DIRECTIONS TO VIVINT SMART HOME ARENA

The Vivint Smart Home Arena main entrance is on the corner of 300 West (John Stockton Drive) and South Temple.

From northbound I-15

Take 600 South Exit (heading east). Turn left on 300 West (heading north).

From southbound I-15

Exit 312, take ramp right for US-89 South toward Beck Street (heading south). Proceed to South Temple. Arena is ahead on the right.

From Salt Lake International Airport (travleing east on I-80)

Take the City Center/600 South Exit (heading east). Turn left on 300 West (heading north).

Using TRAX

Use Blue Line (701) or Green Line (704). Exit TRAX at the Arena station on South Temple across from Vivnt Smart Home Arena.

MEDIA ENTRANCES

The primary media entrance is at the Northeast Main Entrance (Level 3) of Vivint Smart Home Arena, facing 300 West and South Temple. The Credential Distribution table is on the lefthand side. Then proceed down to Level 1 by taking Elevator 3.

The secondary media entrance is at the South Entrance (Level 1), across from Door #3 in the Loading Dock.

(Please note that ALL bags and equipment will be searched upon entrance each day)

CREDENTIAL DISTRIBUTION

Credentials will not be mailed. There will be NO credential pickup at the media hotel. All credentials will be distributed at Vivint Smart Home Arena off the Northeast Main Entrance (Level 3) off 300 West. Temporary parking will be allowed in the pocket along the street for pick-up. Recipients must present a government-issued photo ID and verify that they are full-time, salaried employees of the media agency. A sign-in sheet for individuals to confirm receipt of credentials will be available.

MEDIA SHUTTLE

The media shuttle will run between the Radisson Salt Lake City Downtown and Vivint Smart Home Arena on all days: open practice day, game days and the day in between games.

Pick up and drop off at three locations: Radisson main entrance on South Temple, at the arena primary media entrance (east side on curb), and at the arena secondary media entrance (south entrance across from Door #3 in loading dock).

Departures will occur at 15-minute intervals. Schedules will be posted in the lobby of the Radisson and the Media Work Room.

LEVEL 3 - UPPER MEDIA SEATING ELEVATOR

Media seated in the Level 3 Upper Media Seating area (top of lower bowl, sections 16 and 20) can use Elevator No. 2. It will be held for media use between the 4- and 2-minute marks at the end of each half.

LEVEL 6 - OVERFLOW MEDIA SEATING ELEVATOR

Media seated in the Level 6 Overflow Media Seating area can use Elevator No. 2. It will be held for media use between the 4- and 2-minute marks at the end of each half.

UPPER PHOTO PLATFORM

Photographers may shoot from the top of section 16, behind the upper media seating area. There is also limited space on the sides of the center court camera platform at the top of section 18.

The period begins when the coach from the winning team reaches the locker room after the game and on-court media obligations. The losing team shall have a 15-minute cooling-off period that begins when its coach reaches the locker room after the game.

SALT LAKE CITY



Home to the University of Utah and the state's capital city, Salt Lake City blends the amenities of a major metropolitan area with beautiful natural surroundings.

Featuring the majestic 11,000-foot peaks of the Wasatch Mountains to the east, and the Great Salt Lake and Oquirrh Mountains to the west, Salt Lake City is surrounded by majestic views in all directions. U.S. News & World Report ranked Salt Lake City as one of the "top 15 best places to live" in recent years. Its metro area population of 1.1 million ranks in the top 50 in the United States.

LIVING IN SALT LAKE

Named one of America's top five friendliest and most-attractive cities by Travel+Leisure magazine, Salt Lake is the largest city in the state with 200,544 residents. Salt Lake City ranked No. 5 on Forbes' annual list of "America's Fastest-Growing Cities" in 2016. The population along the Wasatch Front, which includes Ogden and Provo, has swelled to more than 2.4 million.

