TEAM NOTES

- Baylor has the nation's longest active winning streak at 30 games.
- Baylor's 30-straight wins is tied for the 21st longest winning streak of all time along with five other teams, including the 2005-06 Baylor team.
- The 30-game win streak is tied for the third-longest win streak in program history behind the 2012-13 team's 32-game streak and the 2011-13 42-game streak.
- Baylor's win streak at the Ferrell Center improved to 40 games (last loss, Feb. 6, 2017 to Texas, 85-79).
- Baylor head coach **Kim Mulkey** improved to 577-99 all-time with the win (.854).
- Mulkey's 577th career win helped her leapfrog her college coach, former boss and former Baylor assistant **Leon Barmore** who collected a 576-87 record as Louisiana Tech's head coach from 1983-2002.
- Baylor's last non-conference loss at home came Jan. 13, 2014 vs. UConn (66-55). Since then, the Lady Bears have won 50-straight non-conference home games at the Ferrell Center including 15 NCAA Tournament contests.
- Baylor is 150-3 all-time vs. non-conference opponents at the Ferrell Center under head coach Kim Mulkey.
- Baylor began the preseason ranked No. 2 by the Associated Press, which marks the 300th consecutive week the Lady Bears have been ranked in the AP Top 25.
- Baylor was presented with one of its national championship rings in a pregame ceremony and the 2019 NCAA Championship banner was unveiled. Baylor players and staff will receive three rings: Baylor's national championship ring (presented tonight), the NCAA championship ring, and the Big 12 Championship ring.
- Baylor is now 221-1 all-time under Mulkey when shooting 50 percent or better (56.5 percent on 39 of 69 shooting today).
- In 661 of 676 games under Mulkey, the Lady Bears have held their opponent at or below 50 percent field goal shooting (15.5) with only seven of those efforts coming in the last 16 seasons.
- Baylor has out-rebounded its opponents in 105 of the last 110 games (59-29 tonight).
- Baylor opened the game on a 37-0 run, holding New Hampshire scoreless for the first 13:45 of the game.
- Baylor tied its school record for fewest points allowed in a quarter on Dec. 15, 2016 where Winthrop was scoreless in the fourth quarter.
- Baylor set a new school and Big 12 record for fewest points allowed in a half with both records previously held by Texas State. Texas State scored five points in the first half on Jan. 2, 2010, and Texas State scored five points in the second half on Dec. 6, 2016.
- Baylor was one point shy of tying the NCAA record for fewest points allowed in a half (Lipscomb 2 vs. Western Kentucky on Dec. 15, 2016).

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- Lauren Cox surpassed 1,300 career points tonight; her fifth of 11 points put her at 1,300.
- Lauren Cox surpassed 800 career rebounds tonight; her second of 10 rebounds put her at 800.
- Lauren Cox posted her 29th double-double of her career.
- Lauren Cox scored in double figures for the 69th time in her career, finishing with 11 points.
- Queen Egbo surpassed 150 career rebounds tonight; her third of seven rebounds put her at 150.
- Queen Egbo recorded her 10th multi-block game of her career, tying a career-high four blocks.
- Queen Egbo's 14 points marked the ninth time in her career she's scored in double figures.
- NaLyssa Smith's 21 points tied a career high (21 vs. Saint Francis, 11/8/18).
- NaLyssa Smith surpassed 200 career rebounds tonight; her seventh of 14 rebounds put her at 200.
- NaLyssa Smith set a new career high in rebounds with 14, surpassing her previous best of 11 set against Arizona State on Nov. 11, 2018.
- NaLyssa Smith posted her fourth double-double of her career and first since Abilene Christian in the 2019 NCAA Tournament First Round.
- NaLyssa Smith set new career highs in free throws made (9) and attempted (10).
- Erin DeGrate scored in double figures for the 26th time in her career and first time in a Baylor uniform, finishing with 18 points.
- DiDi Richards tied her career high in assists with nine (Dec. 31, 2018 vs. UTRGV).
