw for 204 yards and two touchdowns, but the redshirt junior quarterback was picked off three times, including a pick-six. **Bryson Washington** recorded his third-straight and fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season with 113 yards on 28 carries.

Lorando Johnson picked off a pass at the Cougars' 33, setting up a 50-yard field goal by **Isaiah Hankins** late in the fourth quarter to put the game away. The Bears also recovered a fumble on the ensuing kickoff and got their third interception of the game in the final minute on a pick by **Devin Lemear** to seal it.

Baylor held Houston (4-7, 3-5) to just 239 yards of total offense, including 92 yards on the ground. Linebacker **Keaton Thomas** had a team-high 10 tackles and recorded two of the team's three tackles for loss.

After an exchange of interceptions of each team's first possession, including a pick in the end zone by safety **Devyn Bobby**, Robertson engineered a 14-play, 80-yard scoring drive that was led by the running of Washington. The redshirt junior QB converted on a fourth-down play with a 10-yard pass to **Josh Cameron**, then hooked up with tight end **Michael Trigg** for a five-yard TD pass that gave the Bears the 7-0 lead with 6:1 left in the first quarter.

That lead didn't last though, as Robertson threw an interception that was returned 41 yards for a TD, as the Coogs tied the score at 7 apiece with 32 ticks left in the opening period. The Bers answered right back however, going 74 yards in 11 plays and scoring on Robertson's 23-yard TD strike to **Ashtyn Hawkins**.

Eating up the final six minutes of the half, Baylor marched 59 yards in 11 plays and tacked on a 45-yard field goal by Hankins to make it 17-7 going into the locker room.

With Baylor running just three offensive plays in the third quarter and getting sacked twice, UH had the ball for nearly 13 minutes but came up with nothing to show for it after a missed field goal. The Cougars did hit a 24-yarder in the fourth quarter to pull within a score at 17-10, before BU pulled away.

POSTGAME NOTES

- The win marked Baylor's fifth-consecutive victory, its longest win streak since 2019, when the Bears won each of the first nine contests to begin the year.
- BU did not allow an offensive touchdown for the third game this season.
- Redshirt freshman RB Bryson Washington rushed for 113 yards, marking his fifth 100-yard performance of the year, third in a row, and fourth in the last five games.
- Junior S Devyn Bobby snagged his second-career interception, while junior S Devin Lemear picked off his third-career pass.
- Fifth-year senior CB Lorando Johnson grabbed his second-career interception, and first as a Bear.
- Redshirt sophomore LB Keaton Thomas logged his fourth double-digit tackle output of the year, and third in a row, with 10 stops to lead the Bears.