Its literacy rate, percentage of high school graduates, and percentage of college-educated citizens ranks among the best in the nation. Salt Lake has a moderate four-season climate, averaging 237 days of sunshine per year and 15% humidity.

With projects ranging from the renovation of historic buildings to the construction of new office towers, condominiums and apartments, a growing number of people not only work but live in the downtown area, and one in six residents is now in their 20s. Citing professional opportunities and quality of life, WalletHub named Salt Lake City the No. 1 place to start a career in May 2016.

ENTERTAINMENT

Salt Lake City features a wide range of dining options, live music, two large modern malls, a diverse array of specialty stores, art galleries, professional symphony, opera, theater, dance, and cultural and ethnic festivals. It was rated No. 3 among the "Best Cities for Young Professionals" by Forbes in 2017 and was cited as having the "No. 5 Best Downtown in America" by Livability.com.

The city played host to the 2002 Winter Olympics. The opening and closing ceremonies and the athletes' village were located on the University of Utah campus. Salt Lake City annually joins forces with nearby resort town Park City to host the Sundance Film Festival.

Professional sports franchises in Salt Lake City include the Utah Jazz of the NBA, Real Salt Lake of Major League Soccer and Utah Royals of

the National Women's Soccer League. Other franchises are the Salt Lake Bees (AAA baseball), Utah Grizzlies (hockey), Salt Lake Stallions (AAF), Utah Warriors (Major League Rugby) and the Salt Lake Monarchs (USL soccer).

OUTDOOR RECREATION

Some of the best skiing, fly fishing, hiking, mountain biking, rock climbing and river running found anywhere in the world is easily accessible. Eleven major ski resorts are within an hour drive from "Ski City." A pair of those resorts were listed among the "Top 10 in North America" by Forbes in November 2018, including No. 3 Snowbird and No. 4 Alta. Ten national parks are within a day's drive.

With so many recreational opportunities so readily available, Salt Lake was recognized as the eighth fittest city in America by the Huffington Post and first for life expectancy by Livability.com in 2016.

BUSINESS

Forbes has named Utah the "Best State for Business and Careers" six times in the past nine years, recognizing Salt Lake City as one of the major industrial banking, healthcare and transportation centers in the U.S. Utah's employment has expanded at the third-best rate in the U.S. over the past five years at 3.3 percent. Several publications have taken note of Salt Lake's high number of "creative class" workers—including artists, scientists, engineers, and others in technology fields—with the "Silicon Slopes" growing exponentially on the south end of the metro area. In 2016, AdWeek proclaimed that Utah is poised to become America's next tech and creative hub. Amazon rated Utah the "Most Entrepreneurial State" in 2018.

TRANSPORTATION

Salt Lake International Airport, a Delta Airlines hub, is located just 20 minutes from campus and is undergoing a \$3.6 billion redevelopment. It offers direct flights to 84 U.S. destinations and 11 international cities and handled 24 million passengers in 2017. TRAX light rail provides access to downtown Salt Lake, the University of Utah, the airport and many of the suburbs.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS HOSTED BY UTAH

This marks the fourth time the University of Utah has hosted the NCAA Men's Basketball Championships at Vivint Smart Home Arena, and it joins a long and distinguished list of NCAA events hosted by the U.

Utah's on-campus arena, the Jon M. Huntsman Center, ranks third among the nation's facilities for the most NCAA men's basketball tournament games hosted, with 81 games having been played there. The JMHC played host to the 1979 NCAA Basketball Championship "Dream Match-Up" featuring Indiana State's Larry Bird and Michigan State's Magic Johnson. The men's NCAA regional tournament came to the Huntsman Center twice (1971 and '81) and the first and second rounds took place in the arena 13 times (1984, '85, '87, '88, '89, '90, '91, '93, '95, '97, 2000, '03 and '06).

The Huntsman Center has also played host to a record eight NCAA women's gymnastics championships. The NCAA Women's Gymnastics Championships were last hosted in the JMHC in 2007. Utah hosted NCAA women's basketball tournament first- and second-round games at the Huntsman Center in 2001 and 2011. The NCAA Skiing Championships were last hosted by Utah in 2014.

THE UNIVERSITY OF UTAH



Founded in 1850, the University of Utah prepares students to live and compete in the global workplace. The U. encompasses 1,500 acres in the foothills of the Wasatch Mountain range. Utah became a member of the Pac-12 Conference on July 1, 2011.

With an enrollment of over 33,000, the U. offers 100 undergraduate and more than 90 graduate level fields of study. It has earned a top-tier grading from the Academic Ranking of World Universities for 14 consecutive years, and offers nationally-ranked programs in law, pharmacy, mathematics, business, biomedical engineering, family medicine, life sciences, fines arts, education, architecture, entertainment arts and engineering. The U. checked in as one of the top 50 schools in the U.S. by the Center for World University Rankings in 2018. The U. came in at No. 11 in the nation for value according to the 2019 Wall Street Journal/Times Higher Education College Rankings.

RESEARCH

The University of Utah was rated No. 1 for commercializing technology innovations according to the Milken Institute's 2017 ratings. U. Health was also ranked 19th out of 100 top health care institutions worldwide for scientific research by the Nature Index.

Geneticist Mario R. Capecchi received the 2007 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine for his work on gene targeting. Çağan Şekerciöğlü, assistant professor of biology, won the Scientific and Technical Research Council of Turkey's highest prize for 2014. Peter J. Stang, distinguished professor of chemistry, received the 2013 Priestley Medal and 2011 National Medal of Science for his pioneering work in supramolecular chemistry.

TECHNOLOGY AND COMPUTER SCIENCES

The U.'s entertainment arts and engineering program has earned a top three rating seven years running according to Animation Career Review. The University's School of Computing, which earned a top 60 world ranking in 2016, was founded in 1965 and began a pioneering legacy in computer graphics and visualization that continues today.

The College of Engineering's undergraduate program was ranked 40th by College Choice in 2017. The Scientific Computing & Imaging Institute is internationally recognized.

MEDICINE

University of Utah Hospitals and Clinics, a Level I trauma center, was ranked No. 1 in the nation in quality, safety and accountability in 2016 and has annually ranked among the nation's top 10 academic medical centers. U.S. News & World Report placed the school of medicine's programs in primary care, pharmacy, physical therapy, physician assistant, and nursing in the nation's top 30.

The U.'s surgeons were the first in the world to conduct a permanent artificial heart implant in 1982. More recently, the Utah Genome Project is one of several innovative medical research programs at the U. Other notable programs include the nationally-recognized Huntsman Cancer Institute, the Clinical Neurosciences Center and the Moran Eye Center.

BUSINESS SCHOOL

The David Eccles School of Business' undergraduate program has been rated among the top 50 by U.S. News & World Report in the past five years. In the magazine's most recent rankings, the full-time MBA program jumped to No. 36. The school also has been placed in the top 25 for entrepreneurship seven straight years by the Princeton Review. The graduate accounting program was rated top 35.

COLLEGE OF LAW

The S.J. Quinney College of Law was ranked 54th in the nation by U.S. News & World Report in 2018. It also earned top 20 ratings for practical training, as well as its and public defender/prosecutor law and environmental law programs.

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

Utah's College of Education soared eight spots to No. 58 in the U.S. News & World Report rankings in 2018. Its special education and master's programs were also highly rated by College Choice in 2017.

CAMPUS LIFE

A lively residential living experience is provided in the beautiful Heritage Commons, which served as the Athletes Village for the 2002 Winter Olympics. The Donna Garff Marriott Honors Residential Scholars Community, the George S. Eccles Student Life Center, and the Lassonde Studios for housing student entrepreneurs have opened in recent years. A new south campus housing development opens in 2020.

UTAH ATHLETICS HISTORY

The latest chapter in Ute athletics history began on July 1, 2011, when Utah officially became a member of the Pac-12 Conference. But Utah's reputation as an athletics power was established long before it joined the "Conference of Champions." Utah has won 27 team national championships and 109 individual national titles.

The original "BCS Buster," Utah football was 2-0 in BCS games, winning the 2005 Fiesta Bowl and the 2009 Sugar Bowl. Men's basketball has thrived throughout its history, winning an NCAA Championship in 1944 and finishing as the runner-up in 1998. The Runnin' Utes also won national championships in 1916 (AAU) and 1947 (NIT).

Women's gymnastics boasts 10 national championships and nine runner-up finishes. Women's basketball has averaged over 20 wins a season since its start back in 1974-75.

The men's and women's ski team has captured 12 NCAA Championships. Volleyball has participated in 15 of the last 21 NCAA Tournaments with three Sweet 16s. Softball has qualified for 16 NCAA Tournaments, including two Super Regionals. Women's soccer has played in the NCAAs seven times since 2002 and went to the Sweet 16 in 2016. Baseball has advanced to NCAA Regionals twice since 2009. Cross country qualified for the NCAA Championships in 2015 and '16. Men's tennis made NCAAs in 2018, women's tennis went from 2010-12, and men's swimming finished No. 22 in the nation in 2015.

VIVINT SMART HOME ARENA



later, at a cost of \$66 million. Vivint Smart Home Arena boasts 50 luxury suites, an All-Star Suite and an Executives Club, three sky suites and numerous hospitality and multipurpose rooms.

The building was designed by FFKR Architecture-Planning-Interior Design of Salt Lake City, and was built as a joint venture with O.C./Sahara Construction Companies. Financing was provided by Sumitomo Trust and Banking Co., LTD - Los Angeles Agency. Cost of the building was \$66 million. The building is 743,000 square feet, 136 feet high and sits on 10 acres. Vivint Smart Home Arena's "footprint" is 3.79 acres.

Vivint Smart Home Arena, which recently underwent a \$125-million renovation, is located on the west side of downtown Salt Lake City, just minutes from team hotels and about 15 minutes from the Salt Lake International Airport.

Situated at 301 West South Temple, just two blocks from the Calvin L. Rampton Salt Palace Convention Center, Vivint Smart Home Arena is within walking distance from numerous downtown restaurants and Temple Square.

It is also adjacent to two malls. The newest is City Creek Center, a world-class fashion and dining destination with its main entrance located at 50 South Main Street (three blocks east of the arena), offering over 100 stores and restaurants in a casual, pedestrian-friendly shopping area. The Gateway, an outdoor shopping, dining area and entertainment area, is located immediately west of the arena.

This is the fourth time Vivint Smart Home Arena has played host to NCAA Men's Basketball Championship games. The University of Utah previously staged the 2010 NCAA West Regional, and the 2013 and '17 First/Second Rounds at the facility.

The building has played host to the 1993 NBA All-Star Weekend, the 1997 and 1998 NBA Finals, the 1999 U.S. Figuring Skating Championships, as well as figure skating and short track speed skating in the 2002 Olympic Winter Olympics. The arena has featured some of the biggest names in the music world, with the three largest concert draws in the arena's history of Garth Brooks, U2 and the Rolling Stones providing multiple-night sellouts. Family-friendly events such as Disney on Ice and the Days of '47 Rodeo also make annual appearances. Ariana Grande, Eric Church, Neil Diamond, Tim McGraw and Faith Hill, Bill Joel, and Lady Gaga are slated to appear at the arena in the coming months. Over 1.8 million guests enjoy entertainment at Vivint Smart Home Arena each year.

The arena opened on October 4, 1991 and holds 19,911 for basketball and up to 19,688 for concerts. Construction began on June 11, 1990 and was completed in record-time – 15 months and 24 days

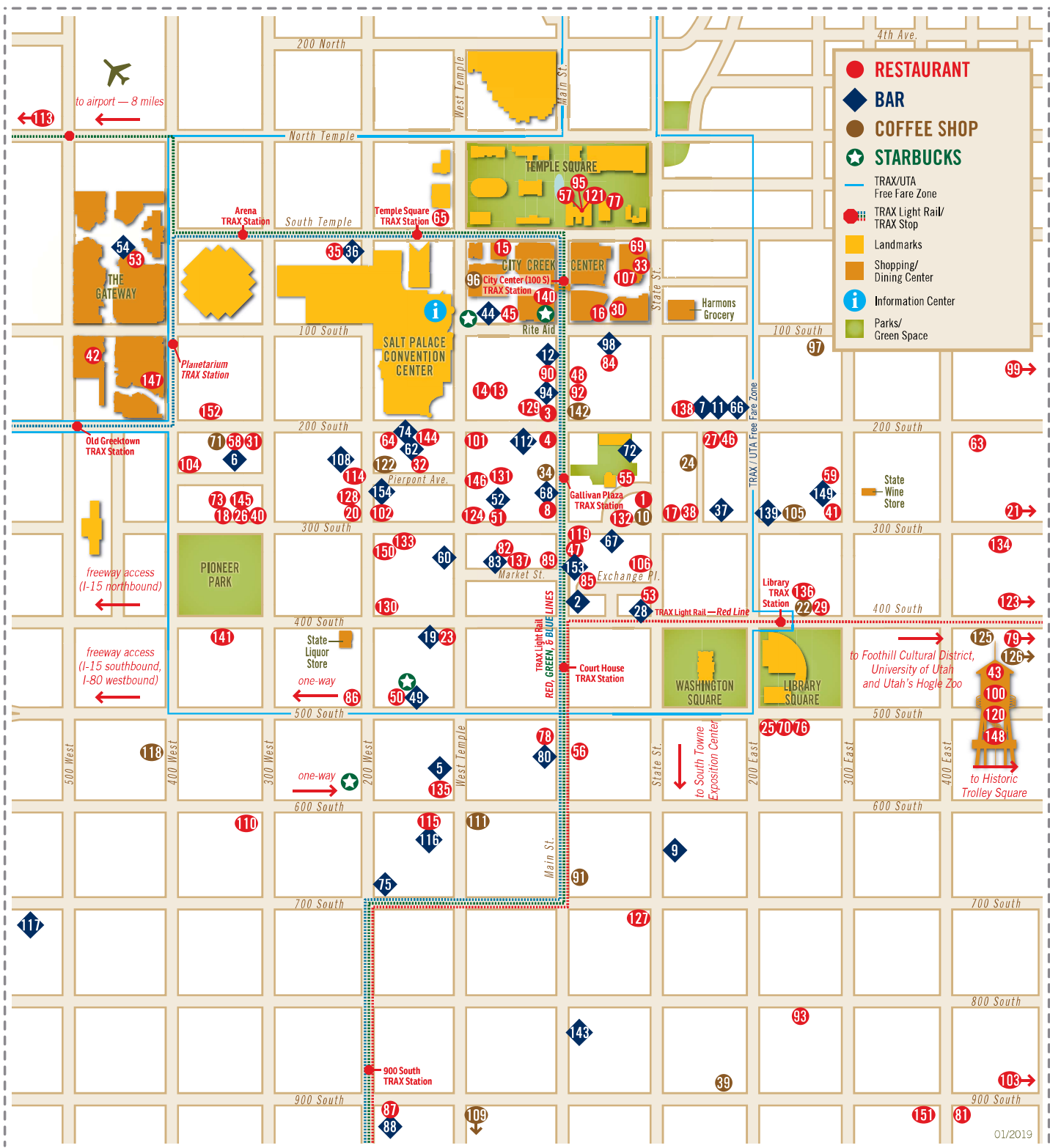
